Call to the National Convention Anthony Wright (PA), National Adjutant

Pursuant to Article V, Section 2 of the National Constitution of the Sons of The American Legion, the National Commander of the Sons of The

American Legion hereby calls for the Fifty-first
National Convention of the Sons of The American
Legion to be held August 25th through August 27th,
2023 in the Charlotte Convention Center, Charlotte,
North Carolina.

Purpose: National Convention sessions, in accordance with the Uniform Code of Procedure for National Conventions, will be convened at 1:00 pm on Friday, August 25, 2023. The 51st Annual National Convention shall be convened for the following purposes:

- 1. To complete all business of the Sons of The American Legion for the fiscal year 2022-2023;
- 2. To vote on all resolutions which are properly presented to the National Convention;
- 3. To consider and/or make amendments to the National Constitution and/or By-Laws of the Sons of The American Legion
- 4. To elect a National Commander and five (5) National Vice Commanders, in that sequence, for the ensuing year, 2023-2024. Elections shall take

place on Sunday, August 27, 2023.

Representation: Representation in the National Convention shall be allotted in accordance with the provisions of Article V of the National Constitution of the Sons of The American Legion which states in part:

Article V, Section 3. In the National Convention, each Detachment shall be entitled to three (3) delegates and one (1) additional delegate for each 500 Members, or major fraction thereof, whose current dues have been received by the National Treasurer of The American Legion, thirty (30) days prior to the meeting of said National Convention, and whose registration fees, as fixed by the National Executive Committee, for its total authorized delegate strength, have been paid, and to one (1) Alternate for each delegate.

Article V, Section 4. Each duly registered delegate shall be entitled to one (1) vote. The vote of any registered delegate absent and not represented by an Alternate shall be cast by the majority of the registered delegates present

from one's Detachment.

Alternates for registered delegates shall have all the privileges of registered delegates except that of voting. A registered delegate is one who has received one's credentials and has paid such registration fees as may be required.

Article VI, Section 6. All Past National Commanders, while in good standing in their respective Squadrons, shall be members for life of the National Executive Committee, without a vote, and shall also be life delegates to all National Conventions of the Sons of The American Legion, with a vote, to be exercised by them with their respective Detachments.

Article VII, Section 3. Members of the National Executive Committee shall be delegates to the National Convention with a vote, which vote shall be exercised with their respective

Detachments, except that the vote of the National Commander, shall be exercised only in their capacity as chair of the National Convention.

How are you doing? I love you, too. Good afternoon, one and all.

I would like to congratulate the Sons of the American Legion for celebrating their 91st anniversary and 54th Annual National Convention here in Charlotte.

The Sons of the American Legion continue to impress and raise the bar with your hard work, dedication to your country and committees.

Your veteran fathers and grandfathers, as well as veterans and Legionnaires are proud of you.

Not only reaching but surpassing your membership goal is a testament to your dedication and commitment.

Of the 5,882 Squadrons, only 1,896 consolidated Squadron reports were submitted for a total of 32.2%.

Last year, we had 1,553 submitted for 26.7% completion rate.

So, there was an increase in submissions, but there's also a lot of room for improvement.

CRS data is vitally important and gets incorporated into The American Legion's National Commander's testimony before Congress.

How about next year I challenge you to do at least 50 percent?

Your dedication shows. This year's Sons Squadrons collectively donated more than \$7,366,547 and volunteered over 4,987,268 hours supporting the various Legion programs and VAs around the country.

It is you, the Sons, that continue to set the example on how veterans support organizations should be modeled.

While those numbers are amazing, I'm willing to bet it's much higher. This info is derived from just 32.2% of the CRS submitted.

Just imagine what that would be if we submitted reports for 100%.

You've also raised the bar on fundraising by consistently donating to Child Welfare Foundation.

Since 1987, the Sons have donated over \$9.1 million to CWF. And this year alone it was \$1,035,309. You lead the way with pride, honor and integrity.

The Sons have made great strides to mirror the procedures and processes of The American Legion on many levels to include taking fiscal ownership of the Sons programs in ensuring that members receive appropriate reimbursement for national meetings.

As you know, the SAL is now able to renew online using the Legion.org/SALrenew. To date, we've had over 2,300 members take advantage of this process. This capability is long overdue.

In the future, we will create Detachment, headquarter Squadrons and allow members to join online after a resolution is submitted. Have a great convention and continue to be the example for what a veterans support veteran organization should be.

And last but not least, I'm also a member of the SAL. I gained my eligibility from my

father, who was a combat medic in World War II and fought in the Battle of the Bulge.

The chairman brought up some good numbers, talked about some great things that the Sons are doing, and I can say on the National staff's side I really appreciate that.

And I know that the National staff appreciates everything you do.

You do a wonderful job. You're out there supporting The American Legion Family, which is awesome. We just came off the Legacy Run. How

MARK NAVE (PA): Legion Family, special guests, Distinguished Guests, what a fantastic year it has been for the Child Welfare Foundation.

Last year, in Milwaukee, we were given our goal for the year, which was supposed to be \$1 per member. Well, we exceeded that by getting \$1.16 per member and raising \$424,000 this past fundraising year.

last year, and one of his goals was to raise money
for charity. And he chose Child Welfare

Foundation. Now, Henry, you're how old, buddy?

HENRY JAMES HASSELHAN (NJ): Six.

MARK NAVE (PA): Six years old. Henry raised almost \$2,500 towards the Child Welfare Foundation.

National Convention.

His theme as National Commander is "V.E.T.S., Veterans, Education, Teamwork and Sponsor."

A life member of American Legion Post

1682 in Rockland County, N.Y., he served in the

U.S. Navy and Navy Reserves from 1969 to 1974. He

completed a tour aboard the USS Nitro, an auxiliary

ammunition ship with the Sixth Fleet.

He was honorably discharged as a boatswain's mate third class. He is also a member of Sons of The American Legion Squadron 1682 based on the World War II service of Jim's father. Jim

spent his entire working career in the automotive service industry, where he began as a parts manager at a local Chevrolet dealership and went on to serve in many capacities of management.

At the time of his retirement in 2017, he was director of service and parts at a New York

Metro Mercedes Benz dealership. After a brief time at home, he began an entirely new career as a school bus driver for the Falmouth School District and part-time motor coach operator.

Jim served in many offices at every level of The American Legion. He was elected department commander of New York for 2010-2011 and chaired several national commissions to include the Legislative Commission, Veterans Employment and Education Commission and the Membership and Post Activity Committee.

He served on the National Security

Commission and was elected national vice commander for 2016-2017.

He married his wife Saveria in 1973. They have two daughters, Laura and Jeanette; a

son-in-law, Michael; and three grandchildren, Alexander, Abigail and Natalia.

The Troiola's include three generations of American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary or Sons of The American Legion membership.

Jim currently lives in Maine to be close to a daughter and his grandchildren, while still being within driving distance to the Department of New York.

ADDRESS

Vincent J. "Jim" Troiola, TAL National Commander

Good afternoon, Sons of the American Legion members.

Should I say fellow members? I'm a dual member as well. It's cool to be dual.

So, I just understand you gave me the Child Welfare Foundation report, and as always you're breaking records, you broke records in membership this year.

I want to tell you how our year has gone since I became National Commander and how we've evolved over the last three to four years.

Four years ago, we hired a marketing director at The American Legion. We immediately sponsored an Indy race car, which you all know about. That's brought a lot of exposure to us with our "Be the One" suicide awareness campaign, and we carried through COVID.

We did our "Be the One" checks and we saved a lot of lives, I believe, doing it.

Then we came into this year because "Be the One" was sort of out there but it wasn't really introduced yet.

And I became the Commander that spread the message around the nation and the world. And when we start talking about "Be the One," we all understand what it is: A peer to peer program, designed to have one veteran talk to another or a member of a Legion Post, Squadron, Chapter,

Auxiliary Unit. Talk to another veteran and see if we can identify that veteran at risk and get them

the help they need.

But when you go on the road -- and I think Chris, he took on "Be the One" as well -- and I really congratulate him for that.

Met when it comes to emotional problems. There wasn't a state that I went to and talked about "Be the One" that I didn't have a family member come up to me and tell me about someone in their families or friends that tried to hurt themselves or tried to take their own lives.

And you're not quite ready for that when you go out on the road. You're sort of not used to something like that. And all you can do is sit and listen. Boy, I've got to tell you, it hit home. I had stories of a woman in Wyoming when I was campaigning that told me that her son lives three states away, and at least three times a week he calls her up and tells her that he's going to take his own life, and she's got to talk him off the ledge.

Think about that. Three states away.

How do you go to sleep at night knowing that that's going on? And this is going on all over the United States. Don't concentrate on the numbers of veterans that have taken their lives every day because you can't do anything for them, unfortunately.

We need to get to work and we need to be the one to save a life every single day.

You know, we've been successful this year. We got the Department of Veterans Affairs to sign on to co-branding with "Be the One."

Is everybody aware of that? So that's really special to us because they have 9 million registered veterans in the healthcare system. So that really helps a lot.

Then we signed on with USAA. They have a coalition, Face the Fight, it's called. And it's a coalition of veterans service organizations, nonprofits, corporations, mental health therapists, social workers, whatever it might be, to do the exact same thing that we want to do, and that's reduce veteran suicide.

And the same thing goes for the active duty servicemembers whose suicides, believe it or not, is on the rise, especially in the Army. This past quarter it's gone up tremendously and we're working along those people as well.

So that's something I think that's got the ball rolling, "Be the One" this year. We all did a great job putting it out in the open, and it is something that's not going away for the foreseeable future because we need to solve this problem by 2030. That's the goal we've set along with USAA to solve this problem.

How many of you rode in the Legacy ride this week? Please stand. That's fantastic.

... Applause.

I had the opportunity -- I didn't stay with the ride the whole week -- I had other obligations -- but I was out with them on Sunday and Monday. I flew home on Monday. And then I came back on Wednesday night and was with them yesterday.

And you know something when you go

around and talk to those riders and the perseverance they have of raising money for the Legacy Scholarship Fund, it's absolutely amazing to watch.

Yesterday morning we were in Bristol

Motor Speedway, we asked for donations. All these
riders come up to the stage, some with as little as
\$5.

One walked up and said, "This is \$5 from a clerk that I was speaking in the store, asked me what we were doing and she handed me five bucks."

Another one from a Walmart employee, \$20. It's absolutely amazing.

But by the end of the day, last night, we finished up the Legacy Run in Hendrick Motorsports, if you're familiar with NASCAR legend. And the number last night, before we left, still going up, was \$667,000.

This morning I had the opportunity to interview with a member of Military Times. And his name is Leo -- I can't remember his last name --

but he got the Fourth Estate Award from us this year. He'll be at National Convention next week.

But the subject came up with a brand-new program that we have all based on visits that either myself or other staff members made around the world and around the United States based on quality of life of our military servicemembers.

And we've got some problems, some isolated problems. So, what the National Security Division did was they got a hold of the Pentagon and the Department of Defense and we started this program called BASE. It's Base Assessment Servicemember Experience.

And what it's designed to do is just like the System Worth Saving in the VA, it's designed to go into a military base, speak to the troops and commanding officers, it's not derogatory in any way, identify issues that are going on.

And there are many issues. There's housing. There's child care. There's mold.

There's shortage of housing. Rents being manipulated by -- the rent part of it is you're an

E4, you want to go rent an apartment for you and your family, your apartment is \$2,000, whatever that is, whether it's good or bad depending on the area, but if you're an E-6 and you're an officer, maybe you want that same apartment, they raise the rent based on what your base housing allowance is and that's disgusting.

Those are the things we want to address. The whole idea is to advocate on their behalf so their quality of life is where it should be, especially in their family life.

And we consider it a national security issue, because if you have a family at home while you're deployed and they're facing quality of life issues that would really affect them in a health way, something like that, the spouse will be in the field and they'd be distracted and they'd be thinking about what's going on at home with their families' lives, which we all would do.

So, the idea of it is to try and eliminate it as much as possible so that the spouse can continue on with their mission and we can continue

on advocating for our servicemembers and our veterans that we have -- that's why we're here.

So, in closing, I want to thank you for everything you've done for the Sons of the American Legion and for The American Legion and our partners in the Auxiliary and the Riders, and I wish you a very successful convention, and God bless you, and please thank you so much for the hospitality that was afforded to me and my aide Gary.

I want to introduce him because I've got him on stage for a reason. You know, every National Commander chooses an aide, and the aide is based on -- what most people see is when we pull up to the airport, you see the aide unloading the car. But that's not really the purpose.

We got to a banquet and he's taking pictures. But the aide that I chose, I chose him for a reason. I'm trying to push that, number one, we need in The American Legion to have members coming into our ranks right now that are post-9/11 vets. I think it's very important. Nothing to say we're just old farts.

But I think that's the way we're going to grow. I chose Gary for that and because he's the past department commander of New York. He did a fantastic job while he was in that office. He was there during our 100th anniversary. And he did a lot of good things. He testified before the New York State Legislature.

He interviewed Teddy Roosevelt IV, which was pretty cool, and he's just an all-around great quy. And he thinks like I think.

Sometimes we don't think alike, but that's the whole idea of it. Ask him for advice before I come in and speak before an audience like this, whatever it is.

So, Gary, thanks for doing such a great job.

God bless all of you. Hold on one second. Chris, this is for you. It's a piece of tissue paper.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: I can't eat rabbit soup, I found that out because it makes me jumpy.

I would first like to take a moment to recognize Mark Nave, Chairman of the Child Welfare Foundation Liaison Committee for the SAL.

Is Mark still here? I saw him backstage, but he had his running shoes on, and I think he was heading out the door somewhere. He does a great job for all of you.

I would also like to give a shout out to the SAL members in the great Department of New York. You guys are, like Tony the Tiger says, Grrr-eat! Love you all. You did a great job.

I would like to thank all of the Sons of the American Legion, not only all of you in the

audience today, but also all of those back home that were not able to make the convention. You are a vital part of the success of the American Legion Child Welfare Foundation, but even more important than that, your unwavering support and dedication to our veterans across this great nation is deserving of much praise.

So, thank you for all that you do for the veterans and their families. I am happy to say that at our annual spring meeting in May, the Foundation awarded \$797,251 in grants to 16 youth-serving nonprofit organizations across the country, benefitting youth with physical, mental, spiritual, and emotional needs.

All recommendations made by the Sons Selection Committee were approved by the foundation.

Over the past ten years, the Sons have supported an estimated \$3,114,790 in CWF grants. Give yourself a hand. Outstanding.

program year, which ended on May 31st, is now in the books. The Foundation received a total of \$679,264, and of that, the Sons raised \$424,761. That's amazing. Give yourself another hand.

The 2024 will mark the 70th year of service to the youth of our nation for the Child Welfare Foundation. I hope it is a banner year, and I look forward to working with all of you in

this effort.

I'd like to at this time call on the Ohio Detachment Commander.

BILL TOWNS (OH): Good afternoon. We're here this afternoon representing and informing, after many conversations with director Stacy and also our membership out there. We have a small group of active past Detachment commanders in Ohio that, once they started working, they chose the Child Welfare Foundation as their project they were going to support each year.

Tell you a little thing we do. We have a bottle raffle we do once a year. Back in 1988 -- and some of you will remember some of these names from the early years. Past Detachment Commander Terry Kettering, he was a CWF chairman here on the national level for many years.

At his homecoming, Dale Hartley won a small bottle of Canadian Club that was raffled off.

As a Commander, he says, let's do it again, and he gave it back. So, each year this bottle was raffled off.

Give you the little facts about this.

The first raffle, 1988, brought in \$11.40 for CWF. We were rolling. In 1991, a past national membership chairman out of Ohio, Past Commander Kent Blanchard thought, let's do something special with this, and he wrote the distributor and asked if they would give us the little travel bottles for people that would bid on it, that we could give them a little symbolic bottle because what we do with this bottle is the person that wins the bid, takes it home for a year, and gets to display it.

That don't look much for a bottle of

Canadian Club sitting on your mantel -- except this

bottle that was received by Kent Blanchard back in

1991 was a gold-plated bottle of Canadian Club with

the Ohio Past Detachment Commanders Club on the

label. It took off from there.

In 1998 the first over \$1,000 donation was made for this, and the donation is just strictly you bid, you outbid everybody else there, and you get the right to hold the bottle for a year. That donation, somebody else you might know, Past National Sergeant-at-Arms, Past National

Chaplain Roy Turner.

The largest donation ever came in twice tied in 2003 and 2007, and that was brought in by, many of you knew him, Rob Brewer, and a lot of the 5th District in Ohio. They did that twice of \$10,000, just for the right to show it off for the year.

Total donations to this day was \$85,600 that this group of Commanders, small group of gentlemen have brought in and donated to Child Welfare.

Now, Rob Brewer had two passions. He had a bunch of things he loved, but there was two passions in his life. One was Ohio State.

DELEGATE: O-H.

DELEGATE: I-O!

DELEGATE: You know!

BILL TOWNS (OH): And the other was the Child Welfare Foundation. Sadly, early morning in July, Rob Brewer passed away, Past Detachment Commander. We keep records of everybody that's made donations on this. All the auctions that's

gone out, who did it, how much money they brought in.

At his funeral we were discussing how we could honor him. Well, Rob Brewer has two places -- Rob Brewer in the 5th District has two places already, two different years that their name is there for here's our donation. We thought what a great thing it would be if we could raise just a little over \$2,000 to make this year's bid for the bottle raffle, \$2,035, with Rob's name being ever embossed as the person that put the bottle raffle over the \$100,000 mark.

Now, if I could say this in any way at all without offending you, I can't, but I'm going to let you know. There are Detachments in that much time that has not done \$100,000. I apologize to you, but it's facts.

So, we sent out messages to our past commanders for \$100,000, saying that Rob's name will forever be ingrained as the one who put the amount over \$100,000 for Child Welfare. As Ohio does for Child Welfare, they stepped up.

At the end of the day when we finished gathering checks in, we have a check here to donate to the Child Welfare Foundation and to let them know that the past commanders in Ohio are still supporting, that we have a check here today for \$17,303, putting the Past Commanders Raffle over the \$100,000 mark by a bunch.

And just one final thought that just crossed my mind, that is added to the \$1 million that Ohio has already given.

And, Stacy, I would like to make you a Distinguished Guest of the 51st National Convention. Stacy has helped me a lot throughout the year, and I just like to recognize those who have helped. So, thank you.

ROBERT L. MORRILL (NY): Stacy told me a few days ago not to recognize her. She didn't need to be recognized. She does a fabulous job in this program, and she should get a hand.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: At this time, I'd like to ask the Sergeant-at-Arms to please escort Rick Lofgren of the Children's Organ Transplant Association to the podium.

PRESENTATION

Children's Organ Transplant Association Rick Lofgren

Good afternoon. Thank you, Commander, for that introduction. I'm Rick Lofgren, the president of the Children's Organ Transplant Association, and I'm pleased to welcome all of you to beautiful Charlotte. Hopefully they will turn on the air conditioning for us outside as well as they have inside by the time we get out there.

I want to thank everyone for being here.

As I was sitting and waiting to come up on stage, I was impressed with all the money you have raised.

The Sons have raised hundreds of thousands of dollars to help kids across the country, and very specifically raised money to help our kids at COTA.

I'm incredibly grateful for your support and everything you do for us.

I also want to introduce my newest colleague Ryan Gallagher. Ryan joined COTA earlier this summer. If you happen to stop by our display booth, if you don't mind, ask him some really tough questions, make sure he's on his toes, and I'm sure he'll give you good answers.

I want to thank you for everything you've

done to help our kids. I specifically want to call out the Detachments from Florida, New Jersey, Indiana, and Delaware, who have gone above and beyond in helping our kids.

I want to mention one gentleman's name,

Dewey Long from Indiana. Dewey raised \$65,000 for

Hoosier Kids, and every child in Indiana now --

... Applause.

Yes, thank you. Every child we help in Indiana receives \$1,500 for their transplant costs thanks to the work the Sons did on Dewey's project.

And I'm very happy to say that Detachment of Indiana Commander Paul Rush has adopted us as his project this year, and Paul is hoping to do that as well. So, give Paul a hand. Hopefully he'll do very well with his fund-raising.

... Applause.

On a very personal note, my son-in-law is Lieutenant Joseph Morales, and he's stationed add NAS Jacksonville and a member of Squadron VUP-19. Joseph was a E-8 pilot and commander before he switched to flying drones.

I asked him where, and he told me that if he told me where it was, he'd have to kill me, and it would be very difficult for him at Thanksgiving and Christmas. I appreciate his candor on that.

My son-in-law and daughter welcomed our first grandchild this year. The military community at NAS Jacksonville has helped them tremendously. Our grandson was born unresponsive. They resuscitated him, put him in intensive care, and gave him an extensive battery of genetic testing.

He's doing well today, but that experience that our family had is the same experience many of our COTA families have each and every day. The money that you raise isn't just going into some fund somewhere. It's going to help families that are experiencing things. My family got through this and they're doing very well today, but many COTA families -- and there's more than 4,000 of them across the country -- don't go home three days later like my grandson did.

What you're doing to help our kids across this country is making sure those families, when

they take their child home, that they have the ability to pay for those expenses that they have, and it makes a difference in their future. If we could go to the next slide.

I want to mention very quickly, every one of our families starts with a different journey, and every one of you started with a different journey with their own families. But the reason COTA exists is to make sure every family has an opportunity that their son, grandson, their grandchildren, they have that opportunity to grow and to learn and to make sure that they have a full chance at life.

So, what we do is we raise money and provide fund-raising support for families to ensure that they can do that so that they can focus on those things that are most important, their kids' lives. What you do to raise money to help us will ensure that that will happen.

Our goal is to ensure that no family has to be left behind. They have that opportunity for that transplant.

adults, and they have a single gene disease called sickle cell anemia, polycystic kidney disease, or cystic fibrosis. Those are three of more than 5,000 different diagnoses that qualify for COTA's aid. Those are diseases that patients are born with. That's why we've made an exception to that rule. We have more than 4,000 families across the country we've helped over the past 38 years.

For those of you that don't know COTA and may wonder who can COTA help and why do we do what we do and how do we do that, we help any patient up to the age of 21 that needs a lifesaving organ, bone marrow, stem cell, cord blood, or eyelet cell transplant.

Patients must be U.S. citizens or legal residents, and those that have that single gene disease, there are no age restrictions, as I mentioned that up to 21 does not qualify for those patients.

In the coming week, I'll celebrate my 25th anniversary serving at COTA. I've met some

incredible people along the way. Thousands of parents who were facing the most stressful and difficult time of their life learning that they may lose their child, whether that child is an infant, elementary school, maybe even a young adult, but they need a lifesaving transplant that will save them.

COTA funds are available for that
patient's lifetime. The young man that you see in
the picture here received a kidney transplant from
his dad 21 years ago and is doing incredibly well.
His dream was to be an engineer, and now as a
mid-30s young man, he's able to do that, and he'll
be getting married very soon. Kevin is exactly
what we want to have happen. He was 13 years old
when he had his transplant, and now at 34 he's
doing incredibly well.

What we do is make sure that those families can focus on their kids. I've talked to thousands of parents over the days, knowing what their transplant journey is ahead of them that I know from doing what I've done for 21 years that

they don't yet know what's they have in front of them, but we want to ensure they have that opportunity to go forward.

I've met some outstanding leaders over the years that have stepped up to help our families. These families have no idea who these people are that are helping them, but many of them are Legionnaires, they're Sons, they're Legion Riders and Auxiliary members, and I'm grateful for everything you have done to help our kids.

In fact, the Legion family as a group is our largest supporter of COTA families across the country. You've helped us raise \$1.5 million to help COTA kids across the country. For that I want to thank you for your generous support.

In addition to that, we've received a number of grants from the Child Welfare Foundation that have totaled more than \$200,000, and they've helped with organ donor registration drives, our fund-raisers called COTA for life, for bowling and for golf. You helped us expand our online resources and many more projects along the way.

Today I'd like to introduce you to one of our families that is currently stationed at Fort

Dix, the Wards. Josiah, Jude and Lucie, along with mom Nicole and Air Force Sergeant Joseph. Both

Jude and Lucie have been diagnosed with a disease called Alpha-1 antitrypsin deficiency.

The doctors at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia have recommended a liver transplant for little Lucie, who's now 3. Her older brother Jude received his liver transplant six years ago. He's doing very well, and I understand he'll start third grade next week.

Many of our transplant families just like the Wards have coverage through Tricare, through private insurance programs, and through Medicare and Medicaid. But most plans that our families have require them to pay co-payments and deductibles that in many cases are up to \$5,000 a year, and that's if everything goes right. If you go in for a transplant or you have a hiccup in your care, those numbers only go higher.

So even with a good insurance plan, it's

a tremendous amount of money for any family to bear. Then once the transplant has been completed, those costs don't end.

Right now, Lucie is in the front end of this, Jude is on the back end of it. That family is still paying more than \$5,000 a year in medical bills, even after the Tricare coverage they have.

That includes transportation and lodging. It includes copayments and deductibles, medications—all those things that you and I would have to pay for our medical care, but magnify that many times over with two kids that need a lifesaving transplant, both surgeries, by the way, that cost over \$600,000 each.

The backbone of COTA's nationwide success is built on the selfless gifts and support of individuals and organizations that help us across the nation. They work tirelessly in our patients' hometown.

The American Legion family from Posts,

Departments, Units, Squadrons, Detachments, right

up through the Child Welfare Foundation, you've

been incredibly supportive of our COTA families for more than three decades, and combined total, more than \$1.7 million has been raised to help our families.

In addition to that dollar value that I just mentioned, you've given countless hours of volunteer time to help our families to know that someone's there that has come alongside them to step into the gap.

If you'd like more information on how you can do this, you can go to our website. If you go to COTA.org, you can type in American Legion, and it will get you the information that's on the screen. We'll share fund-raising ideas, other materials that we can provide, and things to help you help our families.

The American Legion family has made a tremendous difference in the lives of our kids, and it's not an exaggeration to say there are children that are alive today thanks to your support. This amazing support has been accomplished not only through fund-raising, but the opportunity that

you've had to get out into your committees and talk about organ donation and registration.

For that, for every Legion family member,

I want to say thank you for your generous support.

I want to thank you for the service that you

provide to our country and for all the things you

do that never make it to the newspaper but that you

do each and every day with your Detachments.

Two years ago, we honored the American

Legion family as our Miracle Makers of the Year at

our annual event in Indianapolis, and one of the

guests at that event took notice of that and went

back to his employer and helped secure a six-figure

gift for COTA kids.

He told me that the only reason that he was able to do that was because he received The American Legion family's Good Housekeeping Seal of Approval. Since that time, that organization has made two additional gifts totaling almost \$1 million.

That's an impact that won't show up anywhere on your reports, but that's something that

you are responsible for because of the work that you did demonstrating to someone else that we were worthy of support.

I want to thank you for everything you've done to help your families. I want to encourage you, if you have not stopped by our display, we're on Foundation Row, just across from the Child Welfare Foundation's booth. Please stop by and say hello. Grab some information or leave your information, and we'll mail it to you so you don't have to buy another suitcase to get everything home.

We want to make sure that you have the information that will help you to take back to your Detachment to make sure that other kids that we have not met yet have the same opportunity that those we are helping today have had.

With that, thank you again. We appreciate your generous support, and please stop by and say hello to us. Thank you.

Commander, my fellow NVCs, Distinguished Guests, SAL members, I've titled my report Our Journey. It starts out like this.

About two weeks before National

Convention in Phoenix, Arizona, I got a phone call

from National Vice Commander Ned Fox. Ned goes,

"Jack, we have a problem." I said, what's that?

He's like both of the members that we had that were running for National Vice Commander have had to back out for health/personal reasons. I said okay.

He says, you're the only one that we know of at this point that's ready for this job. I was like are you serious? I've had no training or anything.

Thus began our journey in Phoenix in 2021, when I was appointed membership chairman for the West.

You will notice that I started out with "our" to this report. That is because it's not something that I could do on my own. First off, I needed the full support of the western region, and more importantly, Sue, who happens to be the love of my life and to which I'm grateful is in my life every day, I asked her what she thought of me becoming the Membership Chairman for the West, and

she replied, "Dear, I will support you in whatever you want to do."

Thus began our journey to the position of the Sons of the American Legion as National Vice Commander.

Flash forward to being elected as your

National Vice Commander in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in

2022. Once elected and upon returning home to

Idaho, I began to gear up for The American Legion

Department of Idaho's Detachment district meetings,

where I went as an unofficial visitor.

I know not everyone is able to make it to the Detachment Convention or the Mid-Winter

Conference; therefore, I at least gave these folks an opportunity to visit with me and to let them know that I was approachable and reachable. In all, I made 8 of the 9 district meetings, and I missed the one because of illness and Fall NEC.

When I went back to the Fall NEC, we got all of our commission committee meeting updates for the SAL and also went to the Southern region get together for some camaraderie and great

conversation.

Once back in Idaho, I was approached to help with our district in the Department Oratorical Contest. It's still amazing to see these young folks in all their splendor as they perform their speeches with their outstanding knowledge of the U.S. Constitution.

During November we conduct Idaho's annual food drive for veterans homes, where we collect food and money for them. We now have four homes, and this program was started back in 1982 with Frank Dalton, who was the Department Commander at the time, and this was his Commander's Project.

During his tenure -- it has been going for 41 years now, and it has saved the homes of approximately \$1.2 million over that time frame.

Also, they've never had to purchase a potato, don't know why. Since his passing, it has become known as the Frank Dalton Memorial Food Convoy. As a matter of fact, I'm wearing one of his ties right now to commemorate this.

This is also a great time to get with

friends from across the state as they bring in food from their Posts and Squadrons. During the '22 food drive, I had the privilege of meeting our second leading candidate for The American Legion, Mr. James LaCoursiere from the Department of Connecticut, and I also want to mention that my wife started her Legion career in Moosup, Connecticut, which was his home Post.

My first visitation was to Idaho's
Mid-Winter Conference as their national guest. I
attended normal meetings and passed out information
from the national side. As you already heard
throughout this report, I have been working on
different things throughout Idaho on a routine
basis.

At the end of January, we in the West conducted Wild Willy's Western Rendezvous, aptly named after one of our own, Willy Williams, Past National Executive Committeeman out of Oregon. We get together in Las Vegas every year to promote camaraderie, build leadership skills, and hold other training as we see fit and desired within our

region.

This year we held "Be the One" training with Matt Wrobel, the Department Commander, as well as being a Past Detachment Commander for Idaho, and also our incoming SAL NEC, which is Charles "Abe" Abrahamson, and he's also our Department Commander.

Then we discussed how to make meetings with parliamentary procedure, and that was conducted by our very own National Vice Commander from the South, Mr. Ron Roberts. There was team building exercises used by the Boy Scouts, led by Past National Vice Commander Jim Stewart.

We had folks join us from across the country. This year was different because the Detachment and Department of Nevada had passed a resolution adopting the Rendezvous as their own program. This is a very large responsibility and one that I know is in very good hands, being led by Past National Vice Commander Jim Stewart.

We have seen this event grow over the past nine years, and we celebrate ten years in 2024. We will continue to see the growth within

the region, and our special guest is going to be Ginny Williams, Willie's wife.

My next excursion to be had was going to the Washington Conference, where I had laid a wreath at the Vietnam Wall, visited the Arlington National Cemetery, and watched The Old Guard as they stood their watch so meticulously over the tomb.

We also observed National Commander

Carlton lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown

Soldier. And I also visited the grave site of the most decorated soldier of World War II, Audie

Murphy. Went to the World War II Memorial. Once I realized I wanted to get a picture of all the Detachments in the region, I got all but two of them. Unfortunately, it was Arizona and Nevada, and I apologize.

With Nevada, the only problem with that was I had David Souza and PNC Jim Stewart with me. Sorry, guys.

There is so much to do in Washington, that it was impossible to scratch the surface

during our short time.

At the end of March, we traveled to
Indianapolis for Commander Carlton's Homecoming,
where the National Vice Commanders presented him
with gifts from us and the Detachment of Idaho
presented him with a bell, which was made from the
brass grommets of approximately 500 U.S. flags.
When the flags are destroyed, we take a ceremonial
portion of the ashes and we have permission to be
able to bury them at the Idaho State Veterans
Cemetery so that our fallen heroes that are buried
there can be among the U.S. flag ashes they so
desperately fought for.

We also repurpose the flag grommets to make a few bells to pass on to folks who would like to have a piece of the flag they fought for during their time in service but cannot always carry a flag with them at times, but they can always put a grommet in their pocket.

I made an unofficial visit to Oregon for the purposes of hand delivering an IRA pin. I met up with NEC Marc Chaney, Detachment Commander Rob

Liebenow and Detachment Adjutant Ward Allen, to whom the IRA pin was to go to.

We chatted about how everything was going in Oregon and how much it was appreciated how hard they were working to keep themselves ahead of the schedule that National had set up.

They also gave me a tour of their beautiful Milwaukie Post 180. While there it was mentioned they had a submarine museum in Portland. Then I found out it was the USS Blueback, which was one of the only non-nuclear ships I ever worked on during my 20-year career in the Navy. So, I had a tour it for old time's sake.

It was just as cramped now as it was then with one exception. There was a 10 foot by 10 foot hole cut into the side of the boat for your access. I missed not going up and down the ladder through the water tight hatch for one last time, not really! That was a no.

I also received news that Ginny Williams was hoping to see me at their Department

Convention, which happened to be the week before I

arrived. I called her to see if see wanted to meet up for a bit and we did. We had lunch, and she gave me a tour of La Pine Post 45, which is gorgeous. It was wonderful to be able to spend time with Past National Executive Committee Willy Williams' wife before heading back home to Idaho.

I traveled back to Indy for Spring NEC where we received updates from all committee and commissions and where I finally finished my three-year National Management Institute class that only took me five years to complete.

Chairman Monserud, I apologize for being a National Vice Commander going through the program, but I did start out as a Detachment Commander. I hate using this excuse, but COVID had something to do with it.

During Memorial Day we went to the Meridian Cemetery along with Scouting Troop 1 and we put out 700 flags on Veterans graves. It was very nice to have their assistance with this endeavor as we were able to share some knowledge to them about paying respects to our fallen heroes

along with the fact that our Post's namesake Lloyd E. Hutcheson, who is buried there, he was a WWI veteran.

I failed to mention that Troop 1 meets at our Post, so it was fitting they have knowledge of our Post's namesake. I went to Idaho Gem Boys State this year, as I have for the past few years where I had been a counselor during that time. As I was not going to be able to be there for the whole program I worked with the food service aspect this time around, because I had a visitation already set up in Nevada.

This is another amazing program The

American Legion has, and it absolutely amazes me to
see these young men come in all skittish and
nervous, and by the end of the first day when you
see them, they're starting to make friends.

They're breaking out of their shell.

At the end of this time frame, during that week, they find out that they've become part of something bigger than themselves, and they become lifelong friends. If you'll excuse me a

moment.

My visitation to Nevada as their National Guest was exceptional for many reasons but the first was where I had the great honor and privilege of meeting Medal of Honor Recipient Donald "Doc" Ballard, who is an amazing individual. It was amazing to listen to him speak to The Legion Family as well as to the Nevada Boys State delegation.

It was also enjoyable chatting with him outside of the professional setting. During that time, we went to several museums, the Nevada State Museum and US Mint in Carson City, and we made a trek up to Virginia City, where we found a lot of memorabilia about the TV series Bonanza.

These were amazing tours. PNVC Jim

Stewart and David Sousa were our tour guides and

Dave was our chauffeur.

I wish to thank The American Legion

Department of Nevada, the Sons, and the American

Legion Auxiliary for their generous hospitality. I

would also like to thank Jim's wife, Barbara

Stewart, for all of her hard work.

The Department Commander at the time was Valerie Scheuering-Hubbell, whom I met at American Legion College where we were in the graduating class of 2017. So, this visitation was even more reminiscent of coming home to visit your family. Thank you, Nevada.

I also visited the Detachment of Wyoming for Christmas in July at the State Veterans Home in Buffalo.

And it was an absolute honor to be there.

I was working with Det. CDR. Donovan Dusel,

Detachment Adjutant Jim Anderson, as well as Don

Sillivan, who is the SAL District Coordinator for

the Northeast. I also met Douglas Johnson, the

Department Commander for The American Legion for

Wyoming, and he was very interesting to chat with.

We went and helped the veterans do some fishing, as well as we helped clean up the property before enjoying a great lunch served by the veterans home staff.

By the way, the veterans home is surrounded by cattle pastures, and I thought that

was awe some as it reminded me of the upbringing I had where my school had cattle pastures surrounding it and I grew up in New York!

I had the honor of meeting Pedro, who was a carpenter back in World War II, and he was the oldest living veteran at the home. He was 102 years young.

There were also a father/son living at the home as well, which I thought was intriguing. While there, I handed out flag grommets to those who wanted one as everyone cannot carry around the flag, they defended but they can carry around a portion of the flag with them by putting a grommet in their pocket.

During lunch, I was asked to assist Det. CDR. Donovan Dusel along with the Det. Sr. Vice CDR. Levi Dusel, which is his brother, handed out prize money to the folks who went fishing.

I also had the privilege of meeting PNVC Charlie Keith, who is an outstanding individual with a great sense of humor. It was very enjoyable to be with and listen to the ALA talk about all

that they do.

I also informed them they need to get this information out to the public. It is just like the Sons: We do, but we do not let people know what we do because we are not looking for the accolades, just helping our veterans and our communities.

All the while I was visiting Wyoming, my counterpart from The American Legion, National Vice Commander Doug Uhrig, who is from Wyoming was visiting in Idaho. I am sure he had a great time there. Thank you, Wyoming.

I would also like to congratulate Post 6 out of Cheyenne, Wyoming for being the very first American Legion Baseball team to go to the American Legion World Series from Wyoming. Good on you.

Western Region arrived at the National Convention at 105 percent, with all Detachments at 100 percent or higher. Plus, we were part of the SAL's all-time high.

If that is not making a statement, then I

don't know what is. In Charlotte at 105% with all Detachments at 100% or higher. At this time, I would like the Western Region to stand and be recognized.

I salute you for your hard work and efforts. Thank you very much. You may be seated. I thank you from the bottom of my heart for all the hard work and dedication to the SAL.

You are the epitome of what being an SAL member represents. We made great strides with membership during the last two years. If you want to know what it means to make a difference, look at our accomplishments.

A very special thanks go out to the following folks: Commander Carlton, my fellow NVCs, Membership Chairman Thom Skelley, Headquarters staff Brian Compton and SAL liaison Kevin Mook, the Western Region and my mentors, Jim Stewart, Ned Fox, and Ed Cleary.

It has been a privilege and an honor working with you these past two years. The memories that have been made will be cherished for

the rest of my life. The biggest thank you goes to Sue, without whose support these past two years would not have been possible. I love you, dear.

Before I go, I would like to leave you with Medal of Honor Recipient, Doc Ballard's inspirational quote: Seek to understand, then to be understood. Keep a win-win attitude and the world would be a better place. Thank you very much.

... Applause.

As a delegate to this 51st National Convention, I make a motion to adopt my report.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: There's a motion on the floor to accept National Vice

Commander Jack Young's report. Is there a second?

MICHAEL VOZAR (IL): Second. Illinois.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: Could you repeat your name, please?

MICHAEL VOZAR (IL): Michael Vozar, Illinois.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: There's a motion, and it's been seconded.

Is there any discussion?

All those in favor, say aye. All those opposed, say nay.

... Gavel.

Motion carries.

At this time, I will ask Mr. DeFeo to please come back up. It was brought to our attention that his report needs to be approved.

STEPHEN J. DEFEO (IN): As a delegate to the Convention, I ask that the report for the historian's report be accepted. I'm making a motion for that.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: There's a motion on the floor to accept the historian's report. Is there a second?

GREG SPAULDING (ID): Greg Spaulding, NEC Indiana, makes the second.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: The motion has been seconded. Is there any discussion?

Oh, sorry. Same Detachment cannot second the motion.

Can we have another second?

RANDY CURRY (KY): Commander, Randy

Curry, NEC Kentucky, seconds that motion.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: Thank you. Now we have a proper seconding.

Is there any discussion?

All those in favor, say aye. All those opposed, nay.

Ayes have it. Thank you.

Now at this time, will Bill Towns please approach.

WILLIAM TOWNS (OH): Three years ago,
Mike come up and asked me if I would make a
scrapbook and be his historian. Quite an honor to
be asked.

But then it turned into COVID, and it became a project, but we took it on.

One of the things we did, since we couldn't travel, there was a lot of video things done, and we got a lot of information from that.

Some of the visitations he was able to make, I was able to reach out to the Detachments that he was visiting and have someone there send me pictures. So, he not only has a scrapbook of his

year as a commander, but he also has a scrapbook that contains two years of travel as a candidate. We've been putting this together.

Also, a year ago we gave him a small pamphlet of -- here's the pictures of the events along the way, just to kind of tease what's coming up.

I was able to put this together. I enjoyed the time and things we had to put it in there with. Again, I want to make sure that each Detachment is thanked for their participation in this because it's easy to take pictures here. It's hard to get pictures of the commander when he's traveling. So, it was a great opportunity for people to get in touch with us and get things out there.

Along with his book, I put a section in the back for Past National Commanders to sign and leave greetings to him. If I did not get to you, see Mike if you want to sign it. I got the ones that I ran into. If there's others out there who would like to sign this, we can do it.

Inside his book is pictures of every Past
National Commander, pictures of every committee and
commission that served with him, his Vice
Commanders, and visitations to all the Detachments
he went to. Across the pond, when he went over to
Europe, and some kickoff photos and events that
happened and pictures from Flying Flags for Heroes.

There's one thing I do want to show you is -- I dare you to call this a scrapbook.

Mr. Commander, I'd like to present you the book that we put together for you, and I would also like to say that a second copy was made and will be in the archives for future reference.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: At this time, I will call on Jim Coates for the National Veterans Employment & Education report and awards.

On deck, the National Americanism Committee report and awards.

At this time, I will yield the podium to National Vice Commander Jack Youngs.

ORAL REPORT AND AWARDS

National Veterans Employment & Education James M. Coates (NY), Chairman

First of all, I'd like to introduce my commission. We've got Bruno Williamson. Bruno, are you out there?

And Fred Vaccarella from Virginia. Is Fred out there?

Okay, great. And Jim Martin. Jim Martin from Indiana. There he is right over there. And Bill Stem from Maryland.

I want to tell you all that being chairman of the VE&E Commission has been a tremendous challenge for me this year, but it's also been a great experience. I've accomplished a lot, and I have these guys to thank for it primarily. If we could give these guys a hand, I would appreciate it.

I also want to thank our NEC liaisons and the support staff that we have. Without them, there's a number of things that we've been working on that we wouldn't have gotten anywhere with. So, I want to thank them and give them a hand as well.

The work that we've done in the VE&E

Commission for the past year has been based on four

goals. The first goal we had was to work on

documentation and creation of a trifold brochure.

We had other documents that we're working on and continue to work on. I'm very happy to say that the trifold brochure is completed now, and it has been accepted for distribution by the NEC on voting to approve the resolution that we created for it.

Now, the trifold brochure, we also have 500 more copies that the staff has been kind enough to print up for us here. So, we're going to figure out a way to get those down here tomorrow so we can distribute those to everybody.

The second goal we have is to support The

American Legion's "Be the One" program and work

with the VA to gain access and supports for

materials they have with regarding the SAVE Program

and the ETSSP program, which is the Exiting the

Term of Service for Veterans and Sponsorship

Program that's been developed so they can provide

service members, as they go into a community, they have somebody, a member of the community that knows the community well that can befriend that servicemember and help them answer those questions that can drive you nuts when you're moving into a new community, you know, about the doctors and the schools and all the incidentals you need to know.

Our second goal was supporting The

American Legion's "Be the One" program and work

with the VA to gain access to support the SAVE

Program and the ETSSP.

Then our last goal that we have is establishing relationships with the Veterans Employment & Education Commission and committees within The American Legion, the National VE&E Commission, Departments, Detachments, Districts, Counties, and Squadrons.

We were able to attend the mid-winter conference this year. We attended The American Legion's Veterans Employment & Education Commission meetings, and we got a lot of information that they crammed into two days, where we learned a lot about

what was going on as far as veteran credentialing when they get out of the service. Also, the SAVE program and the ETSSP program and how that is implemented.

Well, I want to move on and also say that the other thing the commission has been continuing to work on is getting the Marvin Nay Award winner chosen.

And this year now -- because our Marvin
Nay Award winner could not attend, I've asked Fred
to come up and join me. Fred is from his Squadron.
Fred is here to collect the award in his honor and
then take it home and present it to him there.

Our recipient for the Marvin P. Nay
Outstanding Contributor Award this year, for 2023,
is Evan Glendinning, a proud Navy veteran,
Legionnaire, member of the Sons of the American
Legion, Norfolk Squadron 327.

Evan gets his eligibility through his grandfather who served in World War II and Korea and has been a Legionnaire for 11 years and a member of the SAL for four years.

He is currently a schoolteacher, Post adjutant, Squadron historian, Squadron VE&E chairman, and was re-appointed in March of 2023 as the Detachment of Virginia Veterans Employment & Education Commission chairman.

Evan also serves as the VAVS deputy representative at the Hampton VA Medical Center. Evan volunteered 155 hours working to sponsor two job fairs in 2022 and two education fairs in 2022 and '23. Two organizations, Tech for Troops and Hampton Roads Workforce Council, were two of the organizations there specializing in issues that affect our veterans.

Evan has raised \$10,117 in donations to help veterans and active duty and enlisted members of our military. Funds went to the Habitat for Humanity where the funds were used for a home for a displaced veteran and members of his family.

The Link of Hampton Roads, Navy SEAL

Foundation, Tech for Troops, Judeo-Christian

Outreach Center for Homeless Sheltering, Food Bank

of Southeastern Virginia, and Armed Services YMCA.

On Evan's proposal, his Squadron donated \$1,200 earmarked to the VE&E homeless with funds also used for haircuts, transportation, and job interviews and ID cards. This year we present the Marvin P. Nay award to Evan Glendinning. Do we have that here?

... Applause.

FRED VACCARELLA (VA): Evan asked me to speak to you all and tell you that he didn't really earn this award, the Detachment of Virginia earned it. He's a schoolteacher. He's in school on Monday. He's in all the teacher courses planning and schools, teachers meetings, et cetera.

Here again, he thanks you for this award.

It's because of you all in the Detachment of

Virginia and throughout the whole organization that

people like this can get this kind of award for all

of our veterans. Thank you very much.

The National Commander has given me also the distinguished award, the Distinguished Guest award, to present to Evan. I won't wear it for him, but I'll give it to him when I get back to

Norfolk. Thank you very much.

... Applause.

As a delegate, I'd like to make a motion to accept my report.

NVC JACK YOUNGS: I have a motion on the floor to accept the National Veterans Commission Report. Is there a second?

DAVID BOGGS (VA): Second, David Boggs from Virginia.

NVC JACK YOUNGS: David Boggs from Virginia seconds. The motion has been seconded by David Boggs from Virginia.

Is there any discussion?

All in favor, say aye.

Opposed, nay.

Ayes have it. Motion passes.

At this time, I call on Chris Casey

for the National Convention Americanism

Committee report and awards. On deck: National

Vice Commander David Mennel and National Vice

Commander -- am I last?

ORAL REPORT AND AWARDS

National Convention Americanism Committee Chris Casey (NE), Cmte. Chair

Good afternoon. I've got nine pages.

No. Just kidding. They are 24-point font.

National Officers, Chairmen, Committeemen, Past

National Commanders, Legionnaires, guests, the

Americanism Convention Committee meeting was called to order earlier this morning.

I'd like to thank all the commission members for their willingness to dedicate their time for the betterment of our organization.

Vice Chairman Gerald Hammerschmidt of Kansas; Paul Hayes of Illinois; Joseph Lohman, Maryland; Robert "Bud" Neel, Nebraska; and Keith Murdough, New Hampshire.

I'd also like to thank the previous

Americanism chairmen for their assistance

throughout this first year of my chairmanship.

They've been a tremendous help to the commission.

This morning, the room was nearly full.

Far more people than from my list showed up, and
that's great for the commission, for the convention

committee to do our work.

The combined Americanism accomplishments for this year are really kind of extraordinary and something to celebrate.

The donations for Americanism programs for 2022-2023 totaled \$3,493,375. That's an increase of 1.18 million over the previous year. So, congratulations to all of our members.

The hours donated were 1,732,019. And those hours value just over \$55 million.

... Applause.

So, the Sons of the American Legion continue to set a high bar. The commission obviously had goals that we worked on this year and you, gentlemen, all know those at this point in the year.

As of today, I can report that we've had flag placements registered on Flying Flags for Heroes in the amount of 1,014,824 flags.

... Applause.

So, the CSR totals from across

Americanism -- and there's a lot of them -- they

show growth across the board and everyone should be congratulated for their hard work across the country.

We had a resolution out of the Americanism Commission that will come in front of the convention. That resolution is to donate \$250,000.00 to the Veterans and Children Foundation from the SAL Reserve Fund.

The committee moved forward with judging history and scrapbooks, which I know at this point that the National Historian actually provided the scrapbook award winners, but as a commission, the scrapbook is something that the Americanism Commission oversees, and I just want to personally thank everyone who submitted books this year on behalf of the Commission, for the work that you did.

You know, we do -- like the historian mentioned -- we need more of those books. It's really kind of tremendous.

My first time as part of the process overseeing the scoring, there's some great stuff

that's being put forth from Squadrons and Districts and Detachments, and we just need to continue to build on that and get more people comfortable with providing those books.

We had a special guest, trailing candidate Joseph Navarrete, who is actually one of those past Americanism chairmen that I thanked. He provided words.

We'll keep the rest of this all on awards, and I know that's what you're waiting for at this point. Americanism has a lot of them.

So, we want to make sure that we recognize those who have excelled in Americanism this last program year.

Would a representative from the following Detachments, please make your way to the stage.

We'll start out with the Atwood-Beyea-York Memorial Award.

Atwood-Beyea-York Memorial Award

Those are representatives from Virginia,
Pennsylvania, Delaware, Ohio. I had nice pictures
of the gentlemen for the Memorial Award ready to

go. We'll pass through that. Next year I'll make sure that we have those pictures up because I think it's important that we just don't talk about these memorial awards and not state who these people were. And it's very important. These were our brothers.

So, I'm going to read you a little bit about Atwood, Beyea and York.

So, Gerald Atwood was a member of Sons of the American Legion Squadron 160, Brooklyn, New York.

Gerald was a New York City firefighter assigned to Ladder 21 and was among hundreds of firemen killed after responding to the World Trade Center on that fateful day.

Gerald was an eight-year veteran of the FDNY working out of Hell's Kitchen.

He grew up in the old mill basin neighborhood of Brooklyn, graduating from South Shore High School and spent two years at Kingsborough Community College.

Edward Beyea was a life member of the

Sons of the American Legion Squadron 173 in Bath,
New York, and worked as a computer programmer for
Empire Blue Cross/Blue Shield in the World Trade
Center.

Mr. Beyea needed full-time care for the last 21 years of his life ever since a diving accident left him a quadriplegic.

He refused to be limited by his disability and learned how to type using a stick that he operated with his mouth. Mr. Beyea, along with friend and colleague Abe Zelmanowitz, who refused to leave Mr. Beyea's side after the terror attack, waited together — think about that. He stayed right by his side — waited together on the 27th floor for the rescue workers who could not get there in time.

Raymond York was a member of the Broad Channel Sons of the American Legion Squadron 1404, where he held the officer of Third Vice Commander.

One of New York's bravest, he gave his life on September 11th, 2001 while attempting to save his fellow citizens during the terrorist

attack on the World Trade Center.

A veteran firefighter with Engine Company 285 in Queens, Mr. York had been assigned to light duty from an on-the-job injury.

On 9/11, he was playing the role of Fireman Ray in a fire safety show at Rockefeller Center. He made his way to the burning towers by hitching a ride with a television truck and an ambulance.

His remains were found the next day on West Street. Raymond York, who had worked with the FDNY for 20 years, planned to retire at the end of 2001.

To quote a passage quickly from Gerald Atwood's eulogy. "After all is said and done, it is not how or where we finish our journey that champions our greatness, it's how we live."

WHEREAS, in the 1970's, a Sons of The American Legion Liability Account (now called the Sons of The American Legion Reserve Fund) was established as a restricted fund for use in the event of emergencies such as membership decline, etc., and temporary funds were needed to meet expenses;

And WHEREAS, the National Executive

Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana on October

11-12, 2017 by NEC Resolution No. 4 established a ceiling of \$750,000 (with a variance of +/- 1.5%)

for the Sons of The American Legion Reserve Fund for each budget year ending in the month of

December to be reviewed annually by the Internal Affairs Commission of The American Legion at the Spring meetings for adequacy and from a fiscal management viewpoint;

And WHEREAS, Resolution No. 4 adopted at the Fall, 2017 meeting of The American Legion

National Executive Committee further empowers the Sons of The American Legion to request permission to transfer funds from the Sons of The American

Legion Reserve Fund to any approved charity that supports America's veterans and youth with the approval and consent of both the Internal Affairs

Commission and the Finance Commission of The American Legion;

And WHEREAS, The Sons of The American

Legion Reserve Fund is presently over the variance

established;

Now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, by the Sons of The American Legion in Annual Convention assembled in Charlotte, North Carolina on August 25-27, 2023, that the Sons of The American Legion hereby approves the donation of \$250,000.00 from

the Sons of The American Legion Reserve Fund to The American Legion Veterans and Children Foundation

And be it further RESOLVED, that the Sons of The American Legion hereby recommends to the Internal Affairs Commission of The American Legion that said funds be distributed from the Sons of The American Legion Reserve Fund.

The committee voted to approve the resolution and present it to the body for consideration.

As a Delegate to this 51st National Convention, I make a motion to adopt SAL Resolution 2 - National Convention 2023.

ROBERT "BOB" MANZO (MD): Mr. Commander,
Bob Manzo, NEC, Maryland, I second the motion.

NVC JACK YOUNGS: The motion has been seconded by Mr. Manzo out of the Detachment of Maryland.

Is there any discussion?

NVC RONALD ROBERTS: Ron Roberts, NVC, also, a delegate to this convention. I'm wondering if we can have a report of what the total is left

in the reserve fund.

WILLIAM HILL (MD): Is that being asked under the convention? Is this a convention resolution, or is that being asked as part of the National Finance Commission?

Because the resolution currently up there has not been presented as part of the National Convention's Finance Committee's report and approval. So that resolution that's in place right now would be pending approval from the National Finance Committee from the convention, correct?

NVC JACK YOUNGS: Is the question balance pending?

WILLIAM HILL (MD): Understood the question. I'm asking a question on the resolution first. The resolution is a convention committee -- convention resolution, correct?

NVC JACK YOUNGS: That is correct.

WILLIAM HILL (MD): Therefore, the

Finance Committee for the convention has not

provided their final report. So therefore, the

report that you're asking about is still pending

the approval of the Convention Finance Committee, correct?

NVC JACK YOUNGS: Correct.

WILLIAM HILL (MD): So, at that time, with approval -- I mean, short of this is I can give the answer, yes, there are appropriate funds within the restricted reserve to provide that amount of money.

questions, one on the motion itself, clarification
of why we don't give more funds and take that,
distribute it elsewhere. That is purely due to
resolutions. That is based on a resolution.

Bring a resolution forward for consideration for additional funds, distributions

out of that and it will be considered.

It's no more than that. Gentlemen, I'm not trying to be rude about it. Bring a resolution forward of interest to have that done.

It can be done and discussed, just like we're discussing this one.

Commander, no disrespect. I was giving the short answer on that.

The second part of that, this resolution, for my opinion -- I'll go back to the parliamentarian on this just for clarity -- can be approved pending the final Finance Committee Report of Convention, which is tomorrow. At that time, when it comes forward what the outcome was with the Finance Committee, the two are married together, and they move forward. That's the only action pending at this time, from my understanding.

NATIONAL CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Harold Thompson Jr. (NE), Credentials Committee Chairman

Good morning. Chairman Harold Thompson called the Credentials Convention Committee to order on August 25th, 2023 at 11:00 a.m. for the purpose of taking the necessary committee action on convention resolution. None was presented.

There was a possible of 898 delegates,

100 delegates at large, for a total of 998 possible

delegate votes from 53 Detachments.

On Friday, we had 51 Detachments registered with 990 delegates, 22 alternates and 108 quests.

We have two Detachments that have not registered and they're District of Columbia and the Philippines as of Friday, noon.

One change this year, when The American

Legion Judge Advocate went through and brought all

constitution and bylaws up to date with The

American Legion according to a Resolution No. 28

from May the 5th to 6th of 1938, there were several

changes made and approved by The American Legion National Executive Committee on October 2022.

One change was in the constitution,
Article VII, National Executive Committee,
Section 3, which reads:

Members of the National Executive

Committee shall be delegates to the National

Convention with a vote, which vote shall be

exercised with respective Detachment, except that

the National Commander shall be exercised only in

their capacity as a chair of the National

Convention.

Also, American Legion National Executive
Committee on May 4th and 5th, 2022 had a Resolution
No. 8, National Convention registration fees.

The resolution said to raise the registration fee by \$10, which raised it from 25 to \$35.

Administrative updates for the year.

Last year, we've had one last NFC meeting in July to reconcile 2023 budget, which we're on track. We see no material differences or changes to the budget.

Now on to our meeting for yesterday. Our convention meeting.

Good morning, comrades, brothers, my family. What a year we have had. Put out a

challenge at the beginning of the year to arrive at 105. We didn't quite make that.

We did, however, hit an all-time high for membership in the Sons of the American Legion.

Give yourselves a hand for that. 376,154 members.

We took a 21,000-member hit during COVID.

Not only have we made up those numbers, we've succeeded in exceeding those numbers. We have 19 Detachments. Let me say that again. 19

Detachments that are over 105 percent this year.

Absolutely. We have 39 Detachments that surpassed their 100 percent. Fantastic job.

Did a lot of work this year. A humble group, but I do want to thank Casey Hanson, Daryl

VerStreate, the regional chairs, Robert
Bristo and Terry Harris. Linwood Moore, John Cook
and Jim Fischer, as well as our National Vice
Commanders.

They didn't make it easy, but they made

it fun, and that's what we did. We had a lot of fun and we set a lot of records.

Membership did meet yesterday. We had a resolution to present to the Convention. No:

SAL Resolution 1 - National Convention, 2023.

Title: Amend the 105 percent of membership criteria and presentation details for the Triple Nickel Award.

WHEREAS, the Sons of The American Legion is a program of The American Legion comprised of male descendants of Veterans;

And WHEREAS, membership is the lifeblood of the organization;

And WHEREAS, various Detachments work extremely hard in attaining membership goals through the use of Membership Committees;

And WHEREAS, the Detachment should be recognized for their untiring efforts;

And WHEREAS, new Charters, membership renewals, and percentage targets are in the forefront of the membership success;

And WHEREAS, the National Executive

Committee of the Sons of The American Legion

adopted Resolution NEC 1-F09 during its session on

October 10-11, 2009 to create the Triple Nickel

Membership Incentive Award;

And WHEREAS, there is some ambiguity in the original resolution with regard to the determination of the 105 percent membership achievement and the presentation of the award; now, therefore,

Be it RESOLVED, by the Sons of The American Legion in Annual Convention assembled in Charlotte, North Carolina on August 25-27, 2023, that the Sons of The American Legion hereby amends the criteria for qualifying for the Triple Nickel Membership Incentive Award to:

Read as follows: Five new charters with membership transmitted. 105 percent membership over the previous year as determined by the December 31st Final National Membership Report for the previous membership year, e.g., for the 2023 Triple Nickel Award, the 105 percent goal will be

based on the December 31, 2022 Final National
Membership Report. 85 percent renewal rate, all by
July 1st;

And be it further RESOLVED, that any
Detachment that meets the above criteria will be
awarded an Emblem Sales Gift Certificate in the
amount of \$555.00 to be used at the discretion of
the Detachment;

And be it further RESOLVED, that this award will begin with the 2024 membership year and shall be presented annually at each National Convention;

And be it finally RESOLVED, that Sons of The American Legion Resolution NEC 1-F09 is hereby rescinded.

Membership did pass this. It was brought before the NEC, to the body to vote, to the Convention to vote.

that award goes to Detachment of Wisconsin who

chartered 10 new Squadrons.

Largest Squadron Award - Squadron with the most paid members for the prior year as of December 31st of that year. Here's a shocker, guys, I'm glad everyone's sitting down. With 1,749 members, Squadron No. 291 - Newport Harbor, Newport Beach, California.

Highest Renewal Percentage Award by

Detachment with a minimum of 200 members as of

December 31st from the previous year, from the

central, Detachment of Michigan, 91.62 percent.

- 2. Midwest, Nebraska, 90.97 percent.
- 3. East, Pennsylvania, 90.56 percent.
- ... Applause.
- 4. South, Detachment of Georgia, 88.70 percent.

And finally, from the West, California, with a renewal percentage of 83.30 percent.

I'm proud to present, with five new Squadrons, 90 percent of membership and 116 percent of goal, Detachment of South Dakota.

With 107 percent of goal, five new Squadrons and an 88 percent renewal rate,
Detachment of Georgia.

... Applause.

With 106 percent of goal, five new Squadrons and a 91 percent renewal rate, Detachment of Michigan.

... Applause.

I announced a few minutes ago that we had four. Unfortunately, one of the Detachments that earned this award is under suspension. I was asked not to read them at this time. So that concludes the report.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: I had them stay up on stage because, gentlemen, the one thing that's not easy is membership. I think we all can agree that you may pay your dues but how do you get

that next guy to pay your dues?

And in order to receive a Triple Nickel the amount of work you need to put into it being over 85 percent, reaching 85 percent in retention, being 105 percent overall and then starting five new Squadrons, that is a lot. So, at this time I'd like to make all of you Distinguished Guests to the 51st National Convention.

I was in Michigan, they were at 102 percent at their convention. They ended up being 107 percent.

THOMAS SKELLEY (TX): As a Delegate to this 51st National Convention, I make a motion to accept the Membership report.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: There's been a motion on the floor to accept the membership report. Is there a second.

JUAN CRUZ-RODRIGUEZ (PR): Juan Cruz, NEC, Detachment of Puerto Rico, second.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: There's been a motion and a second. Is there any discussion?

Hearing none --

MARC CHANEY (OR): Commander, back in the back of room.

Marc Chaney, NEC from Oregon, didn't we have a resolution with his report? Are we accepting this with or without the resolution?

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: The resolution that was presented earlier was voted on and passed.

THOMAS SKELLEY (TX): So, folks, outside the report, we do have two special presentations to make today. We have a --

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: No, we haven't voted on it. There's a motion on the floor.

THOMAS SKELLEY (TX): I'm sorry.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: I'm sorry, minus the resolution, I'm being told. I thought it was passed. Minus the resolution.

I thought it was -- is there any more

discussion? They're trying to confuse me.

Hearing none, all those in favor say aye.

All those opposed say nay. Ayes have it.

Motion carries.

THOMAS SKELLEY (TX): Nothing ever goes perfect, does it? Just how we planned it, though.

Could we have a representative from the Detachment of Maine up to the stage, please? While we're waiting on that, guys, we did this last year as an official competition, the Chairman's Cup as a challenge between the Vice Commanders.

Didn't necessarily do it this year in the same way, but they all succeeded tremendously.

Every region was over 100 percent. But there was cream that rose to the top. 105 percent of goal, each Detachment in their region at 100 percent.

So, it is my pleasure to present this unofficial Chairman's Cup to National Vice Commander of the West, Jack Youngs, and to Regional Membership Chair Jim Fischer.

That was an awesome thing you guys did this year

Thomas W. Cole Squadron 0019, from Sanford, Maine, we have this award to them.

As a representative, Don Allisot from Maine, come out and accept this, please. 90 years continuous service.

And the plaque: In special recognition to Thomas W. Cole Squadron 0019, Sanford, Maine, is hereby officially recognized as the oldest active chartered Squadron celebrating 90 years of service to the Sons of the American Legion, chartered on August 18th, 1933.

Maine. I had it all set up for a representative
from the Squadron to come today, but last Saturday
I found out that Paul LaRue's daughter, child, was
diagnosed with leukemia. So, they had to stay
home

to take care of the 6-year-old granddaughter.

So, your prayers would be greatly appreciated. Hope for a speedy recovery. Thank you.

At this time, I will yield the podium to

National Vice Commander Dave Mennel.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: At this time, I call Seth Rippe for the National Veterans Affairs Rehabilitation Committee report and awards.

PRESENTATION

NATIONAL Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Awards Seth Rippe (NE), Chairman National Convention VA&R Committee

Thank you, sir. National Commander, Past National Commanders, Legionnaires, and fellow Sons, thank you for being here. It's great to see all of you.

I'd like to start by recognizing the VA&R Commission for their work this year. Gabe Cinquegrana of New York, Eddy Seegers, Jr., from Texas, Buster Sutterlin from Ohio, Nick Arceo from Colorado. In addition to these members, I'd also like to recognize and thank our NEC liaisons, Mr. Ray, Mr. Lang, and Mr. Phillips. Thank you, gentlemen.

... Applause.

The VA&R Commission has been promoting our parent organization's Be the One campaign this

year. You heard about it yesterday. You heard Commander Troiola speak about it. You heard our VE&E chairman Mr. Coates speak about it. It truly has been a focus of this organization.

This program aims to destigmatize asking for mental health support, providing peer-to-peer support and resources, providing FDA approved therapeutics to those in need. Too often our veterans fear asking for help, or they believe they can handle the situation on their own. It's their family and those closest to them, you, who often recognize the signs.

We're encouraging our members to Be the

One. Be the One to ask that veteran in your life
how they're doing. When they need to talk, listen.

When you see evidence that they're struggling, be
there.

During our regional calls, we have been encouraging individuals to make sure their Squadron educates its members and the community, presents resources in their Post, especially the national crisis hot line, and share events and stories of

success. Together we can make a difference.

The VA&R Commission has also been urging Squadrons to make a donation to the Veterans & Children Foundation to support Commander Troiola's goal of \$2 million this year.

They feed and house children of military personnel and veterans facing urgent, unexpected hardships. It prevents eviction, keeps the power on, and fulfills basic needs to hold the family together through difficult times. The Foundation relies entirely on charitable donations and needs an estimated \$25 million to be sustainable through the future.

The VA&R Commission also recognized we had a barrier to serving our veterans. We are struggling to get certified reps in our VA facilities. The Sons applicants were being certified through The American Legion, a process that was prone to delays in the approval.

That delay then in turn caused frustration for our applicants, lack of volunteers in our VA homes, and had put the Sons dangerously

close to not meeting the minimum requirement to maintain participation in the VA/VS Executive Council.

A year ago in Milwaukee, I promised you that we would improve this process for our members, but more importantly, for our veterans. A couple of months later we drafted a resolution and put it before the Fall NEC to have the Sons of the American Legion reps and deps certified by the Sons National VA Representative.

Since the passing of that resolution and the dissemination of the process, we have seen a significant uptick in the number of certified individuals. Thank you.

But these goals don't even begin to tell the whole story of what you did for our veterans this year. You contributed nearly \$1.5 million in VA programs and approximately 900,000 hours of service to our veterans. Thank you.

Now, on to our awards. In 1977 at the 6th Annual Convention of the Sons of the American

Legion, that was the first time that the Kepler, O'Brian, and Webster awards were presented to the Squadron, District, and Detachment with the best VA&R reports.

I'd like to recognize Earl E. Mitchell Squadron No. 29 - Glendale, Arizona, as the winner of the Kirby Memorial Award for Best Squadron VA&R report.

This year, the Allen I. O'Brian for the Best District VA&R award goes to District 5, Ohio.

And finally, the Earl Webster Memorial

Award for Best Detachment VA&R award is a tie this

year between the Detachments of Ohio and Delaware.

While we're waiting for those award winners to make their way up here, I wanted to start by thanking the nearly 30 members that came to our VA&R meeting yesterday. We had a great meeting.

I'm always revitalized after talking to a group of individuals like this. You truly inspire

me. So, thank you guys for what you do for our veterans.

Is there a representative from Arizona who could come and accept this award?

In 1991 Charles B. Rigsby was elected National Commander at the 22nd National Convention of the Sons of the American Legion. The following year, the organization was saddened by the passing of our immediate Past National Commander Rigsby.

At the next spring committee, a resolution was presented and approved to rename the National Volunteer of the Year Award to the Charles B. Rigsby National Volunteer of the Year Award in his honor for his many years of service to our veterans programs at the VA medical centers. This was truly his passion.

Before I announce this year's winner, I would like all the previous Rigsby winners to please stand and be recognized.

Thank you, gentlemen, for your continued

service to our veterans.

Now, without further ado, this year's Rigsby Award winner volunteered more than 400 hours of service to our veterans. It is my sincere honor to announce to you that this year's recipient of the Charles B. Rigsby VA Volunteer of the Year Award goes to Kevin Robinson, Squadron 33, Detachment of Alaska. Kevin, come on up.

Kevin, I'll have to get your cover size from you. We do not have your new cover with us, but I know that you'll wear it with pride.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: It's my privilege to make you honorary member of our 51st National Convention.

SETH RIPPE (NE): Thanks again, Kevin, for all you do.

As a Delegate to this 51st National Convention, I make a motion to accept the National Convention VA&R Committee Report.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: We have a motion on the floor to accept his report. Do I hear a

second?

JEFF EVERMAN (IN): Mr. Chairman, Jeff Everman, Detachment of Indiana, seconds.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: We have a motion and duly seconded. Do we have any discussion? Hearing none, the motion is passed. Thank you, sir.

At this time, I relinquish the podium back to Commander Chris. I'm sorry.

All in favor of the motion, say aye. Opposed, say nay.

Now the motion passed.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: At this time, I'd like to make our Chairman Seth Rippe of Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation a Distinguished Guest to our 51st National Convention.

"What a true honor this is," said

American Legion Auxiliary 2022-2023 National

President Vickie Koutz during her installation

speech at the 2022 National Convention in

Milwaukee. Koutz is the third American Legion

Auxiliary member to serve as National President for

the Department of Indiana.

The previous national president, Alice Galka, served during the 1988-1989 administrative year.

Humble, kind, and considerate, Koutz puts others ahead of herself, truly living the American Legion Auxiliary motto of "Service Not Self."

Koutz grew up in Boonville in southwestern Indiana, a town with a population of about 6,500, and has lived there her whole life.

Koutz has been married to Jim for 50 years, and they have a son, Michael. He spoke on stage at convention about his mother during the installation of officers ceremony.

"The day is finally here, and we are so proud of her," he said. "I know my mom will accomplish a lot this next year. I encourage you to break out of your comfort zone."

For Koutz, the getting out of her comfort zone list includes trying new foods, public speaking, and traveling alone, even though she has gotten well at public speaking.

All which Michael is confident she will do successfully during her term as National President.

For the 2022-2023 American Legion

Auxiliary year, Koutz's focus is to honor our

separate hotel room if needed for non-family member

companions.

Koutz is also working to raise awareness on our country's Prisoners of War and Missing in Action. Her husband, Jim, returned to Vietnam years later after serving overseas to help dig for remains, and since then, wears a POW bracelet all the time.

"Listening to him talking about his experiences made me realize how important it still is today."

NVC DAVID MENNEL: I do have a donation here I need to make. I thought my phone was totally shut off, but for some reason my text messages didn't shut the sound off.

The Commander sat at my chair. Guess what happened? I'm donating \$40 to the Commander's special project, Veterans & Children Foundation.

At this time, I call on Bill Clancy for the National Convention Internal Affairs Committee Report. On deck, the National Convention

Legislative and Rules Committee.

ORAL REPORT

National Convention Internal Affairs Committee William Clancy, III (NY), Chairman

Fellow Sons, honored guests, members of the American Legion Family, good morning. It felt like you were sitting under the stars with the lights behind here. It's fantastic.

Today my report was preceded by reports from Member Training and Development with Chairman Mike Monserud, Membership with Chairman Tom Skelley, and yesterday Convention with Christopher Byrd. Wonderful reports, amazing accomplishments. Those three committees report to IA.

So, I wanted to thank those committees and their chairmen, not just for their hard work, but also for their friendship and their sense of fun.

Each of those three guys are wonderful leaders, and being part of their team was just a pleasure this past year.

The Internal Affairs meeting yesterday was very well attended. It was standing room only.

We opened the meeting. I introduced the members of

the IA Committee from the past year who were

Mr. Ken Sutton from California, Dickey Huntley from

Maine, Doc Pfeiffer from Indiana, Steve Gower from

Virginia, and our Vice Chairman Christopher Michel

from the state of Delaware.

We went on to report a lot of work that took place in Internal Affairs this year that has led to some great things that will be helping to improve our organization. I'm going to briefly highlight that report.

We began our year with an overarching assignment from the Advisory Committee to think about aspects of the organization that could be improved upon just to make things better, opportunities for improvement, and we were given some specific goals.

Our first goal was to improve how national appointees are notified of their assignment. National appointees will now mostly, as I think most of you now know, will not be happening at convention. They will take place at the Fall NEC.

This fall we'll be rolling out a bit of a change where all appointees will be notified via phone call. They'll be explained their roll and their responsibilities and assigned goals. Each individual will have goals.

Then they'll be receiving a PDF, basically a proclamation of their appointment, that they can put up in their Post or at their home to lend a sense of seriousness and the honor that goes with getting a national appointment.

We think that will really get guys pumped up to serve, ready to serve, and do so in an effective way. So that goal was accomplished early on.

The second goal that was assigned to our Commission was to think about ways to make our NEC meetings more impactful, flow faster, more efficient, and more fun. Meetings that are more fun will attract more members, make for members to be more productive and more energized about doing all the hard work they do.

We developed a series of recommendations

for the upcoming NEC meeting. We made those recommendations to both the Commander, the leading candidate, and the trailing candidate. I won't go into what's going to be changed. It's their baby, so to speak, but there will be some, I think, exciting changes at the upcoming Fall NEC meeting and all NEC meetings thereafter.

We were tasked to work with emblem sales to help develop or bring out products that would improve or affect or be available to Sons members, and we did do that.

Emblem sales, as a result of our pushing and with the help of Kevin Mook, our headquarters adviser, has produced a SAL Welcome Kit that is now available through emblem sales, and they produced a flag topper which was mentioned yesterday. That was a great accomplishment, and we're hoping to do more of that in the year ahead.

We were tasked to develop a welcome letter for all new members. We have developed several versions of a welcome letter, and that's

something that we'll be rolling out soon as well.

We were asked to consider potential changes to the Convention Committee, and we had many conversations with members of that committee, prior chairmen of that committee, and we came out with some recommendations that might be taking place in the coming years.

And that would be to have someone on that committee who would have more longevity and would be someone in the position of like a liaison to national headquarters because, as you might know, the chairman of that committee changes every year with the convention, and every year there's a lot of repeated learning to have to figure out how to work with the national organization to make a convention be excellent.

We also made a recommendation that

Convention Committee will have at least a liaison

to the candidates who are upcoming. So, there will

be a liaison between the Convention Committee and

the leading candidate and the trailing candidate to

plan the conventions in a way that's cohesive with

those Campaign Committees.

We worked, we were tasked to work on something that we called SAL TV, television. Our Vice Chairman Christopher Michel led that effort to basically make a YouTube channel for SAL events, things like the Washington Conference, things like these meetings, maybe some really outstanding events that take place across the Detachments.

We engaged The American Legion media team in this regard, and I think we're going to see a fast tracking of the ability to get our videos publicized or put up on the Legion website. It would involve an editing process and an approval process, just to make sure everything is covered with considerations like copyrights and permission of everyone who's filmed.

This is a lot of work, and I was proud of the team for what they accomplished.

We had a lot of resolutions and also some awards. I'll go through the resolutions first. I have to put on my reading glasses here.

The first resolution was Resolution

No. 4, presented for the National Convention, originating in the Detachment of Wisconsin. And the title of that Resolution was Add Homeless Veterans to Consolidated Squadron Reports. It reads:

WHEREAS, some of our most vulnerable veterans are homeless;

And WHEREAS, according to The American Legion's Homeless Veterans Handbook and an American Legion news release concerning Homeless Veterans there are approximately 33,000 homeless veterans today;

And WHEREAS, women veterans are more than twice as likely to be homeless as women non-veterans, as are veterans ages 18 to 30;

And WHEREAS, The American Legion has determined homeless veterans a serious enough issue to dedicate an entire website with six supporting subsites to it at www.legion.org/homeless;

And WHEREAS, there are many Squadrons that raise monies for and volunteer with homeless veterans programs in their communities;

And WHEREAS, today when Squadrons contribute to these veterans in need it is all under the consolidated report under "Other VA&R Projects;"

And WHEREAS, this results in no visibility into these very important contributions to some of our most vulnerable veterans.

Now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, by the Sons of The American Legion in Annual Convention assembled in Charlotte, North Carolina on August 25-27, 2023, that the Consolidated Squadron Report has a single category added to the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation section called "Homeless Veterans" with two values for the donations and number of hours spent;

And be it further RESOLVED, that the

National Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation

Commission encourages Squadrons to participate in

efforts to help our homeless veterans;

And be it finally RESOLVED, that this resolution become effective with the close of the 2023 National Convention of the Sons of The

American Legion.

The Commission thought this was a terrific thing to add to the CSR, and this Resolution was approved by the Internal Affairs Convention Committee.

Hear, I agree. That was Resolution No. 4.

Resolution No. 5, National Convention, 2023. The title: Add Troop and Family Support to the Consolidated Squadron Reports.

Origin is the Detachment of Wisconsin.

Whereas, up until the 2019-2020 administrative year, there were two categories on the Consolidated Squadron Report that gave a place to indicate the donations and hours that Squadrons contributed to "Support for the Troops" and to the "Family Support Network;"

And WHEREAS, today when Squadrons contribute to these areas by providing support at troop deployments and helping military families in times of need it is all consolidated under "Other VA&R Projects;"

And WHEREAS, this results in no visibility into these very important contributions to our nation's active-duty members.

Now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, by the Sons of The American Legion in Annual Convention assembled in Charlotte, North Carolina on August 25-27, 2023, that the Consolidated Squadron Report has a single category added to the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation section called "Troop & Family Support" with two values for the monetary donations and number of hours spent;

And be it further RESOLVED, that the

National Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation

Commission encourages Squadrons to participate in

efforts to help support our troops and their

families;

And be it finally RESOLVED, that this Resolution become effective with the close of the 2023 National Convention of the Sons of The American Legion.

The Commission equally thought this was a very valid and noteworthy endeavor to do to change

the CSR to reflect this, and this was also approved.

I'm going to hold there. We're going back to Resolution No. 4, which has the title Add Homeless Veterans to the Consolidated Squadron Report.

I would ask for a motion that this resolution be accepted. Do we have a motion?

ALLEN WATRY (WI): Allen Watry,

Detachment of Wisconsin, makes the motion to
approve the resolution.

WILLIAM CLANCY III (NY): We have a
motion. Do we have a second?

RICHARD KILBY (CT): Mr. Chairman,
Richard Kilby, Detachment of Connecticut ANEC,
seconds the motion.

WILLIAM CLANCY III (NY): We have a motion and a second. All in favor? Any opposed? Any discussion?

Did I hear someone say discussion.

All in favor? I'm sorry. My apologies.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: We have a motion and

duly seconded to accept the resolution. Is there any further discussion?

Seeing none, all in favor, say aye. Opposed, say nay.

Motion passed.

WILLIAM CLANCY III (NY): Thank you. We are moving on to Resolution 5, which I just read.

Again, the title is to Add Troop and Family Support to the Consolidated Squadron Report, submitted by the Detachment of Wisconsin.

Do I have a motion to accept?

GREG SPAULDING (IN): Greg Spaulding,
delegate Indiana, makes a motion to accept.

ALLEN WATRY (WI): Allen Watry, Detachment of Wisconsin, seconds.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: We have a motion and duly seconded to accept Resolution No. 5.

Is there any discussion? Hearing none, all in favor, say aye. Opposed, say nay.

Motion passed.

WILLIAM CLANCY III (NY): The IA

Commission also received three motions which were

for National Office endorsements. There were two from the Detachment of Oklahoma for Mr. Chris Cook. One was for Mr. Cook for national office. The other was an endorsement of Mr. Christopher Cook from Oklahoma for National Commander. Both of these were received and filed.

There was a third resolution from the Detachment of Oklahoma for Mr. Sherbourne from the Detachment of Oklahoma for national office. That resolution was also received and filed.

That was the contents of my report yesterday at our meeting. I believe now we have some awards to be presented related to the CSRs.

We're reading a Consolidated Squadron

Report is hereby given to the Detachment of Puerto

Rico. Your considerable efforts in achieving a 100

percent response from your Squadron's reporting are

commendable, providing you and your members to be

an invaluable part of the Sons of the American

Legion.

Through your reporting at the local, state and national levels, the Sons of the American

Legion will be more effective in supporting veterans and their family. Your efforts illustrate the principles of working above and beyond the call of duty and exemplifies the commitment to a foundation of the future.

Presented at the 51st National

Convention, city of Charlotte, North Carolina,

August 25th, signed by Commander Carlton and

Adjutant Anthony Wright.

If I could get a representative from the Detachment of Puerto Rico, please.

We have an additional award for the Detachment of Delaware, which has also received 100 percent in submission of their consolidated reports.

And we have a third for another 100 percent from the Detachment of Vermont, again presented this day at our Convention.

Representatives from each of those

Detachments could make their way forward, please.

For the Detachment of Vermont, 100 percent CSR reporting.

... Applause.

Detachment of Delaware, 100 percent CSR reporting.

... Applause.

We will find the representative from Puerto Rico.

Mr. Commander, that is my report from the IA Commission. I make a motion to accept my report. Do we have a second?

STEVE THOMAS (OK): Commander, Steve Thomas, Detachment of Oklahoma. I second that.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: Thank you. We have a motion and duly seconded to accept Mr. Clancy's report.

Do I hear any discussion? Hearing none, all in favor say aye. Opposed, say nay.

... Gavel.

Motion passed.

Mr. Thomas Deal, for your legislative report.

ORAL REPORT

Legislative and Rules Committee Tom Deal (MD), Chairman

Good morning. It is my pleasure to be up here today to give you the report from the Legislative and Rules Committee.

The Legislative and Rules Committee met yesterday at 11:33. We opened the meeting with 11 members and 21 guests.

The Rules of the National Convention with proper motion were passed.

Next we talked about our goals, and the number one goal we had was to increase the number of nominees for the George B. Evans Veterans

Advocate of the Year Award. We had a goal of eight. This last year we had five. Again, this year we had five. I'd encourage all of you to try to find somebody to nominate.

But it is my pleasure to announce the winner this year. This year's winner of the George B. Evans Veterans Advocate of the Year Award is Mr. William Kelly from Squadron 137, Detachment of Florida. Bill, come on up.

While Bill's making his way, I would like to recognize all the nominees that were nominated.

Mr. Gilbert Miles from Squadron 43 in California,

Mr. Michael Donnelly from Squadron 116 in Maryland,

Mr. Peter Thomas Puzzo from Squadron 189 in

Florida, and Mr. Terry Hanson from Squadron 42 in

South Dakota.

We have a lot of volunteers working hard, and I want to thank those who submitted these nominees here. It is very good to reward all our guys doing the work.

I'm going to read this award here. Sons of the American Legion 2023 National George B.

Evans Grassroots Advocate Award is hereby given to William D. Kelly, Jr., Lakeshore Squadron 137,

Jacksonville, Florida, for an outstanding service and significant contributions of time and effort and grassroots lobbying by displaying an aggressive leadership role in building relationships with elected officials that directly impact public policy, taking our message to key media outlets, and developing strong grassroots initiatives during

the 2022-2023 year.

Presented this 51st National Convention in the city of Charlotte, North Carolina, August 25-27, 2023. Signed Christopher Carlton, National Commander, Anthony Wright, National Adjutant.

... Applause.

This is truly an honor because a lot of times we don't have this cover ready for him.

Bill, I'll put that on. Congratulations.

... Applause.

Would you like to say a few words?

WILLIAM KELLY, JR. (FL): No, thank you.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: Bill, on behalf of National Commander Chris, I'd like to make you a Distinguished Guest of our 51st National Convention.

... Applause.

THOMAS DEAL (MD): Congratulations again,
Bill. Well deserved. Bill is a past legislative
chairman, and he does work very hard in Florida for
the legislature.

Next we talked about voter voice. You'll

hear me talk about it all the time when you see me. We keep signing up people at any of the meetings we do. We kept signing people up yesterday at our meeting. We have over 75 new members at the SAL.

It's jumping, but not like it should be. We need to get everyone signed up. If you're not signed up in this room, please see one of the legislative chairmen here, and we can get you signed up.

Washington Conference next year will be February 25th to the 28th. The wreath laying will be on February 25th. You have to fill out a form to come. You don't have to pay anything to come. We just need to know you're coming. If you want to get a wreath, if you want to get lunch and a tram ticket, then you do need to pay for those things.

It's a great thing. We had 150 members last year. We'd like to see that this year. We had three buses full of people. It was great. It was great to walk around Washington, D.C., with the wreaths and the monuments and all of us lined up.

It's truly a great experience and everybody looking at us to say, who are those guys?

A lot of PR. A lot of good things. I encourage you all to try to get there.

Lastly, I want to introduce the

Legislative Commission members, and if you're here,

please stand. Our Vice Chairman Blair Miles from

Alabama, David Lee from New York, Bernie Kessler

from Ohio, Charles Curtis from California, and

Richard Humphrey from Colorado.

Also, our NEC liaison is Thomas Glander,
Bob Manzo, and Jeff Lee, and our PNC liaison is
Mr. Byron Robichaux.

Thank you for what you do. This is truly team members working. These guys work very hard.

It's a great team working hard.

Mr. Commander, that is my report. As a Delegate for this Convention, I move for the acceptance of my report.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: All right. We have a motion on the floor to accept the report.

BERNIE KESSLER (OH): Bernie Kessler,

Detachment of Ohio, second the report of the legislative commission.

NVC DAVID MENNEL: Thank you, sir. We have a motion on the floor and duly seconded to accept Mr. Deal's report.

Do I hear any discussion? Hearing none, all in favor say aye. Opposed, say nay.

... Gavel.

Motion passed.

Mr. Deal, on behalf of our National Commander, I'd like to make you a Distinguished Guest.

At this time, I'd like to yield the floor back to your National Commander, Mr. Carlton.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: Thank you.

At this time, I'd like to call on our National Vice Commander from the South -- well, everybody knows Ron -- to give his final report.

ORAL REPORT

NVC - South's Final Report

Ronald E. "Ron" Roberts (MS), NVC - South

He did that to me in Milwaukee, and I

said, Commander, really? He said, why should I introduce you? Everybody knows you already.

You're the quiet one whenever there's a meeting or a question of any kind.

Thank you, Commander, for that gracious introduction.

I'm going to take you on a journey as an NVC. First of all, I want to thank my wife, young bride of 52 years, said have fun, do your best.

Call me when you're heading back into town from wherever you're going.

I'm going to start this a little different. I was called about two years prior to being asked if I wanted to run for NVC, said we need proof of your eligibility. Who are you eligible under?

Let me tell you something, I come from a unique family. Every male member of the Roberts family for the last four generations served their country voluntarily in the military.

... Applause.

Thank you. My eligibility to join the

Sons comes from my father, my grandfather and my great grandfather, all served during eligible periods. My father, both my brothers, and I were dual members during their lifetime, my brother and my older brother. My father passed away. My dad served during WWII. My brothers and I served during the Vietnam conflict. Next slide, please.

A little bit about my father. I didn't know this. He didn't tell us what he did in the military until my kid brother got back from the Navy. He said, sit down at the table. I'm going to pour you a shot of brandy. I'm going to tell you what a real war was about. I had no idea what he did, who he belonged to, whatever.

My dad was Company 1, 85th Infantry, 10th
Mountain Division, para-ski troopers. I never knew
it was such a thing. They called them the tough
bunch. I said, Dad, really? You jumped out of a
perfectly good flying plane with snow skis strapped
to your back? He said, "That was the job we had,
and we did it."

You'll see his insignias up there, bronze

star, purple heart, and so on. I never knew he was awarded those. We got that shadowbox made two years before he passed away.

This hangs at the wall in my house. The top picture is dad. Left is my older brother Bill. He's passed away. And on the right is my kid brother Terry. You can see we all served in different branches. Next slide.

Moving on, we start out as an NVC.

Somebody says are you interested? You've got to do some politicking, which I don't like politicking.

Anyhow we always had the Southern Area traditional get together at Post 103 in Mooresville, Indiana.

We had invited guests.

If you're there, I know if you want to come over, let us know. No charge. If you want to make a donation for supper, you can do that, but that's about it. They provide their hospitality bus to take us from the Sheraton over to their Post.

Next picture, Southern Region leadership with our incoming National Commander Chris Carlton

Another get together. These are the leaders of the South. I wanted to take a picture with them.

I asked my wife, do you want to put my cap on me at National Convention in Milwaukee, Wisconsin? She said, do I have to? Which one? She said, honey, you keep reminding me you're a paid up life member of every veterans organization on earth.

I said, yeah, but this one is for the Sons, not the Legion, not for the Vietnam Veterans, not for the VFW, none of those. This is for the Sons. That's where my heart is right now is working for the Sons. So, she was happy to put my cap on.

I'm not going to say anything about the official photo. I didn't take it. I didn't approve it. They did it. They sent it and published it.

First stop on the journey in Florida. It started at check-in in the lobby in Florida. You want to impress a little country boy, look at that check-in lobby. That's live palm trees. That's

just the check-in lobby.

Moving right along, it was a pleasure to visit Florida. I call them the flagship of the fleet, always leading. NEC Bill Kelly served as my escort, picked me up at the airport, got me checked in and to my room. Met with Commander Gerald Sambets, then on to evening meal with the Florida Sons.

Didn't take long to figure out why

Florida always exceeds their goals at everything!

Fund raising, membership, whatever. Their spring

convention was like coming to a National

Convention -- literally, they had vendor booths in

the halls, up and down four different halls, 60

different vendor booths. Anything at emblem sales,

they had their own representatives.

Their meetings included committee and commission meetings with reports on progress of different projects, just like you're here at the convention. They raise phenomenal amounts of money not only for the Legion programs, but also for charities including Special Olympics and hurricane

relief funds.

I had the opportunity to participate in a Q&A session on Parliamentary Procedure, had a great deal of participation.

Special thing happened when I was there.

PNC Jimmy Roberts got up on the stage in front of everybody, called his girlfriend out, and proposed to her. Got on his knees and everything else.

That was a special thing. Congratulations again, PNC Roberts.

Florida leadership is escorting me to address a Legion family meeting. I was honored to address the Legion as well as the Auxiliary. These are a bunch of friendly people, let me tell you. They work hard, but they play hard.

You are not going to believe, the

Auxiliary president says, I'm having an evening

dinner, and we're having a contest, T-shirt

contest, and the theme is rock and roll. Pick out

your favorite T-shirt that you can get. She let us

know way ahead of time. And wear it to the dinner

evening. There is my T-shirt. I won the first

prize. "I may be old, but I got to see all the
cool bands" is what my T-shirt says.

Detachment of Florida, great people, said before you leave, we want to present you with a plaque, Ron. That was a great honor to receive a plaque from Florida.

Next stop -- these trips are very quick.

Every other weekend or sometimes weekend after

weekend. Next stop, Cajun country, Louisiana.

What can I say about Cajun country? You instantly

feel welcome.

NEC Camille Lejeune served as my escort, from check-in to finding my room. Commander Dan Maurin served as my host, guiding me to meeting rooms of the Sons, the Legion and Auxiliary. What got you when you walked in the first meeting room was the aroma of jambalaya, gumbo and crawfish etouffee were in the air, what a way to be welcomed.

Again, none of this is pre-planned, but

Commander Maurin said, would you mind leading a

short question and answer session on parliamentary

procedure? We know you're the guy on that, and I said no problem. 1 1/2 hours later we finished.

Great participation!

It is indeed an honor to address the

Legions and the Auxiliary. I did something unique.

Every Post, every Detachment I visited, I presented
each President with a tray I made in my shop that
said, "Your opinion is not part of the recipe." I
carried these everywhere I went and handed them out
to the President of the Auxiliary.

Next stop, a little side trip to Las

Vegas. Everyone says must be nice. When I said

little side trip, I flew out Friday evening,

arrived at 6:15, joined with the guys that were

there, had a little bit to eat and a couple drinks,

went to bed got up the next morning, sat in on

their training session.

They asked me to teach three different classes Saturday afternoon from 1:00 to 6:30:

Parliamentary Procedure; Writing Resolutions; and Implementing Change.

I said, okay, no problem. I was done at

6:30, slept that night, caught the early flight back out Sunday morning because I had another trip to make.

My fifth time at the Western Area Rendezvous, It is now named Wild Willy's Western Region Rendezvous after Willy Williams, who was in Sons for I don't know how many years, and he started it nine years ago up in Henderson, Nevada, at the Western Region Rendezvous.

Stop Kentucky. I don't know why this is following me around like this, but Kentucky Commander Brandon asked if it was possible for me to teach the same classes that I taught in Las Vegas. I said that's not the purpose of an NVC visit. He said, well, according to us it is.

He said, by the way, we brought you something to entice you a little bit. It was a two gallon bottle of Kentucky bourbon blackberry flavored. I never heard of blackberry flavored bourbon. It's not that bad tasting come to think

of it.

I said sure if I could get some help with the PowerPoints while I'm addressing the Legion and the Auxiliary I'll be glad to help teach the classes. Mr. Mark Tansel, most of you know him from Indiana, was down visiting from Indianapolis, and he graciously stepped up and took over while I was addressing the other members of the Legion Family.

Really felt welcome, and a member of the Kentucky family. Taking a break after three classes, wow! Again, Mark and Brandon, great group of men to work with.

Next stop, North Carolina. I'm known as a busy man working, moving all the time -- not compared to North Carolina Adjutant Will Slater. From the minute I arrived at the airport and was greeted by Will Slater, Detachment Adjutant, he was on the run, and I was unable to keep up with him. I had to keep saying, slow down, Will. Slow down.

Off to the hotel, and I was introduced to Sons leadership, Commander Mayhew and NEC Terry

Pressley, went out for supper then settled in for evening.

Always an honor to present a new charter.

Presented a new charter to 255, Mathews, North

Carolina, first thing in the morning, then

addressed the Legion and Auxiliary.

Presented American Legion 100th

Anniversary silver dollar coin to Will Slater for his work as my NVC Adjutant. He did all my calls and everything else for me while I was an NVC.

There's a look at the charter presentation. These guys have everything in order, everything ready to go. You don't have to wait for nothing.

They have another award, the Dogwood

Award, for 100 percent membership by December 31st.

They asked me if I'd stand up there and help them

with that. Again, to Squadron 255 the new

Squadron.

Will took me around and introduced me to the North Carolina Legion and Auxiliary. It's always nice to be asked to give a small talk and

explain what the Sons does and what the Commander's programs were. It was an honor to address the North Carolina Legion and Auxiliary.

Here I presented the silver dollar coin to Will Slater for volunteering to serve as my Adjutant.

Then just happened to come out of a meeting, and who was standing in the hallway?

After I addressed the North Carolina Sons, I came out of that meeting, Sons members in attendance, and here was who I met in the hallway. I don't know if some of you know him or not, Past National Commander of the Legion, Bill Oxford. He just happened to be standing there.

I said, Bill, what are you doing here?

He said, I'm from the Carolinas. I said, I didn't know that. He said, what are you doing here? I told him, and he said, congratulations. Let's get our picture taken. Super Past National Commander of the Legion. These guys are great.

Okay. Will, I swear, flew me down to the airport, but he drove me. Flew out to D.C. from

Jackson, Mississippi, with a young man sitting next to me. He introduced himself to me because I started talking to him and introduced myself.

He said, I'm Crawford. I'm with Senator
Roger Wicker from here in Mississippi, Senator
Wicker's aide. I said, you're Roger's aide? He
said, yeah, why? I said, I've got some things I
want to bring up about veterans and veterans causes
and veterans concerns. He said, okay, I'm
listening.

He was very attentive. He gave me his business card as well as his personal straight line office number. If you've got any questions, anything the Senator can do for you or your organization, give me a call.

Arrived in Washington, D.C., got up to the hotel. Here's a picture in the back over Dave Mennel's shoulder. You'll see a plaque on the wall. That's to remind you that this is the hotel and the place that the assassination of Ronald Reagan took place. What a thing to have outside your hotel.

Next visit, we went to the Tomb of the Unknown. I've been there a couple times before. I especially wanted to go down to the wall. I had permission from Mississippi to place the wreath at the wall.

You can look on your cell phone if you know somebody's name up there. They'll give you the panel number and the name number on the panel. So, 17-E is the 17th panel from the east end if you count them. You count down from the top, the 54th name, and I found it. To honor Terry Dean Shauver, a brother of one of my close high school friends.

Gave his life on March 26th, 1967, defending freedom. I had no idea at the time, but Blair Miles took this picture without my knowledge and sent it to me. I'll be eternally grateful.

Next comes Puerto Rico. They didn't want to send me to Puerto Rico. They said it's expensive. I said, I don't care. Angel Navarez was on the phone talking with me. Juan Rodriguez was on the phone talking with me. They said, Ron, you realize it's our 100th anniversary down here?

We've never had a national officer visit Puerto Rico.

I called Kevin. Kevin, what do we need to do? He said, they've been calling me too. We authorized your trip down there.

Angel met me at the airport, my friend over here, checked me in at the hotel. Then I freshened up, met Sons/Legion Adjutant Juan. These are both dual members, both hold upper offices in both organizations.

Was introduced by Adjutant Juan. Every Legion, Auxiliary and Sons member we saw, I mean, we walked down an aisle, it was stand in line and introduce Ron Roberts, NVC from the Southern area.

Angel took me out for an evening meal of authentic Puerto Rican food. I couldn't pronounce a single one of the names, but it was all delicious. As I mentioned before, Puerto Rico was celebrating 100 years as a member of the Legion Family.

When all the Squadrons surpass their membership goals, Commander Angel makes sure

it. We stood in line and I don't know how many plaques or certificates were passed out. It was truly an honor to be involved showing people -- you know what they did with their membership, over 100 percent. We're giving certificates and plaques to just about everybody.

If you had a Squadron who met or exceeded your goals, they honored you with a plaque and took your picture. Most of the time, we had Commander Rosario, a female commander of the Legion down there, Angel and myself.

They said, well, that's all of them, but we've got one more plaque. Who gets this one so I know who we're talking to? They said, well, we did this one for you, Ron, for coming down here.

Commander Navarez and Legion Commander Rosario presented me with a plaque. I have never seen anything like it in my life.

You see the shape of the islands is like a custom plaster on the front of the plaque. The plaque is that thick all together with the plaster

outlined on the front. Something I didn't know was that the Department of Puerto Rico and the Detachment of Puerto Rico also includes U.S. Virgin Islands that have a Legion Post, so St. John, St. Croix, and St. Thomas are part of Puerto Rico.

So, I really appreciated that plaque.

They didn't have to do that. That was a wonderful recognition.

The Auxiliary lady comes down, Mr. Ron, come down and talk to the auxiliary. You're here. You need to talk to us too. We're just as important as the Legion. I said, okay, Maria. Lead the way. Maria Montanez, wonderful lady.

Then I found out someone else was visiting. You look at the row of us, you see Angel on the corner right behind the first lady in red, then me, and Legion Paul Dillard, Past National Commander, was down visiting. And Carmen Rosario down on the end.

They were super excited to have two national officers down there, really a great bunch of people. They asked me to give a little address

to the Auxiliary, which I did, and I especially reminded them that we do appreciate all that they did to keep work for veterans and veterans affairs and the benefits we get as veterans.

I said, I want to make a point with you Auxiliary members that I think is very important. Because of you, the person giving you a talk, you can call a million dollar man. They said, what do you mean?

I said, it started three years ago. I had heart ablation done outside the VA, but the VA paid for it, a little over \$400,000. I had the artery in my right leg replaced not once, but twice, each time was \$700,000, that's \$1.4 million, a little over \$2 million. I'm going to get my left knee replaced in November. My copay was zero.

That's the benefits us veterans need to tell you thank you for fighting for it because they tried to take away all of that. Not only that, I graduated from college with the GI Bill paying my way. I bought my first home for my wife and I with the GI Home Loan Bill. I started a business and

sold it very successfully with the GI Set Aside Program.

So, thank you, Sons, for what you're fighting for us veterans too.

Back home to Mississippi. There's a special feeling of ease that you feel when you get back home. Everybody you know and you're ready to get done with it all.

So, they asked me to address the Legionnaires there at home at our state convention in Natchez, Mississippi, right on the river.

I talked about the "Be the One" program and made sure they had the big new plaque out front. Since the "Be the One" program started -- now, it's not just the Legion, several other organizations too. The whole state of Tennessee, Tennessee workers, have been involved with "Be the One" for four years now -- over 80,000 calls have been answered.

There's no way to know how many veterans' lives have been saved. So, let's keep up our support.

Then I was asked to make a small address to the Ladies Auxiliary. If you look closely, a close-up picture, there's a pink microphone cord going over the podium down to the plug-in, and I asked the President, I said, really, pink? She said, that's all we had. I said okay.

Our Detachment had some 100 Percent

Membership awards. Detachment Commander Danny

Baser said let's present the awards. We had some

certificates we gave out.

It's always a pleasure at your own

Detachment to recognize those individuals that have

met or exceeded their goals. The greatest thing of

all is when you stand up in front of them and swear

in the new Detachment officers. Just a feeling of

pride and accomplishment there that you don't

normally run across.

So, my final comments. What a year! It has truly been an honor to represent National Commander Chris Carlton, as well as the members of the Southern Region, on my travels.

What a team! You Southern Detachment

leaders stepped up and accepted the challenge on membership as well as fund-raising programs. Excellent job.

Thanks, Southern Team for all you have done and continue to do for the Sons, Legion Family and Veterans. As your representative, I knew the South would lead the way again. Even with tornadoes, hurricanes and flooding, the team just dug in deeper and found what it took to keep on going.

You worked harder, lead the way in membership for the first nine months. We were the leaders, reached 100 percent membership at the end of the year, and made many charity contributions.

By the way, Florida raised over \$500,000 for charity, and this year marks their 29th all-time high in membership. Got to give them a hand for accomplishing something like that.

You just can't stop them guys. You just can't stop them.

Again, thanks for electing me as National

Vice Commander. It has been an honor and truly a privilege.

I have a few of the NVC Challenge Coins left on me. So, if you want one, just walk up to me and say, I'd really like one of your coins.

I want to tell you a little bit about the coins. USA made coin. We looked to some Chinese knockoff ones. The NVCs were trying to decide.

You rub them a little bit, and the enamel peeled off. The enamel doesn't peel off of these.

They're three times more expensive than the cheap ones, but they're more than worth it. If you'd like one, let me know.

Thank you to the Sons for your support.

Thank you to the Detachments that invited me. I'm sorry there were a couple that I couldn't quite make it to because of my schedule and because of my injury. Thanks again. Thank you all.

young, but I feel old because National Vice

Commander Dave Mennel, will you approach? And is

Chairman Monserud in the room? Would you please

approach.

I'd like to make you a Distinguished

Also, could I have my aide, David Miller, approach?

While I'm doing this, I'd like to make all my Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms Distinguished Guests. I will get you badges.

As National Commander said about his aide, you choose someone you can trust and you can travel with and talk to, that is a friend. And David Miller is that to me.

When he has the opportunity, he's been able to travel with me to a couple of places that he did it on his own dime. One, because he wanted to go back; and, two, because he wanted to be with me and help me.

So, with that, thank you, David Miller, for being my friend and my aide this year. I want to make you a Distinguished Guest.

Truly apologize, Chairman Monserud, but I'd like to make you a Distinguished Guest.

Now I think I'm all caught up and feel good about that.

At this time, I'd like the Sergeant-at-Arms to please bring Vincent Gaughan to the podium for the purpose of presentations.

PRESENTATION

Vincent M. Gaughan (IL), PNC, The American Legion

Mr. Commander Chris Carlton, National SAL officers, SAL members, friends and guests, it's my pleasure to be here this afternoon on behalf of The American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation.

I'm honored again to be here with such great people such as yourselves.

The Sons of the American Legion is a force in which The American Legion Family is very proud. Your commitment and dedication to The American Legion's Veterans & Children Foundation and other Legion programs continues to be steadfast and ongoing.

It is through all our mutual helpfulness that we continue to make the difference with our nation's youth and its veterans. As you all know, there's still much work to be done. Many veterans still don't know that much about The American Legion. And it is our hope, with the assistance of the Sons of the American Legion, that we will change that and bring awareness to the Veterans & Children Foundation.

Every dollar contributed has gone on significantly to be impacted in the lives of our veterans and their families and through our programs and services supported by the Veterans & Children Foundation.

One of the parts of the Veterans &

Children Foundation is to support the Temporary

Financial Assistance program. Grants are given to

bring stability to minor children living with

veterans and in service members homes when the

financial stability is threatened.

Each year thousands of dollars in financial grants have provided a safety net to our

veterans families.

Part of the mission of the Veterans & Children Foundation is to support the financial service officers.

Let me get a little bit into the TFA.

What that is, it's a system where veterans with children in their family, either active duty or nonactive duty, and it shouldn't happen, that they can't make the security deposit if they get transferred. They might have trouble with their utility bills.

The Army and the Navy, Armed Forces should make sure that doesn't happen to them, but it does.

So, the VCF, what we do, we give grants to these families, and it's nonrepayable. So at least they know somebody else cares about them and we care about them. So, then they move on from there.

But the other aspect is that we support veterans service officers training. And there's two parts to that. Our Legion service officers continue to grow each day with new innovative

training. As you know, the PACT Act has passed and caused for updated training of our service officers, and we must be able to keep up with the additional flows of claims.

Our service officers have made an impressive record in 2022. They have attained \$16 billion in funds for our veterans through the appellate process and through the VA process there.

Let me say another thing, if you get a hold of the Legion Magazine for the month of August, this goes into detail what the service officers do. So far, at national -- national level in Washington, D.C., the appellate level and 80 percent of all appeals are financed and supported by The American Legion.

What we do is we hire an independent law firm who has expertise in Veterans Affairs. Last year, in 2022, they hired 13,967 cases, and they were able to get an additional \$75.4 million.

It is through the SAL support of The

American Legion programs we've been able to help

these veterans get the benefits that they deserve

and that they have earned.

Again, for 2022, the calendar year, the veterans of The American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation was able to acquire \$1,239,118 in donations. I am pleased at this time to announce this year's Veterans & Children Foundation award recipients.

This year's recognition awards are presented to the following Sons of the American Legion Detachment. Before I go into that, I have to give a shout-out to Detachment Commander from Illinois, Kevin O'Connell and the Illinois Detachment. God love you all.

... Applause.

They have a little laryngitis so I have to stick up for them. That's it.

The first award is the Harry W. Colmery

Legacy Award. And this is awarded to the number

one Detachment with the highest total contributions

in Veterans & Children Foundation. This year the

award goes to the Detachment of Oregon, with their

combined total of over \$13,000.

... Applause.

Do we have somebody from Oregon? Well, the Detachment of Oregon represents probably the best in all people. You do a lot of work and you don't want that much recognition. He just wanted to say thank you and no comments. All right.

The next award is the James A. Drain

Award. And it's given to the Detachment with the highest donations per capita. This year, the award goes, again, to the Detachment of Oregon with the highest per capita total of \$8.69 per member.

... Applause.

Commander, on behalf of the Veterans &

Children Foundation, I want to thank the members of
the Sons of the American Legion and all the

American family members of The American Legion for
your hard work and continued support of our
veterans and their families. God love you,

Commander.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: We would like to make you a Distinguished Guest of our 51st

National Convention.

... Applause.

See, he has Stacy Cope with him. That's why she's a Distinguished Guest.

... Applause.

And to the Detachment of Oregon, you'll have to share it but I'd like to make the Detachment of Oregon a Distinguished Guest to our convention.

... Applause.

At this time, I'd like to call the Sergeant-at-Arms to escort Past National Commander Joe Gladden to the podium.

PNC JOSEPH W. GLADDEN (MD): It's officially good afternoon. It's great to be here today. I wanted to share with you, I had the great honor of being the first SAL consultant to the national American Legion Riders Committee to represent the Sons of the American Legion on that committee. How many Riders do we have in the room? If you're a Rider, stand up.

... Applause.

Thank you, gentlemen. Who else owns a motorcycle and is not a Rider? If you aren't, you need to join the Riders.

Before I start, I need to -- I'll be brief -- but I need to apologize to my dear friend Dave Mennel over there. Dave I think it was my text to you saying, good job on your report, that might have caused you that fine on you. So, my apologies to you for that. Well, \$20 is \$20. But I'm not the one who left my phone on.

... Laughter.

Anyway, it's a great honor to be the representative to the National AR Committee for you all and to represent the Sons. Realistically, when you think about it, the Sons probably -- this is just my own educated guess -- I bet you we're more than 50 percent of The American Legion Riders across the nation. That's got to be the case because everywhere I go you see Riders; they have the Sons patch on.

We just finished up the National Legacy
Run, and I want to say our National Commander was

there. And Chris did an outstanding job supporting and showing what the Sons of the American Legion are. He inspired us on each and every stop that he gave a talk. Chris, you deserve a big round of applause for doing the round with us.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: Go ahead, tell them. I know you want to. I was a good trash collector, too, right?

PNC JOSEPH W. GLADDEN (MD): At every stop we stopped, here comes Chris with a bag of trash. But you know what? That's the kind of Commander that Chris is. He's the guy that's going to get down in the trenches with each of us and do the job that needs to be done. And that's what Chris was doing, doing the job that needed to be done.

When you're riding on a motorcycle and you're hot and tired and everything else and they give you a bottle of water. That water disappears real quick and you're left with a piece of plastic in your hand. What do you do with it?

We can't leave it behind because we can't

leave trash behind to all these places that allow us.

So, Chris, thanks for doing your job. I really forgot about it but thanks for reminding me, but Chris did an incredible job representing the organization.

The Legacy Scholarship Fund, you know, that was my project back when I was National Commander. It stayed near and dear to my heart this entire time. And we've been raising tons of money for it as a Legion family.

Over \$20 million has been raised for the Legacy Scholarship Fund. Last year, \$1.3 million in scholarships were given out to the veterans of our children that have fallen and our disabled veterans' children. What an incredible job, and the Sons of the American Legion are a big part of that as well.

The National organization came to The

American Legion Riders and said, guys, you do an

incredible job raising money for the Legacy

Scholarship Fund, but the Legacy Scholarship Fund

now has \$17 million sitting in the fund. And it doesn't need to be filled anymore; it has enough money in it now to support the needs of our children for the foreseeable future, with what it's going to earn and the additional donations that will come in.

So, they said we want you to accept a new challenge. And after hearing about that challenge, we all got on board, everyone on the national committee.

That new challenge is one you just heard from a second ago -- the Veterans & Children

Foundation. They want us to be the new face, so to speak, the new fundraiser for the Veterans & Children Foundation. And I want us all to support that as well.

I saw a quote that said, whenever you climb a great mountain, you look across and see there are other great mountains to climb. Well, we've climbed that great mountain of the Legacy Scholarship Fund and now we're going to climb another great mountain, the Veterans & Children

Foundation.

We need to help those veterans that have children and have financial needs. We need to help train new service officers so they can go out and get our veterans the disability benefits they deserve.

As I think you might have just heard, over \$16 billion was funded by the VA to our veterans. And that's what we're going to be doing as American Legion Riders -- we're going to be supporting the Veterans & Children Foundation. And I hope you all get on board with me on that.

With that, I want to say thank you for all you do back at your home Posts and back in your Squadrons and chapters and please keep supporting our country, The American Legion Riders and The American Legion.

Thank you very much.

because they either got shipped off because they

didn't have the funds transferred in time, so the

wife is there with bills, but not getting any

money. And he's picking up his paycheck over in

Baghdad, which doesn't do her any good in

Mississippi Oklahoma.

Chris, could I have you read the resolution for us again?

CHRIS M. CASEY (NE): Yes, sir.

Hello, again, take two.

SAL Resolution 2, National Convention, 2023.

Title, donation of \$250,000 to the

Veterans & Children Foundation from the SAL Reserve

Fund.

Origin, Americanism Commission. National Commander, Christopher Carlton.

WHEREAS in the 1970's, the Sons of the American Legion Liability Account, now called the Sons of the American Legion Reserve Fund, was established as a restricted fund for use in the event of emergencies, such as membership decline, etc. And temporary funds were needed to meet expenses;

And WHEREAS, the National Executive

Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October

11-12, 2017, by NEC Resolution No. 4 established a ceiling of \$750,000 (with a variance of +/- 1.5 percent) for the Sons of The American Legion

Reserve Fund for each budget year ending in the month of December to be reviewed annually by the Internal Affairs Commission of The American Legion at the Spring meetings for adequacy and from a fiscal management viewpoint;

And WHEREAS, Resolution No. 4 adopted at

the Fall, 2017 meeting of The American Legion

National Executive Committee further empowers the

Sons of The American Legion to request permission

to transfer funds from the Sons of The American

Legion Reserve Fund to any approved charity that

supports America's veterans and youth with the

approval and consent of both the Internal Affairs

Commission and the Finance Commission of The

American Legion;

And WHEREAS, The Sons of The American

Legion Reserve Fund is presently over the variance

established; now, therefore,

Be it RESOLVED, by the Sons of The American Legion in Annual Convention assembled in Charlotte, North Carolina on August 25-27, 2023, that the Sons of The American Legion hereby approves the donation of \$250,000.00 from the Sons of The American Legion Reserve Fund to The American Legion Veterans and Children Foundation;

And be it further RESOLVED, that the Sons of The American Legion hereby recommends to the Internal Affairs Commission of The American Legion

that said funds be distributed from the Sons of The American Legion Reserve Fund.

NVC RONALD ROBERTS: You've heard the resolution. As a delegate to the 51st annual Convention of the Sons of the American Legion, I make a motion to accept the resolution. Do I have a second.

WILLIAM G. HILL (MD): Bill Hill, delegate, Maryland, second.

ORAL REPORT

National Convention Constitutional Amendments Committee

Nedley C. Fox (CA), Chairman

Good morning. It's 9:16 a.m. on the West Coast. Mine is going to be short on the report. But, NECs, if you have your book, I'd like you to put No. 10 in your book.

And I learned -- I've been a member now 63 years of this great organization -- and I was taught at a very young age, we respect our veterans. They've earned the right to eat and drink alcoholic beverages when they're wearing their cover. We as Sons, we're here to support them.

Please, courtesy, respect, remove your covers if you're eating or drinking alcohol.

That's rule of the day. Please put that in your book, unwritten rule No. 10. I have a couple more, and we'll save those for later.

Now, on behalf of the Constitutional Amendments or bylaws, it's been called a few

different things, however, I'd like to thank -- we had 20 Detachments represented at the meeting that took place in Room 205, Section B.

I'd like to thank Chris Cook from
Oklahoma for putting together the notes for us.
And Chris, thank you. I got them right here.

I'd like to acknowledge junior Past

National Commander Michael Fox for stepping in and acknowledging. And if I've missed anybody, my apologies.

I will put the roll call list; I'll leave that with the National Adjutant so those can be an official record thereof. So, we opened 11:30, 11:31. We had one resolution that was presented and discussed. Kicked back and forth around the wall. Those who wished to speak had the opportunity. I think it was good discussion. I think we will leave it at that.

But the resolution was SAL Resolution
No. 7 of the National Convention, 2023. And the
title was Annual Dues and Per Capita.

Origin, Detachment of Oklahoma.

WHEREAS, the National Constitution and Bylaws is the governing document of the Sons of The American Legion;

And WHEREAS, the revenue for each Squadron and Detachment is derived from annual membership dues;

And WHEREAS, the National Constitution and Bylaws does not define who sets the annual membership dues;

Now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, by the Sons of The American Legion in Annual Convention assembled in Charlotte, North Carolina on August 25-27, 2023, that the National Constitution of the Sons of The American Legion, Article X, Section 2, be amended to read "The amount of National per capita shall be determined by each National Convention for the ensuing year";

And be it further RESOLVED, that Article

X, Section 3, to read "The annual dues amount shall

be determined by the Squadron and Detachment,

respectively, which will include the National per

capita.";

And be it finally RESOLVED, that the current Section 3 and Section 4 remain and be renamed accordingly.

By unanimous consent, this was approved.

NATIONAL COMMANDER'S FINAL REPORT Chris Carlton (IN), National Commander

First and foremost, I'd like to thank my beautiful, wonderful wife Veronica Carlton.

Like I said, when I made her a

Distinguished Guest, if it wasn't for her, I

wouldn't be here. I was asked one time, do you

have the support of my wife, and I said I wouldn't

be sitting here if she didn't. She's helped me

through the years, always backing me and guiding me

in the right way, always proofreading my speeches,

correcting my spelling. So, thank you. I love

you.

I'd also like to thank my parents,
Raylene Carlton, Mirron Carlton, Mom and Dad, for

raising me the way I am. The things I do, how I act, is because of them. It is truly correct when they say that you're an image in the shadow of your parents.

I thank my grandparents, Edna and Virgy Carlton, who are no longer with us, because they too shaped and molded me.

I want to thank my other family, Ray and Debbie Giehll.

My brothers and sisters, I'd like to thank the Detachment of Indiana, The American Legion Department of Indiana, the American Legion Auxiliary Department of Indiana. I will now turn the podium over to National Chaplain Jeff Gibson, Sr. for the Memorial Service.

NATIONAL MEMORIAL SERVICE

Jeff Gibson, Sr. (AL), National Chaplain

You all sound a little weak this morning.

Late last night? I'm going to do something a real

quick. Is Brandon Curry here? Would he please

come forward out of Kentucky.

Would you come up here for a minute, please.

Could I get all the veterans to stand up.

All veterans, all dual members, would you please

stand down here in front, please.

Listen up, guys, I got a lot of text messages last night, the positive things that we do, and it's live streamed. So, when people see what we do, they appreciate it. They want to be members. The next year's goal will be 5,000 members, based on what we do.

Mr. Brandon Curry, could you come up here, please. Yes, sir.

Will all Sons please stand. All the rest of you all please stand so we can honor our veterans. The Commander gave me permission to make Brandon a Distinguished Guest of the Convention. I want you all to understand why this is so important.

When you've been in combat and you see the Humvee in front of you get blowed up and you run up there and try to pull your squad member or one of your platoon members out, man, it does something to you. For Brandon to take a staff

sergeant's remains back to the state of Alabama to his loved ones, that's a lot.

I tossed and turned last night, and I got this for the veterans on behalf of the Sons, and this is the veteran creed. When you listen to it closely, you'll hear what Brandon did.

The veteran creed.

I am a veteran. I have seen and done things you may not understand. I am a warrior! I will never accept defeat. I will never quit. I will never leave a fallen brother or sister. If they are hurt, I will carry them. If I can't carry them, I will drag them.

I will help them face their enemies.

That includes the demon from within. They are my brothers and sisters. I'm a veteran!

Sons, let's give these veterans a hand salute and thank them for their service.

... Applause.

You can have your seats now. Thank you very much.

If you see tears in my eyes, it's not

weak. They are unspoken words.

The next thing we want to do a little different is that the one we prayed for yesterday, he passed away last night. I got a lot of prayer requests about cancer, people losing their wives, their fellow Sons members.

Would all cancer survivors please stand that's present. This is being live streamed, y'all. You know why I asked that? You know what, we don't know who's watching this that might be dealing with cancer, that might take this and use it as a little uplift or little motivation to let them know that it's going to be all right.

To the gentlemen in the back that's standing up that survived cancer, let's give them a round of applause.

... Applause.

I have three requests real quick before we start our service. Thank you all so very much for allowing me to do that.

The first one is the Maryland 400. Today we remember the brave 400 men from Maryland who

came, who gave up Brooklyn to help George
Washington hold the bridges. 256 of them perished
that day in the Battle of Long Island. As long as
the Battle of Brooklyn and the Battle of Brooklyn
Heights was military action of the American
Revolutionary War fought August 27, 1776, the
western edge of Long Island in its present day for
Brooklyn, New York.

The Maryland 400 was members of the 1st

Maryland Regiment and was repeatedly charged by

numerous superior forces during the Battle of Long

Island, during the Revolutionary War, sustaining

heavy casualties but allowing General Washington to

succeed, evacuating the bunker of his troops to

Manhattan. This action commandeered the Maryland

nickname, the Old Line State. A memorial in

Brooklyn and a plaque was put up in memory of this

regiment and their fallen soldiers.

The second one we got is on behalf of the Detachment of Oklahoma we would like to ask for prayer for our Detachment Liaison and Department Senior Vice Commander Lee Cathy, who is fighting

for his life battling cancer.

The last one, pray for Dee Bucky, Past
Northwestern Division Auxiliary Vice President,
who's fighting cancer from the Detachment of
Minnesota.

We're dealing with a lot of cancers. Let's keep all those in prayer.

I'm going to give you a quick outline of our program. A welcome from Will Slater, North Carolina Detachment Chaplain. First scripture, Will Slater Jr. Second scripture, Terry Pressley. Then we have a music selection. Then I'll be back with the memorial prayer, then the memorial word. Then we'll have the candle lighting ceremony with the National Commanders and National Adjutant. Then music selection. Then we'll play Taps, and I'll close out with the benediction. That's the order of service.

WILL SLATER (NC): Good morning,

gentlemen. How are we doing today? Hopefully

everyone is having a good time at this convention.

We definitely welcome you to Charlotte, North

Carolina, and I hope we have an outstanding time at this convention.

Just to let you know, today's chaplain is our NECman today. Our chaplain was unable to make it due to school starting. Let's have a good prayer for everybody for those going to school.

Make sure that they are safe and secure. And let's have a great day. Thank you.

TERRY PRESSLEY (NC): Good morning. Would you please uncover.

Dear Lord, we thank you. We thank you for this opportunity to come today to honor those who have come before us, Lord. We thank you for the health that you give us to do this job. We ask that you would be with us now during this memorial service.

Help us to honor those who have come before, help us to honor those who are serving now, Lord. These things we ask this in Your holy and precious name. Amen.

WILL SLATER (NC): Proverbs 3:5-6, Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lead not onto

your own understanding, in all your ways, submit to him, and he will make ye your paths straight.

TERRY PRESLEY (NC): You'll have to excuse me, I'm a Baptist. I do things the Baptist way. If you'll all stand to honor the reading of God's word.

8, verses 5-7. King Solomon and the entire city of Israel that had gathered about him were before the ark, sacrificing so many sheep and cattle that they could not be recorded or counted. The priest then brought the ark of the Lord's Covenant to its place in the inner sanctuary of the temple, the most holy place, and put it beneath the wings of the cherubim. The cherubim spread their wings over the place of the ark and overshadowed the ark and its carrying Post. Thank you.

NATIONAL CHAPLAIN GIBSON: Be seated, gentlemen. We have a musical selection.

Amen. Some gave all.

A prayer, a comfort this morning. Let us

go to the Lord in prayer.

Dear Lord, please comfort all who are hurting emotionally, all who are dealing with illness and injury, all who are heavy hearted, dealing with difficult situations, all who are anxious, worried, and fearful. You are the God of all comfort. You know each need. You hear each cry. You see each tear.

Lord, may each person feel your nearness.

May your spirit engulf them with your peace. May they feel the burning be lifted from their shoulders. May they feel their bodies relax. May they find comfort and rest in your arms at this very moment.

All these blessings we ask in Thy name, and everyone said amen.

Our message today, I'm coming from a place of a little hurt. The veteran that Kevin Mook and Willie Morgan saved that served 24 years in the United States Navy, and he had to pull the plug on his wife of 31 years, they invited me to come to the Mayo Clinic in Milwaukee. I was not

able to go financially, but I told them, if they bring the body back this way, I would come and do the home going service.

So, they brought the body back. She wanted to be buried at Arlington National Cemetery, but it was booked up. So, she had to be buried in another cemetery in Virginia, and I drove up and did the service.

While I was there, I looked at the husband, and to lose someone that you spent 31 years of your life with to cancer. My message today is going to be about love, but I gave him this to comfort him and the family, and anyone out there who's been through some trials or tribulation and lost a loved one or lost a battle buddy, this is for you. It reads as thus.

When tomorrow starts without me, when tomorrow starts without me, I am not here to see if the sun should rise and find your eyes all full with tears for me.

I wish you wouldn't cry the way you did today while thinking of the many things we did not

get to say.

I know how much you love me, as much as I love you. Each time you think of me, I know you'll be missing me too.

When tomorrow starts without me, please try to understand that an Angel came and called my name and took me by the hand.

My brothers and sisters, for all your lost loved ones, that's for you all to let you know no matter what you're going through, no matter what trials and tribulations you may be facing, you're not alone. You have extended family that's here for you. All you have to do is reach up the phone and call.

Morgan, they jumped on it right away. I said, a man is contemplating suicide because he's hurting so deep inside, he don't know where to go. I asked him, did he call the VA? He said he couldn't get through right away. I told him, hold on, somebody will be there. We took care of that ASAP.

This year has been a beautiful year

because we were able to do so much. A lot of things that people don't know that chaplains do go unnoticed, but we know somebody sit high and look low, watches everything that we do.

But I just want to tell you all that
because I don't know what you all are going out
there, but last night I got some messages for
prayer about cancer, cancer. That's why this
morning I'm a little down because you can't reach
everyone. You wish you could, but you just can't.

But as long as I get the message, I will continue to pray and ask for God's healing and protection over all of you, and not only those that suffer with cancer, those that's dealing with them, they need prayer also because if their spirits get down and they don't look out for themselves, how can they look after somebody else? So, they need prayers, encouragement, and uplift as well.

Our message today is Jesus is love.

We're coming out of the book of Romans 5:8. It reads, God demonstrated his own love for us while we were still sinners. Christ died for us.

I know everybody has different beliefs, and I'm a man of God. I'm a gospel minister. So while I talk, while I pray, pray to the God of your understanding because I'm going to serve the God of my understanding.

So, I don't want to be offensive to anyone. Whatever your religious belief is, pray to your God. While I give this message, use your God of understanding.

When we try to determine someone's worthiness of love based on action, it becomes a game performance whereby we keep tally wrong and right. Love isn't measured by wrong or right, rather those who truly love do so regardless of whether love is ever reciprocated.

The single greatest example of love demonstrated in history is the birth, life and death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. While we were undeserving and still sinners and did not love him, he came to give us life for each of us.

Every day we live and serve is a day where we can exude the same love Jesus for us

because, as believers of his word, we have his love in our heart. From our daily duty of parenting and every day in between, there are numerous opportunities to show love today and every day, even to people we may deem undeserving.

Through these opportunities, we can demonstrate the true love of God to a hurting world through our words, actions, service, and all which we do in love.

I'm going to keep it good today.

Sometimes you know us Southern preachers, we get a little long winded, but I want you all to understand what the message is all about. The things that you do, you do because you love the veterans. Your mother and father serve, and you know a lot of times somebody need a little encouragement.

I want you all to go with me for a few minutes on a trip. This picture of veterans sitting at home -- no wife, no children, nobody.

All of a sudden, his anniversary date comes, and for the anniversary date, the anniversary date is

that day you almost died during the war.

All of a sudden, the demons start coming. You start going, your mind start going somewhere you don't understand where you're going. Then all of a sudden, you get a phone call. Hey, I'm just checking on you. How are you doing today?

You might not even know that person.

Somebody give you the number. You just pick it up and call, hey, how are you doing today? Just by doing that, you save somebody's life. You don't know if he was serving or deserving that, but we do it anyway. That's what we do, y'all.

A lot of times we have to be reminded of the things that we do and why we do them because, you know what, a lot of people depend on us. A lot of you all get out there, cut veterans' grass.

One time I tried to be sneaky. I thought I was being sneaky. Now, I'm 6'5", 300-something pounds, and I'm trying to be sneaky. It was 11 veterans in our county that didn't have food. I told my wife; you drive the truck. I'm going to drop the food off, and I'm going to run. Keep the

truck moving. I drop the box at the door, run, try to jump on the back of the truck so, they wouldn't catch me. You know people, hey, that big guy. You know, the big guy with the light blue jacket on.

The big guy, the Sons guy. I seen him.

But that's what we do, though. That's what it's about, and that's what the message is about because, you know what, I always thought about this. One day somebody might have to do for you.

You know, when I talk to the younger kids, I tell them, hey, don't disrespect your mother and father. They took care of you when you was born. They change you. If they keep on living, you might have to change them. That's love, y'all.

But I thank you all so very much for allowing me this opportunity. Man, it's been a great two years. My greatest success that we're able to build a veteran memorial in the county I live in through y'all's help.

I've had the opportunity to speak at a

lot of places. They asked me to come to Ft. Bragg this September to do a memorial service for the 82nd Airborne, but I told them I'll no longer be the National Chaplain, you know what I mean? If I go, I'm going as just a member.

I thank you all for this opportunity. Listen up, when we show the names of all the members that we lost this year, please, out of courtesy and respect, stand to represent your state.

Let us go to the Lord in prayer.

Heavenly Father, thank you for demonstrating how you want me to love and for giving me a heart to love and serve others. Amen.

... The Convention viewed an In Memoriam video.

Amen, amen, and amen.

Ladies and gentlemen, we will now have the candle lighting ceremony with the National Commander and the National Vice Commanders.

Now we have a musical selection.

Ladies and gentlemen, will everyone

please rise. Place your cover on. Execute a half left, half right face, face the American flags, as we render Taps.

... Playing of Taps.

NATIONAL CHAPLAIN GIBSON: Let's go to the Lord in prayer. May the Lord bless and keep us. May he grant us strength to live through troubled times. May he fill us with his grace equal to meet every need and his peace which pass all understanding. May he grant us the wisdom and the will to do justice, to love mercifully and to walk humbly with him.

May he surround us with his love and lead us in the path of everlasting life. Amen.

Before I turn it over to the Commander, ladies and gentlemen, I want to give you this as my last words. When you feel alone, God loves you and is always with you. You're never alone. Thank you so very much.

Commander.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: Please be seated. That concludes our memorial service. And

at this time, I'd like to make our chaplain a Distinguished Guest of our 51st National Convention.

I know throughout the year I could always count on Chaplain Gibson to send me memes uplifting and just nice little things. Be blessed today, and just it always uplifted me. Thank you.

At this time, I'd like to ask the Sergeant-at-Arms to bring our liaison Kevin Mook -- never mind, Kevin, would you please.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

KEVIN M. MOOK (MD): I have a couple of things to tell you. Checks. They're in progress. We should have them. We'll have them as soon as we have them. We expect to have them very soon. Yay. Okay.

Post-NEC, there's going to be pictures. There will be a photographer in the back for NEC members, new NEC, new officers in the back after Post-NEC.

And also Friday, Commander called me up.

I was sitting down here talking with the court

reporter to make sure that she's good to go, giving

me a thumbs up every once in a while, making sure

she's all right.

He called me up to talk. I wasn't ready for that. Then yesterday, my boss was here,
Chairman Newman was here. I thought I better follow him up on stage. He called me up again.
Both times I was not prepared. So, this time...

I'm prepared. But wait, there's more. I fined myself \$20 for the VCF.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: At this time, I would ask the Sergeant-at-Arms to please bring Chairman Noble and all of our youth that participated yesterday to the podium.

REPORT

National Convention Youth Academy James A. Noble (NJ), Chairman

Good morning.

All right, we're awake and alive and

going. I have a couple of quick announcements.

I'd like to thank our NECs, our liaisons on the committee. Bob Brown from Georgia. Chris Sherman from Wisconsin and David Rippe from Nebraska. Appreciate your help.

Quick footnote. There's a lot of behind the scenes nobody sees or knows what's going on.

These guys here, when we're done, they'll be in the back of the room for a few minutes, if anybody wants to give them a coin or pin, they'll gladly accept. Be careful of the challenge coins. They got me good yesterday.

Luke Wheeler. Luke is from the Detachment of Virginia.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: One more round of applause.

... Applause.

... Gavel.

JIM NOBLE (NJ): Thank you, Commander and National Officers, guests, delegates. It's been a busy three days. This old guy's going to handle it, though. All right.

Raffle tickets. Get your tickets out. Commander, it's all yours.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: It's all mine. It's always been this way, I make one person real happy and a bunch of other people mad.

... Laughter.

And I get to be the bearer of good news.

0639186. And that will be on the purple ticket.

0639186. That was a joke. It's a red ticket.

We may have a winner. Please meet

Chairman Noble in the back.

We have now come to a very special item of business, the election of National Officers. At this time, I call upon National Parliamentarian Gary Leach, who will read the Rules of the Convention governing the Nomination and Election of Officers.

RULES OF ELECTION

Gary Leach (CA)

Good morning. The rules for the

Nomination and Election of National Officers are

contained in the Uniform Code of Procedure for the

National Convention, the section under Rules of

Convention and they're Rules 17 Through 22.

Those are the ones I'll read.

Rule 17: Prior to the election of

National Officers, the National Commander shall

appoint, subject to the approval of the National

Convention, a judge of election and such number of

tellers as deemed necessary, provided that the

total number of tellers so appointed shall be an

odd number.

In a contested election, candidates going to the ballot shall be entitled to one teller of their choice.

Rule 18: Nominations for National

Officers shall be from the floor on roll call of
the Detachments alphabetically arranged. Each

Detachment may present as many candidates as it
chooses.

Rule 19: Nominating speeches for National Officers shall be limited to five minutes each. Not more than two seconding speeches shall be made for any candidate and said speeches shall be limited to three minutes.

Rule 20: When more than two candidates are nominated for any office, balloting shall continue until one candidate receives a majority of the votes of the National Convention, except in the election of National Vice Commanders.

Rule 21: In a contested election for

National Vice Commanders, balloting shall continue

until (a) majorities and (b) pluralities are

established for one or more candidates under the

following provisions: If, on any ballot taken, less than five candidates receive the necessary majority to elect, the candidate or candidates receiving a majority vote shall be declared elected and a new ballot shall be taken for the remaining number of places to be filled.

The candidate receiving the lowest number of votes on the preceding ballot shall be disqualified. Except, should two candidates remain to fill one place, a new ballot shall be taken.

Rule 22: The National Convention will nominate and elect a National Commander, and five National Vice Commanders, in this sequence.

Mr. Chairman, this completes the reading of the Rules of the Convention pertaining to the Nomination and Election of National Officers.

APPOINTMENT OF JUDGE AND TELLERS OF ELECTION

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: As Chairman of this Convention, I now appoint the following election officials: Harold Thompson, Jr., Nebraska as Judge of Election; Ed Sheubrooks, Florida; Robert Avery, New York; Scott Williams, Virginia as

Tellers of Election.

I will entertain a motion to accept the appointments of the Judge and Tellers of Election.

PAUL HAYSE (IL): Paul Hayse, Alternate NEC, Illinois, makes a motion.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: I have a motion. Is there a second?

CHRIS BEDEL (AK): Chris Bedel, Alaska, second that motion.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: There's been a motion and it's been seconded. Is there any discussion?

Hearing none, all those in favor of accepting the appointments of the Judge and Tellers of Election, signify by saying aye.

All opposed by saying nay.

... Gavel.

The ayes have it. Motion carries.

If these gentlemen would please come to the stage, we will begin with the nominating and election process. Nominations for National Commander, 2023-2024.

PNC JAMES R. HARTMAN (MD): Mr. Commander,
PNC James Hartman, Detachment of Maryland. I move
that we suspend the rules of this convention
pertaining to National Commander and nomination of
election of National Vice Commanders, which rules
shall be reinstated at the conclusion of the
election of National Vice Commanders, I so move.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: Motion on the floor. Is there a second?

JOHN LAWRENCE (LA): John Lawrence from Louisiana seconds.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: Motion and seconded. Is there any discussion? All those in favor, say aye. All those opposed, say nay.

Ayes have it. Motion carries.

National Adjutant Anthony Wright will you now call the roll call of Detachments.

The purpose of the roll call is to receive nominations for the National Commander of the Sons of the American Legion.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: During the nomination process, each Detachment will be called

alphabetically. Each Detachment has the option to nominate a person for office, second the nomination or pass.

At this time, I'd request that everybody does use the microphones for the court reporter's purposes. We're going to start with Alabama.

DETACHMENT OF ALABAMA: Alabama yields to Maryland.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Maryland.

DETACHMENT OF MARYLAND: Request permission for Past National Commander Chuck Gannon to approach for the purposes of a nomination.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: We'll grant Mr. Gannon permission.

PNC CHARLES E. GANNON (MD): Thank you.

I thought if it was all right with JR, we'll get

Sean back up here to do this.

It's been 50 years since I did my first nomination on a floor like this. And it was very different then. The audience was about the size of one of these sides here. We were outside in a pavilion with a roof with the wind blowing, and Bob

Faust was about 50 years younger, our first, actually, elected Commander.

But really what has changed is the age.

And it's not that we need to elect 10-year-olds and 15-year-olds as Commanders, but when you get home you need to remember the little guys, because if we don't start teaching them as little guys, they won't be interested when they get to be big guys. So, take that home with you.

Commander, officers on the dais, delegates, guests and friends, good morning.

Leadership, and I quote, "is more than the ability to be out front. Leadership requires a sense of how to improve." End of quote. That's what JR Hall told me a month ago when I sat down with him to get some facts. That's what he believes leadership is.

So now, allow me to present a profile in leadership. JR has been applying that philosophy since 2002 as a member of Glen Burnie Squadron 40, where he served in many elected and pointed positions, including commander several times.

If you walk into that Post, you can feel it. He's not just an SAL member, he's part of that Post, and because of him, his friends -- the SAL -- are part of that Post.

While organizing and working projects, many involving veterans, JR learned how important it is to remember those veterans of yesterday.

He soon discovered that sense of pride that comes along with directing yourself and dedicating your work to the person that is responsible for your eligibility.

In his case, that's his grandfather,

Edward Hall, a World War II veteran. You will hear

during the fall next year, "Remember More Than

Yourself." That's JR's theme.

Taking the next step in leadership has become involved in the Southern Maryland District, and this is quite the story.

Again, holding many elected and appointed positions, he found himself in the middle of a rebuilding of a district back to its position of prominence in the Detachment of Maryland. He

organized a number of Past District Commanders to help a district that was floundering and he began setting new goals and implementing new programs that eventually rekindled the Southern Maryland District back to the respected place in the Detachment of Maryland. By the way, that district is home to three Past National Commanders.

Leaders always reaching out, reaching out, for the next challenge. And in Donald JR's case, that was the Detachment activities.

The Detachment of Maryland was not floundering but new ideas and ways to make it better are always welcome. He brought that with him. Ideas, ways to do things better.

Several of his endeavors that he championed first was the creation of Laps of Love. A fun -- that's the keyword here -- a fun activity that involves the little guys, the middle guys, the big guys the old guys in the wheelchair making money for just walking around a track.

In the case of Maryland, for the first time, we actually donated, from a regular project,

for Child Welfare Foundation, something we had never did. We gave to Child Welfare Foundation but we never had a project dedicated that. Because of JR, we now do.

The big thing that happened under him, he's always been a fan of Special Olympics, even before he got involved in the Sons of the American Legion. And the Detachment was involved. But we just showed up, participated, went home.

He thought we needed more than that.

So, he gathered a group of leaders of the

Detachment of Maryland and went to the Special

Olympics and says we want to sponsor one of your events totally.

Well, that sounds like maybe no big deal.

But said can you handle a bowling tournament? That
doesn't sound like a big deal.

You're talking about two -- two -- regional tournaments. One statewide tournament.

Now, it's not so much that you had that title, but you kind of come up with about \$35,000 a year and 40 volunteers.

Because of JR, we've done that. That's

gone on now for almost 10 years.

I slow down a little bit because I'm remembering back to my little discussion with JR earlier this month, and I'll give you another quote. "Take all steps." "Take all steps." Don't go sideways. Don't take any shortcuts. Do it completely or don't do it at all.

When he was Commander, his project was

Special Olympics. Under his leadership, they

raised \$80,000. That doesn't sound like much

either. Oh, you're from the Detachment of

Maryland, that's easy. That's on top of the other

\$60,000 they raised for other projects.

But he was responsible for that \$80,000 that was set aside to help us get through the first couple of years of that endeavor to do the bowling tournament.

Now he finds himself on the steps of the National organization. How lucky can one man be, that someday he'll stand behind a podium like this and talk to an audience like this that knows what it's all about to be a volunteer.

New challenges needing new ideas, how to improve. You've just seen the little fellows and the gals up here. One of his first working ideas was a youth program as part of the National Convention. Learning while having that keyword fun.

And if it's not fun, they're not going to come. He has guided a few of the commissions, and in every case brought new ideas on how to improve. He didn't just stop there. He ran around to other commissions and committees, not just giving ideas but taking in ideas, passing them along.

If you have ever been on a conference call that he attends -- they're not all conference calls that he has to -- he always has an idea. And a lot of them are not his but they came from someone else.

You carry that on. You make sure everybody knows what works.

But JR has another life. That life that you need if you're going to move up in the Sons of the American Legion and do well in most

organizations, you have to have a family and they have to be behind you.

He has that. JR and Margie met in a church social, hard to believe, huh? They've been married for 37 years. That's a long time with one man.

If you've ever seen the TV show "Blue Bloods," there's always a scene with the family having a meal together at least once during the week.

Believe this or not, the Hall family -unless JR is somewhere where he just can't get
there and hope during that week someday, he can
have something, a picnic or something, with all of
his three children, his seven grandchildren and
normally a couple of guests.

He could probably have a Squadron meeting in that little gathering, but they do that weekly.

And if you watch the show "Blue Bloods,"
they have a big guy on the end of the table. We
have a big guy on the end of the table. God knows
they don't look alike. But they have two things in

common. One pretends to be a leader. The one on this end of the table is a leader!

But his leadership has not always been in just the Sons of the American Legion. In 1985 he started working with the Glen Burnie Recreation Council. He became a councilmember. He coached all the youth sports.

He even became a coach of a high school and did rather well.

If you know anything about JR, he still has players and fellow coaches come to him for his counsel.

When you put all this together, we know he has the confidence and the ability to work with youngsters and adults alike. Now, everything you heard over the last five or six minutes -- I'm probably running over a little bit -- brings us to the conclusion that JR is the right man at the right time as we begin the transformation of a program that's going to change not only what we do but how we do it and the culture of the Sons of the American Legion.

JR possesses and has shown he knows how to put all this experience and education into everything he is involved in.

He has proven that he is truly more than just someone that can stand out front but he possesses the qualities and sense of how to improve.

We, the Detachment of Maryland, know that JR is prepared to be an integral part of E-24 as they begin in a couple of days being gathered to make the family of The American Legion better.

As a duly certified delegate to the 51st National Convention, I proudly place the name of Donald L. "JR" Hall, Jr. into nomination for the office of National Commander for 2023-2024. Thank you.

... Applause.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Just for clarification purposes, the Detachment of Maryland nominates the name of JR Hall for National Commander. It was just a misstatement by Chuck.

He's not running for National Vice Commander. It's

a nomination for National Commander.

We'll continue alphabetically.

Alaska.

DETACHMENT OF ALASKA: Yields to California.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: California.

DETACHMENT OF CALIFORNIA: California requests that Past National Commander Michael Fox be recognized for the purposes of a second.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Permission is granted.

PNC MICHAEL C. FOX (CA): Good morning,

Sons and guests. I could stand up here for an hour

and talk about an individual, about the thousands

of hours he volunteers on a monthly basis, about

the people he inspires around him. But what's

important to our organization is a true leader, a

man that's selfless, a man that inspires everyone

around him.

There are many qualities of a leader, but leadership is the fundamental ability to motivate those around you. Leadership is by true definition

of someone that we need to command the podium. Not only to inspire you but to motivate you.

PNC RICK SANTOS (MD): You have been chosen to fill the various offices of the National Organization of the Sons of The American Legion.

You will, I know, vindicate the trust that has been reposed in you, and fulfill in every way the obligations that trust entails.

Our next installation person will be a person that's near and dear to my heart. I didn't have the opportunity to second his nomination; and so, while I've got the podium, I'm going to say a few words.

It's hard to believe how long ago it was that JR and I first met each other. I think of some tragic things, like when the Challenger blew up and 9/11 and you knew right where you were.

Will First Lady Veronica Carlton place the Commander's cap, please, and pin.

At this time, will Past Commander's father Myron Carlton place the badge.

... Applause.

PNC CHRISTOPHER A. CARLTON (IN): At this time, I'd like to make my father a Distinguished Guest to this 51st National Convention.

... Applause.

PNC JOSEPH W. GLADDEN (MD): At this time

will junior Past First Lady Veronica Carlton please present new First Lady Margie Hall with the First Lady's Badge.

NATIONAL COMMANDER CARLTON: Could we have the past First Ladies also approach.

PAST FIRST LADY VERONICA CARLTON (IN): I don't understand why I got chose to do this as the newest past SAL wife, but all of us would like to present you with a name badge for you on your travels, when you go. I will let you put that on. It's magnetic.

FIRST LADY MARGIE HALL (MD): Thank you.

PNC JOSEPH W. GLADDEN (MD): They're scheming already up there.

... Gavel.

... Clapping in unison.

... Music.

I hate to say, don't pay attention to the ladies behind the curtain but I'm not sure where

they went. Okay, let's just sit down.

... Laughter.

... Gavel.

At this time, we'll have the presentation of the National Commander's cap and badge. At this time, Past National Commander Bill Matoska will place the Commander's cap on Commander Hall.

... Applause.

And now we'll have new First Lady Margie
Hall place the Commander's badge on Commander Hall.

... Applause.

Now it's my great honor, I would like to present to you the 2023-2024 National Commander of the Sons of the American Legion, Mr. Donald "JR" Hall.

... Cheers and Applause.

At this time, I'd like to present the Commander with his gavel.

... Gavel.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Here we are again, another year, another great year that Commander Carlton led us in.

I want to thank Commander Carlton for so many lessons that he taught me. The first lesson I learned from Commander Carlton was last year, when he was on stage, and I'm going to prove to him that he taught me the lesson, and I'm not going to forget my wife. So, I want to thank my wife.

I want to thank my wife for always being there for me, supporting me, and always, always being by my side.

This journey didn't start today, though.

This journey started in 1943, when my grandfather,

Ed Hall, went to the Army and fought for our

country. And today, all I am is a representative

of my grandfather's service.

We're going to go through a lot of things. But I want to take time to acknowledge a couple of the guests that are here that I'm going to be so lucky to serve with and give them a chance to speak. In a couple of days, we're going to have probably the best National Commander ever. I said so. You

believe it.

... Laughter.

Coming from the great state of Wisconsin, please welcome my friend and will be my Commander, Mr. Dan Seehafer.

... Applause.

DANIEL J. SEEHAFER (WI): Holy Moley.

... Laughter.

I'm almost speechless. That's a very humbling, humbling intro. And I thank you for that, but I also believe we're going to have a great, great family team.

... Applause.

And I can feel it already, and not that feeling -- because feelings can be so mixed -- but there's something different going on right now.

And I think we can feel it. I think you would agree, there's something that is just about to happen this upcoming year. And something special.

And we talk about it. I know I basically have spilled the beans on it but I'm really about servant leadership. And right there is the

Commander, right there, talking about that.

... Applause.

So, when we talk about competence, when we talk about character, when we talk about commitment, I want you to think of this man right here, and what a special, awesome upcoming year we -- not him, me or even Lisa -- what we are going to have -- we. And there will be this number (raising an index finger) that we're going to think about -- one, as in "Be the One." So that's enough for me.

Thank you, JR, for sharing your moment because take it in. This is a special moment. And let's work together, being the one, changing lives and saving lives. That's what we are about. Never forget that. And never stop. Together, forever.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: I do want to say, with Dan is his wife, Stacey. Stacey is sitting back there.

... Applause.

... Music.

I was in membership in Indianapolis, I went there, and I had the opportunity to stay and speak on behalf of the Sons of the American Legion. And when I did, the Commander, he brought on a speech that just fired everybody up, and he walked off the stage with "Eye of the Tiger" playing.

And that was the inspiration because it's all about inspiring people.

And when I got a chance to speak behind him, I said, remember, this song starts up, rise up, rising up, back in the streets.

And that's what we all need to do. We do too much in our Posts. We're talking to people that are already members. We've got to get out in the streets and get those members.

I want to introduce -- let me introduce to you the other part of our team that will also be elected very soon. The wildcat.

She comes from Alaska. Almost sounds

like I'm going to announce a fighter or something -- hailing from Alaska -- coming out here, a great friend, and I'm telling you, with the three of us, we're going to have fun. You heard Chuck say it earlier. We're going to have fun. We're going to get out. We're going to get the work done. We're not going to sit still. We'll go out there, in the streets and get the work done. Please welcome my friend and soon to be elected President of the Auxiliary, American Legion Auxiliary Ms. Lisa Williamson.

... Music.

LISA WILLIAMSON (AK): With the gavel, I can use your gavel. I might keep it.

... Laughter.

Well, first of all, tough act to follow. Thank you, Dan. I've had a little extra -- I've had, thanks to COVID, an extra year to plan for this. This week, a lot of people came up to me, like, are you ready? Are you ready? Now I need another couple days.

... Laughter.

No, I am ready. I am super thrilled to be serving together with both Dan and JR.

It's not about me, and I've said this many times. My department's heard me say this.

It's not about me. It's about our mission. And I truly believe that.

It's about our mission of supporting our military and our veterans and the families in our communities, and our family as a whole -- Legion, the Auxiliary, the SAL, the Riders -- as a whole, we can accomplish so much more as a family. And I truly believe that.

My family, my kids were raised in this family. JR's family. We're all family. And I truly appreciate this opportunity.

If there's one thing that COVID has taught us that nothing is 100 percent. And nothing is for sure. But should I be elected Wednesday morning; I am honored and I am humbled to represent The American Legion Auxiliary and to do it beside JR and Dan. Thank you so much.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: You know, a lot of people talk about -- a lot of people talk about Legion family, but you don't see them exercise it. And that's what we just did.

It's not just my day. It's all of our day. And I hope we just exercised the right that everybody should take and make sure that you take care of your family. Make sure your family's there. Make sure everybody knows who your family is.

I'm going to ask my family to start making their way up here so we can move quickly when we do things, up around the stage here.

And I want to tell you me and Lisa are lucky because when they heard that we were going to be together they gave us a preacher to go with us.

... Laughter.

So, all along the way we'll have somebody there that we know is in contact that can get us through.

I'm going to have my wife and family come

up. And I'd like to start off before I give anybody else the right to be a Distinguished Guest under me to make my family Distinguished Guests of this Convention.

PNC JOSEPH W. GLADDEN (MD): That was

JR's wife Margie. And there is Chrissy and her

husband Tim; TJ, grandson; Donny, his son; crystal,

his daughter-in-law; Cody, his grandson; Dee, his

daughter; Kaden his grandson -- K-dog, sorry,

K-dog. His friends call him K-D. MacKenzie, his

granddaughter; Stanley; and Brian. Uncles? Uncle

Stanley cousin Brian. His West Virginia cousin.

... Laughter.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Thank you. You can all return to your seats.

I bring them up and do that because they have made a lot of sacrifices. Had to move some parties or do it without me. But you don't do this without your family. You can't do it without your family. I have such a great family.

At this time, I'd like to show off how

much my Maryland family cared and came here today.

Maryland, would you please stand, be recognized.

... Cheers and Applause.

They showed up, didn't they?

FROM THE FLOOR: JR, we love you!

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: I love you too.

FROM THE FLOOR: We love you, honey bunny.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: That's nice.

I'm going to be a honey bunny.

... Laughter.

Thanks to the family for all the support.

Maryland, I couldn't be here without you. I

couldn't be here without you.

My slogan for this year, "Representing More Than Me." Think about it. Don't we all represent more than just ourselves?

As a member of the Sons, I represent my grandfather's service. As a member of the Sons, you represent your family's service. As a member of the Auxiliary, you represent your family's service. And if you served, then you represent

your branch of service. You represent your family.

Representing more than me is big. It's big. It's

why I'm here. I wouldn't be here. I wouldn't be

here if it wasn't for my grandfather's service.

That's what it's all about. I got to be the best I

can be because of him.

I know, even though he's not with me, he tripped me. He'd do something while I was walking to get me back if I didn't do it right, because my grandfather was that kind of sneaky guy. He would get me back.

I'll do my best to represent these folks right here, Maryland. I'm going to do my best.

... Cheers and Applause.

I am going to do my best to represent every blue cap member of the Sons of the American Legion because for the Sons that's really where the work gets done. The Blue Cap members is what it's truly all about.

... Applause.

You know, as a Son, one of your family members, they took the oath to fight for our

country if needed and to give their life.

Are you as Sons going to make that membership worth it? If they're willing to give their life, are you willing to make your membership that good? Are you going to represent them that strong?

If not, turn in your card. We don't need you. We need the ones that are getting ready to work. We need the ones that are going to get out there and make sure our veterans are getting what they need because we're getting on VoterVoice.

We're backing legislation to tell them to give our veterans what they need. We need the ones that make sure the children of the veterans are getting what they want. We need the ones that are working in the community. That's what we need. We don't need somebody that's a bar member. We need real workers.

... Cheers and Applause.

So, I ask you to do a little soul searching. Are you representing your family the best you can? Are you as committed today as when

you signed up? At times, we all get into our routines, and you know we just do what we know we do, what works. And is that enough?

Doesn't it bother you when you hear, well, that's just how we do it? Let's recommit ourselves to finding new and better ideas. New ways of doing things and showing our commitment to our family's service.

The Sons had a great year last year, hitting a new all-time high in membership of over 375,000 members.

... Applause.

Can we get to 400,000?

FROM THE FLOOR: Yeah!

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Yes, we can. I heard yesterday, Butch Ray said, everybody sign up one member and we're there. 375,000 times two takes us over 700,000. So, we really should get to

400 pretty easy.

Let everybody know what you're doing.

Ring your bell. When you get back to work and you get outside the Post, make sure everybody knows.

Use every form of getting on Facebook and in the newspaper and in the news and let everybody know what The American Legion Family does!

So many great things are going on all the time, and the only people to hear about it is the person that you're working with! We've got to get the word out there! We've got to let everybody know who and what we are!

We must share our story with everyone.

Did you know that less than 10 percent of our

country is veterans? That means there's over

90 percent that's eligible possibly for the Sons or

Auxiliary.

We need to get that 90 percent. And we need to find out what they can do. Everybody might not be able to stand up all day and work something, but maybe they can bake a cake and raise some money for veterans. Maybe they can do something at home.

Everybody can do something for The

American Legion Family. Let's get everybody out
there who's representing more than themselves.

... Applause.

American Legion Family Day, it's coming up April 27th. It actually started last year. It was rolled out but not with a lot of flare. I'd like to have a commitment from everybody in the room, this year we make American Legion Family Day something big.

Get a hold of the press in your neighborhoods. Get a hold of your community.

Bring them in your Post. Show everybody what we do. Make it a four-pillar day.

I'm a four-pillar guy. If you know me you know that about me. Do something. Have a blood drive that day. Put some free hot dogs out there, a moon bounce. That will get the kids and those young parents back into your Posts.

And then let them know what we do. Let them know what OCW is about and what CWF is about. And let them know what we stand for and what we're about.

We're about taking care of our veterans and we're about taking care of our children and our community. Let's do that on American Legion Family

Day. April 27th, all over the world, we ought to open up all the Post doors and bring everybody in and have a great day celebrating with our people and our communities and making it a special day.

With so many leaders in this room, you have to ask why we need to be inspired more.

Because there's not a lot of inspiration that happens at times. We've fallen into routines, and that's not good.

We've got to be inspired! We've got to be inspired. Take time, talk to a veteran. Ask them about their service, maybe something that happened. And if that don't inspire you, I don't know what can.

I have a friend with me here today that I met in fourth grade. He became a member of the U.S. Army, an Army Ranger. Worked at the Pentagon and thought that he needed to come here today to support me. Don't he know my job's to support him? Thank you for being here, Eddie.

... Applause.

It's time we roll up our sleeves. I say

thank you to a man on the stage with me here, I

call him Poppy, Bill Matoska. Years ago, he m
took

aside and he said, you want to get involved in

this? I said, I do. He said, roll up your

sleeves, let's get to work.

I followed him. He's led me. He's worked with me. I should say "on me" to get me ready for this day. Poppy, I can't thank you enough.

... Applause.

Let's support the Four Pillars. I'm going to throw out a Commander's challenge this year. This one goes to the Blue Cap members, to become a national Four Pillar Squadron. All you have to do is this. A dollar a member for OCW. A dollar a member for CWF. A dollar a member for your department's Boys State and hold a blood drive.

That simple. \$3 a member and hold a blood drive, and you'll get a certificate from the National Organization that you're a Four Pillar Squadron. That's what every Squadron should be.

... Applause.

We need to keep our eyes and ears open,
family. You probably heard me say it before. We
play a critical part in "Be the One." Sometimes
veterans don't like opening up to not another
veteran, but we are family members. We have eyes
and ears and we can see things happen. We can make
sure that if we see a veteran that needs help that
we find the help for them.

We need to make sure that we're ready to be the one. You don't have to be the one that takes the veteran in for help. All you have to do is be the one to get the help for him.

When I was Detachment Commander I went to work one day. One of my buddies came up to me and said, JR, Will's not doing good. I know you're a member of The American Legion. Can you come down here and talk to him?

I went down, talked to him. I said, what's wrong? He said, I just don't want to be here. Will was a veteran. Had struggles. The night before they found him naked, laid out in his

living room, having bad dreams and everything.

I said, Will, come on. Let's go home.

Let me give you a ride home and go have lunch. He said, no, I don't want to be "here" no more. I don't want to be alive.

I didn't know what to do, so I reached out to my Department Commander Carolyn Baker. And I said, Carolyn, who can I call right now to get help? And she said, let me give you Russell Meyer's cell phone number.

Within 25 minutes we had him in Crownsville, inside there, getting him help.

I wasn't the one to be able to do that.

I was the one to reach out to the right person. I was the one to make sure Russell Meyer would help me, Carolyn Baker would help me be the one to save his life.

Now he works and he's making \$82 an hour driving around with an ear pod in his ear and loving life.

... Applause.

So, I just ask you all, you don't have to

be the one to drag a veteran anywhere. Just be prepared to help when you know it. Be prepared to know who to call.
