Reading Of The Convention Call

Anthony P. Wright (PA), National Adjutant

Pursuant to Article V, Section 2 of the National Constitution of the Sons of The American Legion, the National Commander Midwest of the Sons of The American Legion hereby calls for the 52nd National Convention of the Sons of The American Legion to be held August 23rd through August 25th, 2024 in the Ernest N. Morial Convention Center, in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Purpose: National Convention sessions, in accordance with the Uniform Code of Procedure for National Conventions, will be convened at 1:00 pm on Friday, August 23, 2024. The 52nd Annual National Convention shall be convened for the

following purposes: To complete all business of the Sons of The American Legion for the fiscal year 2023-2024; To vote on all resolutions which are properly presented to the National Convention; To consider and make amendments to the National Constitution and/or By-Laws of the Sons of The American Legion; To elect a National Commander and five National Vice Commanders, in that sequence, for the ensuing year, 2024-2025. Elections shall take place on August 25, 2024.

Representation: Representation in the National Convention shall be allotted in accordance with the provisions of Article V of the National Constitution of the Sons of The American Legion which states in part:

Article V, Section 3. In the National Convention, each Detachment shall be entitled to three delegates and one additional delegate for each 500 Members, or major fraction thereof, whose current dues have been received by the National Treasurer of The American Legion, thirty days prior to the meeting of said National Convention, and

whose registration fees, as fixed by the National Executive Committee, for its total authorized delegate strength, has been paid, and to one alternate for each delegate.

Article V, Section 4. Each duly registered delegate shall be entitled to one vote. The vote of any registered delegate absent and not represented by an alternate shall be cast by the majority of the registered delegates present from one's Detachment.

Alternates for registered delegates shall have all the privileges of registered delegates except that of voting. A registered delegate is one who has received one's credentials and has paid such registration fees as may be required.

Article VI, Section 6. All Past National Commanders, while in good standing in their respective Squadrons, shall be members for life of the National Executive Committee, without a vote, and shall also be life delegates to all National Conventions of the Sons of The American Legion, with vote, to be exercised with their respective

detachments.

Article VII, Section 3. Members of the National Executive Committee shall be delegates to the National Convention with a vote, which shall be exercised with their respective detachments, except that the vote of the National Vice Commander shall be exercised only in their capacity as chair of the National Convention.

Good afternoon.

FROM THE FLOOR: Good afternoon!

ROBERT E. NEWMAN (IN): I want to congratulate the Sons of the American Legion for celebrating its 92nd anniversary and the 52nd Annual National Convention here in New Orleans.

As we look forward to the 100th anniversary in 2032, at the convention, just eight short years away, it's not just a milestone but

momentous occasion that we should all be eagerly anticipating.

Have you begun thinking about how to celebrate this historic centennial?

The Sons of the American Legion continue to impress and raise the bar with their hard work and dedication to our country and our communities.

Your veteran families, as well as veterans and Legionnaires, are proud of you. Not only reaching but surpassing your membership goal is a testament to your dedication and commitment.

The SAL has achieved an all-time high for the second year. Congratulations.

... Applause.

As of July 31st of this year, out of the 5,736 squadrons, only 1,914 Consolidated Squadron Reports were submitted, for a total of 33.4 completion rate.

Last year, 1,947 submitted for a 31.1 completion rate. There's a lot of room for improvement here. Let us take this as a challenge and aim for 50 percent submission rate next year.

CSR data is vitally important and gets incorporated into The American Legion National Commander's testimony before Congress. Your dedication shows this year's squadrons collectively donated more than \$10,434,722.

And volunteered over 5,383,300 hours, supporting the various Legion programs and VAs around the country. It's you, the Sons, who continue to set an example how a veterans support organization should be modeled. Your contributions are not just impressive, they are invaluable.

While those numbers are impressive, I will bet they're much higher. This is derived from just 33.4 of the CSRs submitted. Just imagine what it would be like if everyone submitted theirs.

You've also raised the bar on fundraising by consistently donating to Child Welfare

Foundation since 1987. The Sons have donated over

\$10 million to CWF this program year alone. It is
\$489,185.30.

You have led the way with pride, honor

and integrity, considering the total donations for the year were \$723,348.13. The Sons have made great strides to mirror the procedures and processes of The American Legion on many levels.

As you know, the SAL can now be renewed online using legion.org to renew. We have had over 7,679 members take advantage of this process so far.

Have a great convention and continue to exemplify what a Veterans Support Organization should be.

Before I sign off, my father -- I gained my right to be an SAL member from my father, who served in World War II as a combat medic and fought in the Battle of The Bulge in 1944. I'm a proud member of Squadron 97 from the great state of Indiana.

Good morning. This past year, what a year we've had. At the beginning of the year we put out a challenge to beat last year's membership and arrive at 105 percent.

We crushed last year's goal. We're currently standing at 103 percent. I can live with 103. That's just phenomenal.

We did hit another all-time high. As of August 22nd, the Membership Report was 393,578 - beating last year's all-time high by more than 12,835 members, while making every goal this year and barely missing the 100 percent goal.

Since coming out of COVID, we have gained 37,527 members in the last three years.

Yeah, right. The total new members this year are 52,218, with 18 detachments over

90 percent retention rate; 20 detachments over

105 percent; 46 of the 55 detachments over

100 percent; with every region over 105 percent.

And 67 new squadrons.

If you guys just didn't do a phenomenal job this year, you all deserve a round of applause. You really did a great job.

I want to thank everybody on the committee for all your hard work this past year and

making it possible to break every record ever set by the Sons of the American Legion membership and setting new all-time highs across the board.

Especially you, the member, all of you.

If it was not for all of your hard work combined, we would not be where we are today.

It is good, good to be here! I know my brother, my friend, and I know he's taking care of himself -- he has a little issue -- and I'm sure he's watching, but later on, Brother Hall, we'll gather together, and we'll do this and maybe eat three olives or something like that. We'll be all right.

I'll tell you what, brothers, it is good, so good to be here. It's really our family reunion, isn't it?

But throughout the year, we gathered, we gathered together as a family, and I've been saying this: We have come together with two things, and that's what I've been kind of delivering throughout my journey, and that is relevance and purpose.

Because I always say this, why in the world are you here? Why would you give your time, your talent and even your treasure, in some cases, to gather, to volunteer to work?

There has to be purpose and there has to be relevance. Guaranteed. And with that, there is no greater than this.

I also get "how it changed my life." I get that response as well. Again, whatever program it may be or the money that we raise for our foundations, it changes lives, and it saves lives. There's no doubt about that. Talking about purpose and talking about relevance.

So I understand being a reverend, having

the floor, that can be dangerous sometimes. But I know when to wrap her up. I just want to say thank you, first of all, for giving all of you a commercial break, yours truly, all right.

Legion. I learned an awful lot following Commander

Seehafer over the course of the years. I guess you

could say I'm following God, so I picked up on

that.

I'm here today to say thank you, thank

you to the Sons of the American Legion. Thank you for all that you do. The American Legion, you are the forefront, the strong arm of this great organization taking care of and raising funds for the Child Welfare Foundation, and you guys do one helluva job with that. So I just want to say thank you.

Commander Jim, what's your sense of direction for

next year? And I make it clear, and sometimes my

terminology gets me in trouble, and sometimes it

don't. I let everybody know that I'm not changing

a damn thing because, when something works, you

don't change it, and I'm committed to maintaining

consistency from Commander Troiola's year, through

Commander Seehafer's year, and with my year, and

the consistency I'm talking about is maintaining

our number one mission.

Our number one mission of Be the One.

We'll maintain our charitable fund-raising

endeavors with the Veterans & Children Foundation,

with primary focus on quality of life for our

veterans, our active duty troops, and their

families.

We together need to be the ears and the eyes of America, taking care of our veterans and their families. We need to be there for one another. With our mission of Be the One, we need to continue educating one another, continue educating our neighbors and our peers. Educate them with our Be the One mission on saving the life of a veteran, but it goes beyond saving the life of a veteran because it's not just a veteran that's committing suicide, we have our active duty, we have their children.

Don't forget about the children of the military families. There's a lot of loss with the children. There's also a lot of loss with the spouses. But we can really grow and make a difference with saving the lives by reaching into the community and saving the life of a neighbor, saving the life of a stranger. We need to destignatize the thoughts and ideologies people have with TBI, PTSD, any form of mental health issues. Let them know that it is okay to not be

okay as long as we are there for them.

We must listen to them, speak to them, and do not hesitate to ask the tough questions.

Good afternoon, family. Please, you look like you're still standing. I'm going to tell you these lights are bright. Past the first row, you can't see squat. It is great to be here. I have 393,000 thank you's for you guys. 393,000. That's right, you guys are knocking it out of the park

second year in a row with an all-time high. Give yourself another hand.

... Applause.

You are getting it done. You know, it is great to be here, kind of a surprise this morning that my friend Terry Harris would be -- how's Terry doing?

... Applause.

You know, for having just a few hours to prepare, he's knocking it out of the park. The thing I like, I look here, he's got a script he's got to follow. He's got no idea what I'm going to say. Neither do I. I told Terry one time he would make a heck of a National Commander, and I still think that was true at the time.

NVC TERRY A. HARRIS (KS): Thank you, Dan.

DAN K. WILEY (KS): You're welcome. I'm not done, buddy. So we have been blessed this past year as an American Legion family with excellent leadership, haven't we? Commander Seehafer,

President Williamson, and Commander Don "J.R." Hall Jr. How did he do?

... Applause.

You know, Commander, I wish you were here today because I had a couple of stories to tell about you, and I'm going to still tell them because I know you're watching online. It was an honor to cross paths -- too much Seehafer probably. I'm crossing too much stuff.

Anyway, we crossed paths a couple of times this past year. So he's in a Detachment, and he gets introduced to speak, and they introduce him as Dr. Hall. Yeah, so he gets up, he speaks, he's like, well, that was odd, but he's polite, not going to say anything about it. Gets to the next stop, they introduce him as Dr. Hall, and he's like, okay, hold on, wait a minute. What's this Dr. Hall stuff? They said what do you mean, it says right here, Don "J.R." Hall Jr., MD. MD? Maryland, right? True story.

I've got another true story. We were in Alaska, and I say this a little tongue in cheek. I

saved his life. It's true. We were in Kenai, and we had a chance to take a van with a driver to the Homer spit. That was really kind of cool, except for the ride there. It was about an hour, hour and a half van, and our driver had been in the convention all week, this Alaska department convention.

And he's driving, and I'm sitting in the passenger seat, and J.R. is in the seat behind the driver. We also had National Vice Commander Randy Edwards in the van, and our driver is nodding off, and so I'm engaging him in conversation, making sure he stays awake. And I got distracted for a moment, and I look up, and we are about the white line swerving kind of hard. We are one or two seconds away from running off the road.

I don't know if you've ever been to

Alaska, but the roads in Alaska, you might have a

5-foot drop-off, and you might have a 500-foot

drop-off. We were one to two seconds from

certain

crash, and I yelled at the driver rather loudly and woke him up. Boy, we pulled back just in time. So

we got to Homer Spit, we had a good time, and you know who drove on the way back, right? Yeah.

I give the guy credit; he was a good guy.

I said, is it okay if I drive on the way back? He said, yeah, that would probably be best. Thank you.

He didn't fall asleep once on the way home.

I know J.R. and I laughed about that a little bit. J.R., I know you're watching online, Doc. Love you, man. It is great to be here.

I think Terry would tell you that, as a Department Commander, I was extremely inclusive of the American Legion family in everything we did, and I am a strong believer in the American Legion family, and I'll tell you why. My wife is a member of the auxiliary. My daughter is a member of the Auxiliary. My son is a member of the Sons of the American Legion. And, oh, yeah, before I forget --

I am a proud member of the Sons of the American Legion honoring my grandfather's service during World War I.

But that's not the only reason I'm a strong believer in the American Legion family. I'll tell you why I'm a strong believer. When I traveled the state of Kansas, and now as I travel these United States of America, when you walk into a post, you can tell within a matter of minutes whether that post is successful or not, and I guarantee you the most often common denominator on successful posts are those posts operating as a family!

... Applause.

Those posts that understand it's the mission and not who gets the credit, the cause and not the applause. It's those posts, those posts, units, squadrons, and chapters that are working together. Those are the posts that are successful.

You know, I can give you many examples of posts that wouldn't even exist if it weren't for the unit, the chapter, or the squadron, and I'm going to do that exactly with Kansas and a squadron we have in Kansas. I hope that wasn't my time up because I'm not done.

... Laughter.

Getting close, though. We have a squadron in Kansas that the post would not exist if the squadron wasn't there. It's in northwest Kansas.

Northwest Kansas is sparsely populated. In fact, our Detachment Commander Jim Gallentine -- Jim, are you in the audience? Yeah, he's right back there.

He's kind of shy.

Jennings Post 351 has roughly 18 members of the American Legion. That's not unusual, by the way, for western Kansas. Jennings Squadron 351 has 72 members.

... Applause.

That's right. They have four times as many members of the squadron as they do in the post. That post would not exist today but for the squadron. They keep the doors open. That's what you do.

As I get ready to close, I want to thank you again 10 million times. You know what's that for, right? You bet; you surpassed the \$10 million threshold of giving to the Child Welfare

Foundation. Give yourself another round of applause. Great job.

Now, normally I would close at this point with God bless you, God bless The American Legion family, God bless our troops, and God bless the United States of America, but I'm not going to do that. I'm going to do something different.

Who was at membership workshop? Give me a shout out. Five of you. Well you know what's coming then. We've got five from Kansas, and they don't even shout. What's wrong with you guys back there, man?

Anyway, we just finished the Olympics. I swell with pride every time I hear the National Anthem. They play that at the Olympics for the gold medal award winner, and every time there's a chant of USA.

I can still remember as a teenager the Olympic games and the Miracle on Ice at Lake Placid, hearing the USA chant at the end of that hockey game, the hair on the back of my neck stood

up.

Folks, that's what we're going to do today. In a minute, we're all going to rise, and I'm going to ask you what's the greatest nation on earth? And you are going to give me five or six good USAs. I want it loud, and I want it proud. You ready to do this? All right.

Everybody, stand up. If you're ready, I want it loud and proud. What is the greatest nation on earth?

USA! USA! USA! USA!

Awesome. Thank you, guys.

Final Report

John R. Cook (NH) National Vice Commander - Northeast Sons of the American Legion

But here we are, being on stage with my

wife Denise, having my cap and pin installed as the National Vice Commander was an experience I'll never forget. I was blessed to have some of our family here to celebrate the occasion, and I know in my heart my mom and dad were looking down smiling.

I made a commitment to myself and to

Commander Hall to be the best Vice Commander I

could be, and I did my best. As someone who didn't

know what a Zoom meeting was, I had to learn pretty

quick, those meetings sometimes 5, sometimes 12.

I've now mastered the Zoom meetings. Well maybe not

mastered, but I feel pretty comfortable with them.

I thoroughly enjoyed sitting in these committee meetings, commissions, Zoom meetings. They were all very well attended and extremely informative, brainstorming and learning at its finest.

I was able to forward the minutes to the committees and the committeemen meeting on those attachments. I was amazed at how much information we got out to these people. I got return e-mails,

phone calls, some saying thank you, some saying great information, some thanking you for sending it all forward and being very helpful.

It was a great feeling to know that the detachments wanted and appreciated the monthly update that we were sending out to them.

Visitations was my most fun part of being the National Vice Commander for me. I got invited to several detachments, D.C. meetings, and conventions. My first one was in the Delaware, followed by Pennsylvania, New Hampshire, and Massachusetts, New Jersey, and New York. As lead candidate, I went to Vermont and Maine.

While we were in Delaware, I attended a pig roast in Delaware, visited the Monster Mile, drove the International Speedway. Also in Delaware, I was very impressed to see that The American Legion had an American Legion ambulance family service. Let me give you a little history about that.

David C. Harris, American Legion Post 14

Ambulance Service. In 1924 the members of the David

C. Harris American Legion Post 14 initiated the first American Legion ambulance service in the world. Its 18 founding members were veterans of World War I who volunteered their time for the sick and the injured to the hospitals in Wilmington, Dover, and Milford and beyond.

Prior to this time, persons in medical need were transferred by train. This practice was dangerous, and the patients were seriously ill and needed the treatment.

At the time of the founding, services were provided to districts that extended from Summit Bridge to Milford, originally located on South Main Street in Smyrna.

In 2013 the ambulance service dedicated a brand new building at the intersection of Route 6 and 300, cross street of Smyrna and Clayton. The David C. Harris Post 14 American Legion Ambulance Service has become a continuous service for the now serving Delaware Bay to the Maryland border, from Collins Beach to Garrison Lake. Staffed by volunteers, staff and service was responsible for

answering more than 25,000 calls for assistance during its first 75 years.

In '22 alone station 64 answered more than 5,000 calls just in 2022. That's quite a feat to have an ambulance service. I thought that was pretty cool when I went out there. That was quite a bit to see out there.

I was privileged to attend the New York

Sons 50th Anniversary Convention. What a time we had up there. It was very warm. We had a great time in Niagara Falls, and we got to go in the boat and go up to Niagara, very well up there.

I visited new people, new squadrons seeing how they fundraise and how they care for our veterans was the very favorite part of my job.

Hopefully, I answered or got the answers for the questions you had.

I've been able to share some of the ideas with other detachments as well as bring ideas back to my own detachments and Squadrons. I would also like to thank you all today for having a new all-time high in membership. We've been hearing that

390-some-odd thousand all day. It's from you people out there. That's where this all comes from. It's not one of us, it's family.

I would also like to thank you all for the \$10 million mark for the CWF. What a feat that is. Again, it's a family, it's all of us. Not just one or two of us or one or two detachments. All of us together. I thank you for that. Without all of your hard work and dedication, this would not have happened.

I see a bright future for the Sons of the American Legion. Let's go out there and get them 400,000 memberships. Let's get that 400,000. Make that mark.

With that, remember what Commander said,

Be the One, Be the One. It's working. It is saving

lives. They're proving that. It's not just the

veterans. So let's get out there and Be the One.

It was truly an honor to serve you as National Vice Commander of the Northeast Region. God bless you and thank you every one of you.

Report

The Americanism Committee

Chris M. Casey, Chairman National Convention Americanism Committee

Good afternoon, National officers, chairmen, committeemen, Past National Commanders, Sons, and guests. The Americanism Convention Committee met earlier this morning. First, I'd like to thank all the commission members of the Americanism Commission for their willingness to dedicate their time for the betterment of our organization and the consultants. They did a great job this year.

I'd also like to thank the previous

Americanism chairmen for their continued guidance.

With over 61 members in attendance, more than half standing, so very thankful that they stood it out.

Had great representation of all the regions, like we typically do for Americanism. The accomplishments this year were outstanding.

I don't know if that really expresses what we accomplished as Sons of the American Legion with regards to Americanism this year. I'd like to share some of the numbers really quick before we get to the awards.

The donations for Americanism programs for 2023-2024 totaled \$4,822,305.12.

... Applause.

That's an increase of over 1.3 million from the previous year and an increase of greater than 2.5 million in the past two years. Hours donated were 4,635,499. That's an increase of over 2.9 million hours. That value to our communities is over \$155 million. That's an increase of over \$100 million from the last year.

The Sons of the American Legion, we just continue to knock it out of the park with

Americanism, as well as everything else we do. I believe the numbers put up earlier, Americanism might have been about half of all the donations.

There's a lot of programs, a lot of children and youth activities in Americanism. So it

doesn't -- it's not surprising that we'd be heavy
in donations there.

The commission had some special goals this year. I just wanted to point out numbers for a couple of them.

Flag education programs. So we had the Legion's National Commander mention America in his message to us. We had Dan Wiley, Trailing Candidate for National Commander from the great state of Kansas, having us chant "USA, USA." We're kind of building to this Americanism thing.

Flag education is one of those things that I just firmly believe is so important to the youth in our country. We had 97,436 hours. That's an increase of 41,279 hours from the previous year. Again, to reiterate what the I&A chairman said, that's only about a third of our CSRs. So the goal was 10 percent increase. The Sons made that happen with 74 percent increase in flag education programs.

The commission moved forward with judging

of the scrapbooks. We'd like to thank everyone who participated doing that too. We had more scrapbooks and history books than we've ever had according to Hammer, our Vice Chairman, who's been around a lot longer than I have. That wasn't meant to be a dig. He just has a lot of experience.

Americanism Awards

We'll now move on to recognize those who excelled in Americanism this year. Starting with the Atwood-Beyea-York Memorial Award. I promised you guys last year that I'd have a PowerPoint, but it fell through the cracks. I hope it didn't fall through the cracks this year. There we go. If we could go just one slide forward. There we go. These are our brothers, gentlemen.

Gerald Atwood was a member of Sons of the American Legion Squadron 1060, Brooklyn, New York. Gerald was a New York City firefighter assigned to Ladder 21 and was among hundreds of firemen killed after responding to the World Trade Center on that fateful day. Gerald was an eight-year veteran of the FDNY working out of Hell's Kitchen. He grew up

in the Old Mill Basin neighborhood of Brooklyn, graduating from North Shore High School and spent two years at Kingsborough Community College.

Next, Edward Beyea was a life member of Sons of the American Legion Squadron 173 in Bath, New York, and worked as a computer programmer for Empire Blue Cross and Blue Shield in the World Trade Center. Mr. Beyea needed full-time care for the last 21 years of his life, ever since a diving accident left him a quadriplegic. He refused to be limited by his disability and learned how to type using a stick that he operated with his mouth.

Mr. Beyea, along with his friend and colleague, Abe Zelmanowitz, who refused to leave Mr. Beyea's side after the terror attack, waited together on the 27th floor for rescue workers, who could not get there in time.

Raymond York was a member of Broad

Channel Sons of the American Legion Squadron 1404,

where he held the office of Third Vice Commander.

One of New York's bravest, he gave his life on

September 11th, 2001, while attempting to save his

fellow citizens during the terror attack on the World Trade Center. A veteran firefighter with Engine Company 255 in Queens, Mr. York had been assigned a light duty due to an on-the-job injury.

On 9/11, he was playing the role of Fireman Ray in the fire safety show at Rockefeller Center, he made his way to the burning towers by hitching a ride in a television truck and an ambulance. His remains were found the next day on West Street. Raymond York, who worked with the FDNY for 20 years, had planned to retire at the end of 2001.

To quote a passage from Gerald's eulogy,

"After all is said and done, it is not how or where
we finish our journey that champions our greatness,
it's how we live."

The Atwood-Beyea-York Memorial Award for best Americanism program goes to Squadron Ronald Reagan, Palisades Squadron No. 283, Pacific Palisades, California.

And the Detachment winner is Ohio. Congratulations.

While they're coming up, if we could have a representative from the following detachments make your way to the stage: Arizona, Arkansas, Connecticut, Iowa, Maryland, Michigan, Montana, Nebraska, Ohio, and Texas.

Now for the National Emergency Fund. I think we'll take a little pause while people can get some pictures.

We're going to move on. The National Emergency Fund given to the highest Detachment per capita donation by region. First place this year, Southeast Region, Arkansas with \$6.02. Second, the West Region, Montana, \$1.46. Third, Northeast, Connecticut, 50 cents. Fourth, Midwest, Nebraska, 35 cents. Fifth, Central Michigan, 13 cents.

... Cheers.

Is that Michigan? Somebody's excited.

Now for the Legacy Scholarship Fund for the highest donation, Detachment donation by region. First is Northeast, Maryland, with \$9,900.

Second, the Central, Ohio with \$3,225. Third, West, Arizona \$1,500. The Midwest, Iowa with \$1,000. And the fifth, Southeast, Texas, \$550.

Final Report

James Fischer, Sr. (CA) National Vice Commander - West Sons of the American Legion

Good afternoon, all. What an honor it's been to serve this year. I want to take a moment to talk about Be the One. On October 2nd, my nephew Kyle took his life. He's the son of a veteran. It's very devastating for our family, and we need to keep the discussions very open. It's so important, our mental health.

Now I'll get back to membership. I'd like to thank our Membership Chairman Daryl and our former Chair Tom for pushing the changes on the awards. We now have a lot more awards for the smaller and larger detachments, and it makes it a little fairer.

The Western Rendezvous we hold for the Western Region in Nevada every year, and this year it was fantastic, it was huge, biggest one we've had so far. Nevada proudly hosts that, and we love it. We also discussed the online myLegion. We need to work on that. We have a lot of rural Squadrons

that are not up to speed, and we need to get them up to speed. It's going to be so important the next couple of years.

The Western Region is doing really well this year. We have 6 of the top 10 detachments percentagewise. Number one, New Mexico, at 123.77 percent. Latin America at number three at 118.18 percent. Number five, Arizona at 110.61 percent. Hawaii at 110 percent at number seven. Number nine, Oregon, at 108.08 percent. Number ten, Idaho, at 107.74 percent. Six of the ten in one region, that's amazing. Also, Washington was over 100 percent at 105.37. So seven of our detachments were over 105 percent. We almost got one other region, but we're a half a percent behind. We still have five months, so we will get number one.

I want to thank Hawaii. That's part of where we're talking about the smaller detachments. They came in renewal wise, at 100 percent last year. Along with the Philippines and this year they're at 97.48 percent. They've lost like two or three members total in two years.

As I said a little bit ago, Nevada hosts the Wild Willy's Western Rendezvous. We're building on our team exercises, camaraderie, and making the region stronger, we're helping each other. Apache Junction out of Arizona has come up with a briefcase they hand out for free. It has a computer, a card reader, and tons of pamphlets inside, and they're distributing to anybody in their detachment that wants to get online.

Arizona, I believe, is the only

Detachment that every Squadron is online. That's a

great step for Arizona. Speaking of Arizona, it

kind of scares me because they're catching up to

California real quick. They have a campout that's

unbelievable every year. It's like their spring

DEC. They bring all the families, campers, motor

homes, all the kids. It's amazing to see what they

can do as a detachment. I've been there several

years now, and it's so fun.

Also, Arizona, the national organization with the Sons here, is coming up with a program to promote the youth. So each region we were all asked

to pick a Detachment from our region that would be the leader this next year on working this program to see what works, what doesn't work. Arizona stepped up, and they're going to be from the West.

I would really like to thank Blair Miles too. He did the Washington Conference this year, and if anybody's not been there, it's amazing. The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, it's so honorable, that whole Arlington. It's probably the most humbling thing I've ever done in my life was to go to that and to walk around there. If anybody gets a chance to do that, get it done. It's just so humbling.

Like I started off saying, it's been a huge honor, a privilege, and thank you very much for letting me be your Western Region National Vice Commander.

They were banging on the bleachers, doing anything, ringing bells and stuff, trying to distract them. You know what, they're trained to ignore us. So that was quite amazing. And we had some really good shooters there.

I visited the Detachment of Indiana with Detachment Commander Paul Rush. It was fantastic. The detachment absolutely does great when it comes to fundraising.

Commander Rush's project, COTA, which stands for Children's Organ Transplantation

Association, the detachment was asking for \$25.00 donation to help for this event.

You get a yellow baseball cap, and it has blue writing on it. It says, "I support COTA."

I bought one. I would have bought more but I don't have that many heads, so I just bought one.

Anyway... that was bad.

I also attended the Central Region

Extravaganza held in Indianapolis, which that event
was Past National Commander Jeff Vrabel, Sr. who

He was the one that got us started with the Central
Region Extravaganza.

The Detachment of Illinois, under

Commander Michael Vosar, which I did not visit, has
been outstanding. The detachment achieved 90

percent retention rate and chartered four new
squadrons. They revamped their website with a

bold, fresh look. They sponsored two annual

central -- they sponsored the Second Annual Central

Region Extravaganza, which I attended, and it was very informational and everyone attending was excited to attend this event.

The leadership team was very energetic and their desire to strive for excellence at all levels. The Detachment also does a great fundraiser, which is Socks for Kids, to the CWF Collaboration with Auxiliary for young Sons to grow by including them in the Patch Program.

You know, there's a guy they call Hal "Butch" Ray. You know, from the Detachment of Illinois, our Central Region membership chairman, did an outstanding job reporting our outstandings with amazing quotes and food for thought which gained a lot of attention leaving many wondering what he will be saying in his next report.

Report

Children and Youth

Chairman Joseph A. Lohman (MD)

It is a little bright. Good afternoon, everybody.

FROM THE FLOOR: Good afternoon!

JOSEPH A. LOHMAN (MD): Awesome. This is my first time speaking at a convention. If you have any issues with it, talk to my mentor, Bill Hill from Maryland.

There he is. Told you it's bright up here. Sorry about that.

First of all, Henry, if you can make your way up, please. So before we go to awards, I want to go over a couple of things real quick from today's meeting.

We had 46 people, which is probably the most I've seen since I've been going to these Children and Youth meetings.

Like the Americanism Commission, we were also standing room only. So I'm very excited to see that many people. We had a lot to discuss. It was about 45 minutes long, but it was a great discussion.

And first of all, if I could find where -- there he is. Come on up. So I don't know if we have --

So Henry, I don't know if I'm just getting weaker or you gained weight since last year.

But anyway, so if you all remember, this is Henry from last year. He raised over \$2,500 for Child Welfare Foundation.

This year, Henry V, which is his name, he told me it's been \$4,000 he's raised.

And just in our Children and Youth meeting today, which was 45 minutes long, he raised \$115. That's \$115 for 45 minutes.

That's pretty dang good. Want to say anything?

HENRY HASSELHAN V, JR. (NJ): I'm going to thank you for everybody being here. Thank you for supporting all our veterans. They fought for our freedom and some of them died, sadly.

Thank you for all being here.

So Henry, on behalf of Commander Hall, I want to make you an Honorary Distinguished Guest on behalf of this 52nd National Convention. Thank you. Thank you so much for what you do. It's so important. Let's give him a hand.

Okay. So we actually went over, like I said, it was about 45 minutes long. These lights are bright.

We went over our goals a little bit for this year. We actually had a great year. There were a few mishaps. One of the goals we discussed was that The American Legion's really pushing forward our Children's Veterans Foundation.

And our goal was \$1 per member this year.

And it was a pretty lengthy discussion, as a recommendation to the Children and Youth Committee next year: Should we keep it a dollar or make it 50 cents and so forth.

We had a lot of great input, but one thing we all agreed on is the fact that it comes down to our CSRs. The information that was provided to you earlier at the convention about, I think it was 32 percent that was reported -- and if we actually got up to 50 percent, or 75 percent, our numbers would have been a lot higher, and we actually would have made goal for what we want for the VCF.

So I ask you to go back to your squadrons, detachments, regions, so forth and push for the CSRs. That's what's so important.

Lastly, we talked about Commander Hall's Children and Youth initiative. It was something very special for us this year, special to my heart.

It was a program that we developed back in November. And we went back and forth, it was kind of hard to do, But we came up with a pizza garden. And these five gentlemen to the left of me made so much fun of my pizza garden during our calls. But it was about getting the children out, getting their hands dirty, getting them off the PlayStation, getting them out of the house, actually go out like it was back in the day and play in the dirt and so forth.

So, with that being said, we started this program and basically, we made this garden. It was the shape of a pizza, and in the garden was toppings for your pizza. However the squadron wanted to do with it, the kids wanted to do with it, it was basically up to them, it was about teaching them about horticulture and getting them working together and getting our kids and youth involved.

The only drawback, the other four actually got on board with the program.

Mr. Linwood over here wanted to know how are they going to grow pepperonis.

So then eventually we changed the name. We called it the Linwood rule. It's now a youth garden. We're going to grow pepperonis, even though there's no such thing. But it included other things such as herbs, fruits, and things like that.

It's taken off. It was a pilot program that we presented to our national organization for the Children and Youth organization basically to say, you know, like I said, we need to get our youth out.

And needless to say, not only was it very successful, but it's made national news. I want to thank The American Legion, also the Sons of the American Legion for promoting this event through the Roundup, through the Millennium online.

I also want to thank our local newspapers out of Maryland for promoting it. And also it hit

national news. CBS News brought a team down to the youth garden. They interviewed us for three hours in the hot sun, and we got about 20 seconds of TV time, but that's okay.

At this time I'm going to ask, can we go ahead and play that bit from CBS News. And while they're queuing it up, I'll go into a few more words and hopefully -- okay. I'm going to go on a few more things and hopefully they get it queued up.

But I really wanted you all to see this clip. It was also very special to Commander Hall. It was one of the things he really was looking forward with his Children and Youth initiative program.

All right. I also want to thank the committee this year for a wonderful job. We had an 80 percent turnover. I want to thank Jim Noble and John Lawrence for their help in transitioning to this new committee.

Like I said, I'm new at this. We had four other guys that were new at this. Many of

them were never even on a committee before. We've come a long ways.

We've learned a lot. We've made a lot of mistakes, but we learn from our mistakes just to make sure it's even better. So we're going to go ahead and start the awards.

And what they're going to do is come back

in October, they're going to pick the pumpkins they planted and take it home for Halloween to do whatever they want to do with it.

It's a great program. We wanted to share that information with you. I want to also thank

Sean Phelan, the guy you actually saw that was on the news clip. He did 90 percent of the work.

And I want to thank Post 217 College
Park, Maryland, the University of Maryland, for
providing a lot of the soil.

Also the city of College Park, a lot of donations they made as well, to help make this happen.

Based on our goals and initiatives, the Children & Youth committee received an 80 percent success rate for their service over the last year. We did miss our goal of raising approximately \$390k (\$1 per member) for the Veteran and Children foundation. However, with an 80 percent turnover from last year's staff, the committee did an excellent job for their first time collaborating with this committee.

Quick recap of American Legion C&Y month, American Legion Family Day, AND Military Children month

C&Y Academy has transitioned over to the Americanism Commission. C&Y Committee has been assisting the transition throughout the year. Chairman Casey will provide additional details on the program.

The C&Y Committee has chosen a youth/pizza garden to support Commander Hall's parent/ youth initiative project.

The pilot program started in November.

Teaching children how to plant toppings for a pizza and other vegetables for themselves and the community. In June, the children returned to the youth garden to harvest the food they grew and had a tasting session that included cucumbers, radishes and other vegetables and herbs. In addition, they planted pumpkin seeds and plan to harvest the pumpkins in October. The children will take the

pumpkins they grew back home in time for Halloween.

Includes several field trips to University of Maryland horticulture center and U.S. National Arboretum in Washington DC.

Throughout the year we have been promoting this pilot program with articles in the Round up and Millennium newsletter. The program has also received recognition in many local newspapers in Maryland. In July, CBS news visited the youth garden and did a segment on this project, focusing on how the Sons of the American Legion is using this pilot program to get our children out of the house and learn gardening.

At this time, I would like to present you with the news clip that has been picked up by at least sixteen states in the US.

This project would not exist without the support of Sean Phelan who designed and maintained the garden, American Legion Post 217 in College Park who allowed us to use their property for this pilot program. Report and Awards National Convention Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Committee

Bruno T. Williamson (IL), Chairman

Good morning, everyone. Before I go into my report and the awards, Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Commission, we have a table in the back with a lot of information. Please stop by if you haven't.

Hello, my brother Sons, Legion Family members and guests, your Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Convention Committee met yesterday morning.

We had a roomful representing 25 detachments. I'd like to thank this year's National Convention Commission members this year for their work.

Vice Chairman NEC Eddy Seegers; Seth Rippe; Buster Sutherland, Jeff Gibson, Michael

Kirschner; our liaisons, Jamey Holloway, Steve
Pintarich, Gary Swanlund and Maxwell Rice and our
consultant, Nick Arceo and SONA representative,
Tommy Cisna.

Besides what is in VA&R and CSR, your commission promoted six programs this year. I know everybody in this room, their squadrons took on Commander Hall's squadron Four Pillar challenge this year, and the VA&R project in that challenge is Operation Comfort Warriors.

We rededicated ourselves to promoting that and the National Veterans Creative Arts

Festival, Fisher House, and rededicated ourselves to promoting National Veterans Assistance Day, this being the 17th year that we have been working that program.

Two new programs that came about this year, one came from Alabama, the Widows and Widowers Luncheons. This is a program to bring spouses who have lost their military spouse, and this brought them into a form of community, togetherness, and to bring forth some camaraderie

and to seek out benefits that they deserve.

Women veterans are the largest and fastest growing population in our VA medical centers. I was happy to see that one of the commission members brought women veterans to the forefront and the Rise Program.

This program deals with our women veterans who are suffering from PTSD and MST. So I'm glad that we were able to bring some awareness to that.

We had a goal this year of having 55 representatives, deputy representatives or associate representatives, in our VA medical centers across the country. We started this year at 29 representatives: VACO, VA Central Office, currently says that we're at 35.

We had some issues with our past certifying officers and our local VA medical centers. Certifications were getting, for lack of a better term, lost in the matrix, if you will, and we've been able to clear up 11 of those.

We had six new certifications. So we're

up to 46 hospitals currently. We're hoping to get close to the --

... Applause.

Thank you. It will be good that some day we'll be able to be like our parent organizations, The American Legion Auxiliary and The American Legion, and get close to the 150 mark.

National Advisory Committee, the NAC, over 100 VSOs across the country are a part of this federally mandated committee. This committee brings forth recommendations to the Secretary of Department of Veterans Affairs for the betterment of our veterans and VA facilities.

The Sons of the American Legion, based on our membership and our numbers of representatives in the hospitals, are a voting member of the NAC.

We're also one of only 25 VSOs appointed to the executive board, and this is pretty prestigious for the Sons of the American Legion.

Washington Conference, of course, was held in February. A little bit of history was made if you will. It was the first time the

entire commission was invited to the conference.

If you've been to Washington Conference, you know that there's an incredible amount of information brought forth either through VBA, VHA or NCA.

Too much that you've got five or six guys trying to take notes and that just doesn't work.

So thank God The American Legion gave us a link so we could get all the presentations and to forward them out.

Two things that came out of the conference that I want to speak on. About 10 years ago, VA started to do research into 3-D printing. Currently they're doing 3-D printing with dentures and in what would take months to get is now taking days.

They are now 3-D printing organs to where a patient, after they've had a CT or an MRI, they can 3-D print what the patient, the veteran's going to have surgery on, and physically the physician, the surgeons, can hold the organ. -- I'm not a medical dude -- but they can see how they want to

get to this thing.

The second thing I'd like to talk about is the Compassionate Contact Corps. There are a lot of you out there that like to talk. I know some of them. A lot of them are in Illinois.

... Laughter.

And the Compassionate Contact Corps is a buddy check. You go through a simple amount of training. It is pretty simple. I've gone through the training.

You fill out some paperwork and you're paired up with a homebound veteran and you make weekly calls to them. The duration of the calls is completely up to you and your veteran. And you become a facilitator, liaison, to your veteran between him and the VA. And it's a way just to keep in contact just to check on your friend. So I encourage you to get involved with that.

We ended the meeting with questions and answers, and I'm glad that we had a lot of questions in the meeting and a lot of participation.

We'll now go into the awards.

The Kirby Kepler Memorial, the best Squadron Report of the Year, Cookeville Squadron 46, Cookeville, Tennessee.

The Allen O'Brian Memorial for the number one district. Fifth district, Texas.

And the Earl Webster Memorial Award. The Detachment of the year. O-H.

BRUNO T. WILLIAMSON (IL): Ohio.

And lastly, the Charles B. Rigsby Award for Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Volunteer

Service. This year we had two amazing applicants.

Both of them were deserving of this award, but we had one gentleman that stood out just a little bit more than the other.

You might have heard a little bit about him yesterday. He's probably going to be the

youngest recipient of this award, besides being a high school student, active in sports and has a job, he somehow managed to volunteer 467 hours helping our veterans, our nation's veterans.

My brother Sons, members of the Legion Family and guests, it's my pleasure and honor to introduce to you the Charles B. Rigsby VAVS Volunteer of the Year Martin D. Widmer, Murray-Troutt Squadron No. 262 - Audubon, New Jersey.

He might be one of the few recipients that has hair and it's not gray.

Great job, Martin.

In closing, some accomplishments that we've done based off of our CSRs.

\$2.2 million raised, 240,000 volunteer hours with a value of \$7.9 million, for a total of \$10 million in Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation.

That's at approximately 33 percent reporting.

So did we really do \$30 million over the

year? We don't know. We need to report, my brothers.

As a Delegate to this 52nd National Convention, I make a motion that the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Convention Committee report be accepted.

Some people think I might not should be here, but I can tell you this, this is how my thought process went: I'm a proud Son and a grandson of Edward Hall, a World War II veteran, who went off that boat in Omaha Beach to fight when they were waiting for him.

If he can do that, why the hell can't I

come up here with a kidney stone and still be with my brothers?

It's a pleasure to be here to honor my grandfather's service. That's what I've tried doing all year. I've tried my hardest to represent the Sons of the American Legion, and I'll give a report tomorrow.

This morning, I was supposed to be in IA, and I shocked them when I went in there, too. So the script has already been written for our Vice Commanders to run the morning part of this.

So at this time, I'd like to introduce a special guest, somebody who has had a lot of conversation with me this year. We've become much closer friends.

Thank you very much.

Commander J.R., Adjutant Tony, my Eastern Division vice president John Cook, my fellow Americans, all, Sons of the American Legion, well, here we are again. This is my 36th year addressing the Sons of the American Legion convention out of my 37 years since I was National Commander, and I enjoy it each and every time.

You members of the Sons of the American Legion, whether you know or it or not, are very important to our programs. In fact, I would hope -- and I wish that in most departments you go back and get on our committees, be part of the action, because you do a great job. Proven by the fact that this year, at an all-time high in membership, and how can we forget that you are a 10 million man organization, raising \$10 million for the Child Welfare Foundation.

Back in '87, we started something with these American Legion, the Auxiliary, and the Sons of the American Legion. Every Commander has a challenge. My challenge that year was we go out

and raise a million dollars for the Child Welfare Foundation. And we raised \$1,168,000 that year. In one year.

When I mean "do the job," I don't mean

somebody that just came in and represented The American Legion Auxiliary, but somebody that bought into The American Legion family. I can read you all the stuff that she's from Fairbanks. It says something on here about youth, and that's not what we think of when we think of Lisa, so I'm not going to go there.

She is the senior member of our team. I'm not saying she's old. I'm just saying out of me,

Dan, and her, Lisa is our oldest member. She had a job trying to keep us two guys straight sometimes.

Folks, I want to tell you, our next guest is one of the best friends I could have. Last night she came over to my room and spent some time with me because she knew I wasn't feeling good. It's a great honor.

Please get up and put your hands together hard for my dear friend, Lisa Williamson.

Great song. Where did you know I liked

that song? So someone's putting his foot in his mouth again, it looks like. Yes, I am the oldest. I have two little brothers that it seems like I have to forever keep in line. It's not working, as you can tell.

Between J.R. and National Commander Dan Seehafer and I, we really are about the family. When we first met each other, we all clicked. As time has gone by, and we've traveled together, and our spouses have traveled together, the family -- we just have become closer and tighter. We have our own inside jokes. We can look at each other, and there's been times that I've been laughing so hard when there's been a speaker, thanks to J.R., and it's just something that we live now.

We know that J.R.'s wife might have had a little mishap with some steps recently, and as a family, we check on them. There's been some other health issues, as we are all aware, for all of us. We're immediately on the phone texting, calling, face timing, and supporting each other like family. I'm very, very grateful to this year and for J.R.

to have a new best friend, my husband Daryl.

J.R. is definitely near and dear to my heart as is Dan and Margie and all of the spouses. We had one heck of an aide in Mike Rohan also. It was wonderful to be together as a family. We've had some funny discussions. Being the only one of the group that doesn't drink, I've seen some things that I can't unsee, heard some things that I can't unhear, but it's made us closer.

We've talked about cocktails and how many olives go in a cocktail if it's two or three olives. We've talked about lattes and whether it's almond milk or oat milk that goes in a latte. We've talked about a whole lot more, and what really is almond milk, so think about it. This year we also, as a family, you know that we have concentrated on --

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Wait a minute. Lisa had to say almond milk in her speech. Just so you know, everyone seen Dan Seehafer up here, and he said three olives.

I have something else to say, but this started in Hawaii. They did not have creamer for Commander Dan, and they brought out almond milk, and somebody said, almond milk? Does almonds really have milk? I said, well, they call it almond milk because nobody would buy it if they said nut juice.

AUXILIARY PRESIDENT LISA WILLIAMSON:

It's all a marketing ploy. Can you see someone
like this milking an almond?

As a family, we've promoted veteran and military suicide and really, really advance the Be the One mission. There's all kinds of statistics that I've quoted before, you've heard before, but the nuts and bones of it is to remember that it's okay to not be okay, and it's okay to ask for mental health help. And as a family organization, we can do that.

You know what we do when we do that. We tell people, we're an ear for people that we can change lives and save lives, and that's what it's

about, right? It's about saving and changing lives, and that's what this whole mission is. It's been incredible to work it with J.R., to work it with Dan.

I can guarantee you, in a few days when

I'm no longer the national president, just because

I'm not serving in this official capacity does not

mean I'm not going to continue pushing Be the One

and try to save our military and our veterans from

their mental health issues and from suicide.

Like Dan says, National Commander

Seehafer says, it's personal. While I've never

been personally touched by suicide, my son is

serving in the active duty -- is in the National

Guard, and I saw how it affected him when one of

the guys, one of the airmen in his Squadron died by

suicide. It affected that whole Squadron.

There's research that shows that one suicide death can affect 135 to 150 people. That's some sizes of your squadrons, our posts, our units. That whole group of people is affected by one

suicide death. So if we can take care, if we can just Be the One, that will help affect that 135 to 150 people. I've had an absolutely marvelous year.

You SAL members have been near and dear to my heart for many years. I worked at our department headquarters for the Legion, so I saw how the family worked together. This organization has helped me raise my kids, and I'm very proud of both my kids, and this organization gave me my husband because that's where I met him is at one of our events, the love of my life. With the exception, of course, of J.R. as my other love.

But it has been wonderful. It is like having two little brothers, absolutely love them, will love them till the end of time. I know that we will all continue to work in whatever capacity that we come across when it comes to furthering our collective goals in the American Legion family.

So I'll just finish with three words that I always, always finish with -- Be the One. Be the One.

I just got one of the qualifications for being President of the United States. I just fell up the stairs.

National Commander Donald L. Hall Jr., also Commander J.R.; National Judge Advocate -- sorry. National Adjutant Anthony Wright, National officers, members of the Sons of the American Legion, friends, and guests -- just a matter of personal privilege, hello, Illinois. God love you all.

It's my honor to be here today with this special group of friends. Thank you for what you do to further our mission and for your tireless work and dedication. The Sons of the American Legion continue to be a force to be reckoned with. Your support of the American Legion programs, in

addition to your own programs in such an outstanding way with all time high membership, 102.79 percent and a total membership of 392,781 members. You've got to give yourself a round of applause for that.

In addition to that, you've shown your outstanding leadership in membership and also your programs by having 44 detachments that are at 100 percent or exceeding 100 percent. And the other milestone is you have contributed over the decades over \$10 million to the Child Welfare Fund. These are outstanding accomplishments. I really mean this.

You are creating a legacy that will profoundly impact this nation for years to come. This is something to be proud of every day. I am here today to present this year's Veterans and Children's Foundation Award. This year's recognition award are presented to the following Sons of the American Legion Detachment.

Harry W. Colmery Legacy Award is given to the number one Detachment with the highest total contributions in support of the Veterans and Children's Foundation. This year the award goes to the Detachment of West Virginia, with a combined total of over \$10,200 in donations.

Don't go too far. Also, the highest per capita donation by the Detachment, this is the James A. Drain Founder's Award, it given to West Virginia, the Department of West Virginia.

In your support of the Veterans and Children's Foundation, what you have done, and the moneys that are gathered are used for the TFA and also for the support and training of our service veterans. At this time from November 2023 to June 2024, our service officers have attained \$15.5 billion for our veterans. What this means is you have to dig down -- this is just like instant coffee. You pour some water on this thing, and then you're going to see the impact on the community.

Some people couldn't get a lift for their apartment, a paralyzed veteran or something in that area, the family members are finally relieved of some of the financial burdens, what they had to give up to support that veteran. That way, that veteran is feeling like he's communicating and supporting his family and his friends and his children.

This is some of the outstanding things that the money that is accumulated by the Veterans & Children Foundation is being used for. Now, we have an additional award, and this is another outstanding one. One more thing is that since the inception of the TFA, we have helped 11,161 children. That's just during the last decade.

We have one other award, and this is outstanding. This is the Diamond Two Award. This is presented for making a donation of over \$100,000, and it's presented to the Sons of the American Legion.

In May you seen that a brother, another Son doing something for a Son. Bob Manzo came up on stage because he's part of Division 29. He handed me my grandfather's records that Division 29 gave to him to give me.

When we went to Normandy this year, I got to see the commander of Division 29 and stand next to the Division 29 Memorial there because Division 29 was the first one on the beach. What an honor for my friend to do that for me. Thank you, Bob.

Some of the guys might want to know, if they want to change lanes, instead of collecting for the Legacy Scholarship Fund, put it someplace else that can really use it. We're getting to that age where not enough people are using that fund, so it is self-contained. They said they don't need us to collect for that anymore. Thank you very much.

Legion, good morning. I'm truly delighted to be with you today.

I would first like to take the opportunity to recognize Mark Nave, your representative on the Child Welfare Foundation Liaison Committee. Mark does a great job representing you all. Is he here somewhere?

If you get a chance to get a copy of the American Legion National Magazine, on page 10 of the August issue, an article about the Child Welfare Foundation with Mark's picture on it. I guess the person that wrote that article thought he was a better looking guy than me to represent the organization.

I'll let you be the judge, okay?

I would also like to give a shout out to the Sons of the American Legion members from the Detachment of New York. They're a great bunch of guys, and I'm so proud to be a member of New York's Detachment. Where are you guys? There you are, right up front. How about that?

I'd also like to recognize a young man by the name of Henry from New Jersey. Is Henry in the audience? Henry is 7 years old. I saw him yesterday at our booth. Last year Henry raised over \$2,000 for the Child Welfare Foundation, and he told me yesterday that so far, he's raised over \$4,000. 7 years old, can you imagine that? Great job.

Well, you did it. You reached your goal of attaining \$10 million in contributions to the Child Welfare Foundation, and if that's not enough, you also reached another all-time high in membership. What an amazing year of accomplishments. I am so proud to be a member of this organization.

I would like to thank all the Sons of the American Legion members, not only you in the audience today, but also all those members who are back home and could not make the convention. You are a vital part of the success of the American Legion Child Welfare Foundation, but even more important than that, your unwavering support and

dedication to our veterans across the nation is deserving of much praise and is unmatched by any other group in our country.

Your embrace and partnership of the American Legion's mission Be the One to help prevent veteran suicide is very important and much appreciated. So thank you, thank you, thank you for all that you do for veterans and their families.

At our annual fall meeting in October, the CWF Board of Directors approved \$684,050 in grants to four youth serving nonprofit organizations.

I am happy to report that the close of the 2023-2024 Child Welfare program year, which closed on May 31, 2024, the foundation received a total of \$723,348, of which \$44,084 was more than the previous year. Of that, the SAL contributed \$489,185.30.

The best part of that is you donated \$64,124.75 more than the previous year. So give yourself another hand.

As we close the chapter on this very successful year for the Child Welfare Foundation, we look forward to new achievements and getting back to the work that needs to be done, making sure every child in America has an opportunity to grow up happy and healthy.

As we make our plans for the coming year, take a moment to plan your activities or events to benefit children, whether it be activities to receive \$1 per member to attain the pro capita banner, feeding the pig fund-raising by making piggy banks available at your post homes or on tables at all of your dinner functions. The way we make a difference in a child's life is \$1 at a time.

As you know, the 2024 year marks the 70th year of service to the youth of our nation by the Child Welfare Foundation, and it has been a banner year, but as we celebrate our accomplishments today, we know that a lot of hard work still needs to be done. With the economy the way it is, the

need for our work on behalf of children with physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual needs is greater than ever.

In October, the CWF board of directors will be reviewing 210 grant requests. So you see there is a great urgency for the services we provide to many youth oriented organizations and why we continue to support, why your support is so vitally needed. We're going to see a CWF board look forward to tomorrow's challenges in what we can do to accomplish things together, to assist the needs of our nation's youth, to assist better lives.

When you find some time at this convention, please stop by the Child Welfare

Foundation booth in the exhibit hall to support the foundation by purchasing some of the items we have available. We are located in row 100.

And you can also just make a donation if you don't want to purchase anything. We have new polo shirts in men's and women's sizes, baseball caps, and lapel pins, coins, aprons in red and black, and a hot seller is CWF socks and SAL

tumblers. So stop by and purchase some of those things, help us out. We also have the large piggy banks, and they all make good Christmas gifts. Stop by and shop early.

We have a new guest with us this year. The American Legion family has been putting out the word there about one thing, Be the One. Be the One to listen. Be the One to make a difference. Make sure that we're helping all of our veterans in crisis and doing all we can.

Our new member to the team, at this time, I'd like to bring out Tony Cross of the Be the One program.

Tony Cross

Be the One

Thank you very much. It's an honor to talk to one of the strongest arms in our American Legion family. I'm a life member. I'm a dual member and a Rider. Unfortunately, disabilities keeps me from riding the bike with a sciatic nerve issue.

about how I got here and a little bit about my story, then I'm going to talk about Be the One.

I've been running appeals for VA&R for the last seven years over at the GOC, some of you have been there, and I've been a veteran service officer for almost 10. I've dealt with a lot of stuff, and so I thought, I really understood this.

My story started in 1979. I was born in 1960, tough life like most, some. Went into the Marine Corps right out of high school. Had an incredible career until I got to the end of it, went off a cliff in cold weather training. Let's say I wasn't much of a skier. Broke my back and a

few of other things.

Got out of the Marine Corps medically retired at the end of my career. Got home, went through a divorce. It was a Saturday morning, for about 45 minutes, I remember I had a chair, a TV, and a goldfish bowl and a pistol. I'm a type A if you haven't figured that out already. And for 45 minutes, I really thought for a minute that I didn't want to be here.

Flash up to about December of this last year, I got approached to go to headquarters to be the manager for Be the One. I'm like I knew what Be the One meant. I could see it over the last two or three years, but I did not realize what Be the One manager would look like, and quite frankly, nobody else did either.

I will tell you; I came up through the Legion. I'm an active member. I've done just about every position. Some of my closest friends are SAL members that I know, if I ever called them, they'd be there. That is family. I come up that way. And to be at headquarters and be an active Legion

member, being a veteran, being a veteran service officer is a unique position, and plus I've been trained at about every level of suicide prevention -- not that that makes you any better.

But over the last several months, I have dealt with more crisis, some in our own organization -- that's a little shocking.

As of today, we've trained 3,799 of our family members to be suicide, that went through the Columbia protocol or some other course. When we leave this place, this sacred place of all of us gathered, we'll be close to 10,000 trained in at least trying to recognize suicide prevention.

Many of us sitting here, it's not just a veteran issue, it's a family issue in some cases. It's extremely sensitive issue, one that's hard to really put your hands around. It doesn't matter if you're an introvert, extrovert, how many medals you've got on your cover, if you're a brigadier general or a private, suicide can happen. It's not just a mental issue.

So I went up there in December of this

last year, I took 187 calls over the last nine months. Six of them were crisis hotline calls, meaning I needed to get a hold of the crisis hotline with the veteran, and in other case, just a lady, a family member needed help right then. It is very hard to ask someone, have you ever thought about committing suicide?

So I want to tell you what happened to me last week in Illinois at the race. I got to the St. Louis side where I stayed, and I went downstairs after I got settled in. If anybody knows me, I wear mainly Be the One stuff. My wife thinks that's the only clothing I own, and she's right because what happens is more often than not, somebody asks me what's Be the One? It is our number one mission.

I'm on the elevator, and I ran into this lady, and she said, excuse me, sir, what's Be the One? I told her, and she said, oh, my God, my brother, he's a St. Louis police officer, two tour combat veteran. He will not go get help. He's in bad shape. I said, what branch is he in? She said

marine. Hello, I'd love to talk to him.

I called him, talked to him for just a couple minutes. He started crying. I said to him this question, I said, listen to me. You've been a police officer for about ten years. I'm about to ask you a very difficult question. Have you ever thought about suicide?

Quiet, he said yes. I said, I'm going to tell you something. I'm going to be back from the race tomorrow night. I'd love to take you to dinner. I want to sit down and talk to you. He enrolled in the VA counseling session this past week to get help.

What I want to say to all of us is we're somewhat stubborn, all of us. Sorry about that. My neck just went back. I know he's had it going on, but what an amazing guy, amazing Commander. I got the privilege to address your first college this last year.

SAL is near and dear to my heart. I had a 50-year member uncle, not only was he a dual

member, he was real passionate about the Legion.

But I want to go back to Be the One. It is

literally changing our look. I just got through

with a marketing meeting that, quite frankly, we're

105 years old. We're not real easy to move.

However, this body does not seem to have that

challenge.

... Applause.

I mean, seriously, I watch it. You can raise money. You can do whatever you want to do. If your numbers are 375, next year they could be 400,000 easy. It's just a matter of deciding to do it. Everybody wants to be part of something, right? They want to be part of this network of family.

easily just said, hey, stay in VA&R. I turn 65 next year. I've got four grand babies. I probably didn't need to take this job. But I suffer from depression, and I'm going to look at you in the eye and tell you that. I can get in a quiet moment where I need to spend time to myself. Maybe you know it.

My healing is to help someone else. Quite frankly, that's what I'm doing. The crisis is big. We lose 800,000 a year around the globe to suicide. I want to close with this.

It is truly an honor to be a dual member of SAL. More importantly, it's an honor to address you. From my perspective of being an active Legionnaire. I belong to Post 182. I had a class, six-month class this last year during the winter. I was a second vice at this time. I've been about everything.

I asked my commander, I said, hey, let's do a school. One Thursday night a month, I'll call it a Be the One school. I invited the Riders, Auxiliary, Legionnaires, anybody that wanted to come. I started out week number one, the very first month, I had everybody stand up and introduce themselves. It is amazing what stories we probably have right in this room of your dads, your grandfathers, of stories that we knew nothing about. We don't open up to each other, right?

We went for six months, and then I had a

coin created, and I took them all through suicide prevention, and we decided to have a Saturday we were going to open up Be the One to anybody that wanted to come for breakfast and to do cornhole and do some claims. Everybody was in that school participating.

We had a guy come in by the name of Bob Dorn, a Vietnam veteran, 79 years old, had never filed a claim. Got him fixed up. Bob kept sitting around. He didn't leave. And I walked up to Bob, and I said, Bob, you all, right? He said, you know what, I just want to be around all you guys. This is family. Bob Dorn on the new list of officers is now the second vice, and his wife is an Auxiliary member, and he's a dual member in the SAL.

I want to thank you for what you do.

Thank you for letting me address you. Thank you.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Guys, here's some good numbers for you. Go ahead and sit down.

Just a little ago, we took donations. You know, we usually bring a couple thousand dollars in. Listen

to these numbers. CWF, \$29,718; Legacy, \$350; NEF, \$9,561; OCW, \$6,770; VCF, \$4,600; Be the One, \$1,550. For a grand total of across this stage \$52,549.88. That's what the Sons of the American Legion do.

... Applause.

So we had the four pillar challenge that we started this year. I want to give you the numbers from that. I know Kevin and Brian are still -- we've got some in late, and they're working on getting some of the certificates out. I have to say thank you to all of you that took part in this and was participants.

You know what I heard as I traveled was,

Commander, we usually don't give money to this or

that. We're a small Squadron. But when I sat with

Americanism Chairman Mark Nave, he said, Commander,

thank you for doing that because those Squadrons

that didn't think \$18 would matter when it was only

18 members, it did matter. Every dollar mattered.

We got more money from Boys State this year than we

ever got from the Sons of the American Legion. So

we want to thank you for that.

We had 128 Squadrons participate from 33 different detachments. Money recorded for children and youth, \$33,743. For VA&R, \$17,793. For Americanism, \$21,727. Money turned in for national security for blood drives, \$6,021, and over 1,500 pints of blood. That's over \$79,000 that went in for the four pillar challenge. Thank you all for putting the work in.

... Applause.

I also have to thank my guy down there,

Tommy Deal. He's been my aide, and you see what I

was working with. He worked his butt off on that

challenge. It wasn't easy. Some people wrote checks

in. I want you all to know we laughed at a lot of

you. We said what to write it for, but it was

pretty easy. You still put Americanism, VA&R,

Children and Youth, instead of some of the

programs, and we laughed over and over again.

But it was a great program. I believe they're going to carry it on next year. I don't know. At this time, we're still waiting for the

next quest, I believe.

I would ask Tommy, if he would, to come up here now. I'm going to go ahead -- my report is supposed to be tomorrow, but I'm going to go ahead and talk right now. He asked me if I didn't have a video or something to play. I said I'm not worried about that. They put together something that we could take pictures of, but I've got pictures in my head from this year that will last me a lifetime.

National Commander Sons of the American Legion

I want to thank every detachment, every squadron member, everybody who made this year a fantastic year for me because it wasn't about me. It was all about Ed Hall. It will remain that. It will remain about my pawpaw and the things I got to do this year by honoring him, being in Normandy, being in Hawaii on December 7th, putting all those flags down across the country in different places who asked me to do it.

If I put pictures up and if I said names

right now, I'd probably forget somebody that meant a lot to me, but I'm going to tell you, if you're an SAL member, you mean a lot to me. You gave me a year to recognize my grandfather that I couldn't have without being here. I want to thank every one of you for that from the bottom of my heart.

Representing more to me took on a whole new life this year. As we went places and we talked about it, I had a lot of people come to me and told me how much they liked it. We talked about it. We talked about my suits, you know inside my suits, my grandfather's name is always across my heart. I have a necklace on with him.

The American Legion let us make more videos this year to honor the Sons and put the word out than we've ever done. That's all great work. So you know why those great works are happening?

Because of you. Because of you, we keep growing, and we keep doing things right. Look at what we've done. It ain't one person. Arizona did a heck of a lot of work this year for the Child

Welfare Foundation, but it ain't just this year.

It's been the work of everybody. Everybody give

yourselves a round of applause for all the great

numbers we've ran across here for all the programs.

Something I started doing later on in the year that I'd like to do here now if you would. Everybody take a couple minutes, maybe close your eyes, a couple seconds, not minutes. But remember your why. Think right now who makes you eligible.

Who served to make you a member of the Sons of the American Legion? That's why you're here. That's why we're the Sons of the American Legion. We're not The American Legion, nor do we want to be. We want to be the proud ancestors of those who served and be proud to be Sons of the American Legion. Sons of the American Legion is the best program The American Legion has, and you all make that happen and our ancestors. So don't forget your why.

As I was in Washington Conference and I

went through and got to speak five different times that day, and I went to a reception, and I sat down, and a guy came up next to me and said, Commander, you are the king of a short speech, and I love you. I don't like to go on and on. I'm just trying to cover the things that I want to cover today.

I have to say thank you to Maryland, what a ride. To all my brothers, please stand.

... Applause.

It takes a lot to get up here. It takes a lot of money to raise and to do the things you want to do if you want to do it right. To honor my grandfather, that was the only way I wanted to do it was to do it right. I have to thank everybody who helped along the way.

Tomorrow when I hand this off to Joseph, the great thing is, just like we've done over the last couple years, the SAL don't start over every year. We build. We build. I started having calls late nights from California three years ago from Michael telling me what's going on, this is where we're going, this is how it's done.

Then it happened with Chris Carlton last year, same thing, calls from Chris telling us what to do, me and Joseph.

Then this year I've talked to Joseph, talked to Bill Clancy and all. We're not starting over every year when a new guy gets up here and becomes Commander. We're building. We're passing the torch. We're passing the baton, and we're going to continue to grow, just like we did last year when it was 380,000, this year 390.

I hope Joseph does 400,000 or even more because I can tell you Chuck said somebody behind me may have a hard time. I don't think anybody will have a hard time. This is the best position you can stand in. You get to do the work and do it right if you so choose to. I can tell you this, I don't think we're going no place but up.

It ain't about me. It's about the Sons. I want to make my good friend a Distinguished Guest. Wish I could say you earned it. All right then, I don't think I have to say any more. I'll just say it anyway.

With that, as a delegate of this convention, I make a motion to accept my report.

NVC TERRY A. HARRIS (KS): We have a motion on the floor.

NVC TERRY A. HARRIS (KS): Is there anyone else? We have a motion and a second. All

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Thank you very much, Commander Hall. It has been a privilege to serve as your chief administrative officer. I look forward to working with you in the future.

Dennis has worked hard for us over the years. We wouldn't have gotten to \$10 million without Dennis Boland. He deserves everybody to have him come here and listen to him speak.

We'll stand in recess until 12:30.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: At this time we'll reconvene the 52nd National Convention of the Sons of the American Legion.

Me. In my travels, I told you we did a lot of traveling and had a lot of good things happen. We counted up some money earlier today. It was like 52,000.

We got another check and a presentation that I think is worthy of doing. At this time I'll have the Commander of Indiana come out for a check presentation.

DELEGATE FROM INDIANA: This year my project was COTA, Children's Organ Transplant Association. I had a bet with New Jersey and Florida. I just found out that's their departments. And the bet was to reach 65,000 each.

And with that I have a check for COTA for \$66,000.

COTA REPRESENTATIVE: I'm honored to receive this check on behalf of the Children's Organ Transplantation Organization.

We are an organization that covers all 50 states. If you haven't heard of us, we come alongside families at a time in their lives where they are experiencing a crisis for a life-saving transplant.

I just can't thank you all enough for the partnership you've come alongside these families with. These three states have raised over \$200,000.

And this is a record for SAL. 66,000 is a record. So if there's anybody out there that wants to continue this tradition, we'd really appreciate it.

Thank you, all.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: You hear

Commander Dan say it a lot this year. I've taken

it on. I've said it many times: The American

Legion Family, we change lives, and we save lives.

That's how we do it. Right there. Taking care of

people.

PNC DOUGLAS BIBLE (MN): Mr. Commander, point of personal privilege. Douglas Bible, Past National Commander, Minnesota.

Last evening, Minnesota had a very special event. I'd like to introduce to you one of our delegates who got married last evening, Glenn and Sherry Neville.

Please give them a round of applause.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Again, saving lives and changing lives. Brother, we're going to save your life by telling you to get plenty of therapy and come back and see us in 20 years and have your anniversary with us. You just gotta feed a couple people.

Folks, this next name, this next person

I'm going to bring up here to the SAL needs no

introduction.

For years, he came up here and sang the

praises of the Sons of the American Legion, and this year, as we hit \$10 million, there was no way we could do it without having this man on stage.

My friend, your friend, the SAL's friend, from the great state of Florida, Mr. Dennis Boland.

Well, as we say in southwestern Florida, how you all are? I'm doing pretty good myself.

... Applause.

Now, I want the truth. Last year, when I received my Sons of the American Legion card, I had 39 years. I have received my card this year and only have 14 years.

... Laughter.

So do I look any prettier?

... Laughter.

I don't think so.

... Laughter.

Anyhow, I just came from the Americanism

Commission, and we heard from the youth winners, and every one of them put in their speech thanking the Sons of the American Legion. That is an awesome testament to you guys for what you do in the National organization.

One thing I don't like hearing, five words, I am just a Sons of the American Legion member.

I had a gentleman tell me that, and I stood there for 15 minutes telling him what the Sons of the American Legion have done. He was amazed. He was kind of a young, newer member.

But I like to see when anyone, a veteran comes up to you and they say I'm part of The American Legion Family and I'm a proud member of the Sons of the American Legion, because you guys do so much for our organization.

People go through life wondering if they make a difference. You just saw the check that was given for COTA. Our Department Commander had the same thing in his mind. He raised \$130,000, but he gave half of it to COTA and half of it to Project

Vet Relief.

And believe it, the Sons of the American Legion were a big part of those donations to COTA.

When I talk about COTA, you guys do stuff and a lot of times you do it automatically, but you never look at the final outcome.

In Florida, I just talked to Rick Lofgren from the COTA association, and he told me that we have a young kid in Tampa that, because of The American Legion and the Sons of the American Legion, will have a lung transplant.

And then he said two kids moved from New York City to Orlando, and they both need livers.

It's a genetic thing in their family to have two kids have to have livers. Without your participation in COTA, that wouldn't be available to them. So give yourself a great hand for what you do.

I'm a biggie on communications, and I have 5,000 friends on Facebook. A lot of times I get a little risqué because I have weird friends on

Facebook.

... Laughter.

But anyhow, I friended a young gentleman from Jacksonville, Florida. His name is Butch. He said, "Why did you pick me?" And I looked at his Facebook page, and it's pretty much lined up with what I believe. So I told him that.

And then he says, "Are you a Legionnaire?" I said yes. He belongs to -- he's the adjutant of his squadron. He's the assistant director of the ALR of his squadron, and he's the director ALR chairman.

So like you, you never know what a person does until you stay and talk to them person to person.

I can't not give you the accolades that I
wish to give you for what you do. Why did you join
The American Legion, Sons of the American Legion?
I joined The American Legion (mumbles) years ago.
You didn't get that, did you?

But I was fortunate to become a

department commander. When I became a department commander, they took me to the Children's Miracle Network in St. Petersburg, and I was able to see a young child at the neonatal department you could put in your hand. And because of us, that child survived.

You ought to give yourselves a hand on that because I'm telling you, it's just...

Special Olympics, have you ever gone to the games of the Special Olympics aside from just donating money? You'd be so impressed with those children and grownups that participate in it.

I was fortunate that my post, at one time, we were dedicated to helping Special Olympics. And in our county, at the Games, our Color Guard posted the Colors for them.

And we walked in with all the kids behind us, and we circled around. We came to the flagpole, and we raised the American flag. And the children, the kids, were behind us.

And when you looked at them, they all

stood there with their hand over their heart. You looked at the stadium where the people were sitting, half were standing, and half maybe had -- but that's the kind of thing that builds your heart to see the respect that those kids give to us.

We do this -- we don't want accolades.

The best accolade you can get is feeling good

because you did this for someone that needed it.

Like I said, my big thing is communication, communication, communication. I had the good honor to be with your National Commander at The American Legion World Series. And we had, believe it or not, Sons of the American Legion in the audience attending the games, wearing their Sons of the American Legion cap.

That is such an awesome feeling, because we are family. Don't ever forget that we are a family, and we work together. That's why we are so strong as an organization because of what you do, what the Auxiliary does and what the Legion does for our country and our communities around this state.

I can't thank you enough, and I hope the pride you feel in you is as much as the pride I feel as being a Sons of the American Legion member and being able to tell people the great things you have done.

MORGAN JOHNSON: Thank you. Good morning.

My name is Morgan Johnson, and I am honored to be

here in the great city of New Orleans representing

my state and my country as the president of Boys

Nation.

Coming from a small town in rural Oklahoma, an ideological bubble, Boys State and Boys Nation provided the civil discourse and the diffusion of knowledge that expanded my horizons and prepared me for this dynamic world that challenges us every single day.

The relationships and the friendships that I built at Boys Nation will last a lifetime, and the opportunity to witness 100 of the most driven, opportunistic young men in this country has inspired me to continue my life pushing myself to the best that I can be.

Legion family, your work, be it in the halls of this convention or the streets of your

community, has provided a platform for young people like myself to be the best versions of ourselves that we can be, and I cannot thank you enough for the impact that you have had on my life.

I look forward to meeting all of you individually over these next few days, and I'm honored to be here. Thank you so much.

DREW GODBY: Up next is our 2024 Junior
Air Rifle Sporter National Champion from the state
of Virginia, Alexandra Orr.

ALEXANDRA ORR: Good morning, everybody.

My name is Alex Orr. I'm from Virginia, and I'm

honored to be speaking with y'all today. I'm The

American Legion Sporter Air Rifle National

Champion, and I'd like to thank the Sons of the

American Legion for providing me with scholarship

money that will help continue my education four

years from now.

I would also like to thank the Sons of the American Legion for their ongoing support for

veterans and other youth sports. Have a blessed day.

DREW GODBY: Up next is our 2024 High School Oratorical National Champion from the great state of Washington, Aubrey J. Moore.

... Applause.

AUBREY MOORE: We are gathered here in New Orleans for The American Legion's 105th

National Convention, and I could not be here without the generous time, money, and energy The American Legion, the Sons of the American Legion, The American Legion Auxiliary, and the various posts and departments have given me.

Today I might stand before you the oratorical champion, but I am simply a small representation of hundreds of intelligent young men and women across the country who participated in the oratorical contest. Each of us prepared two separate speeches, diving into the history, strength, and structure of the United States Constitution.

In the spirit of service, The American Legion has continuously invested in America's youth. A group of people who have made the greatest sacrifice of all, to lay down their life for their country, has continued to sacrifice for the next generation. They've instilled in each of us a pride in our country, the confidence to communicate, and the determination to carry on.

All of the American Legion members I have met have been kind and passionate about our country. They've built in me the assertion and confidence to become the leader I know I can be.

Thank you for believing in us young people because now you have made us believe in ourselves. Nelson Mandela once said that the youth of today are the leaders of tomorrow. Today I hope to offer you encouragement that what you are doing here, the sacrifices that you are making will not be ignored because what you are doing at the Sons of the American Legion will create America's leaders of tomorrow. DREW GODBY: Up next is our 2023 American Legion Baseball All-Academic Team Captain from the great state of Illinois, Dylan Provenzano.

DYLAN PROVENZANO: First and foremost, this is quite the honor to be here today. Of course representing The American Legion as the all American academic team captain. I discovered my American Legion baseball program shortly after moving to a new town, Post 158 in Barrington, Illinois.

that I understood that this was a great opportunity to challenge myself and keep my love of baseball going after my high school career ended and before my collegiate baseball career started. I was able to be a part of a team that wanted to win, to challenge others, and most importantly, represent our Commander Fred Schaffer, World War II veteran. Playing for yourself is one thing, but representing a hero is another.

I learned that the American Legion community especially prides themselves on giving

back. I too pride myself on giving back. I am honored now to add the Legion name wherever I go to keep forward in both of our missions.

I especially need to thank the Sons of the American Legion for the honor and opportunity that your scholarship program has allowed me to be the first in my family to attend college, play baseball for Carthage College, all while still being able to keep my mission alive. Thank you all.

DREW GODBY: Up next is our 2024 American Legion Eagle Scout of the Year from the great state of Pennsylvania, Lauren Tyree.

LAUREN TYREE: Wow, this is an impressive crowd. Scouts taught me to be prepared, but I don't think it prepared me to speak to such an incredible crowd of passionate leaders. Maybe I should have taken that public speaking merit badge. My name is Lauren Tyree, and I am truly honored that a group as esteemed as you would recognize my accomplishments. It proves that I'm doing something right.

I've done a lot to earn this award. I've started three nonprofits, volunteered over 4,000 hours, recruited a team of over 150 volunteers, and raised over \$300,000.

I'm only in high school now, but in college I want to study public policy. I want to learn about the policies in my grandparents' house that made it possible for over 150 foster kids to turn their life around and become wildly successful.

But I think the reason I'm standing here today is the same reason that makes The American Legion so great. It's the lessons I learned in my first time scouting. I was in a tent by myself in a camp site where I knew no one, ready to give up on scouting the very first time I wore the uniform, but I turned that week into one of the best weeks of my life with three lessons I learned from my scoutmaster.

Don't do it alone. Everyone's little bit of service adds up to something great.

Don't do it all at once. You understand that we won't solve the world's problems overnight.

And the third lesson I learned in my first time scouting, which may or may not apply to you, is don't forget extra toilet paper. I hope that doesn't warrant further explanation.

As a Legionnaire myself in the Women's Auxiliary, I am so honored to join the work that you all have been doing for so long. Thank you for all that you do to support your post, your community, and most importantly, the veterans. Thank you.

DREW GODBY: On behalf of our 2024 Junior Air Rifle Precision National Champion, she is unable to be here due to her college team competing this week, but she wanted me to send her condolences and thank you for allowing her to be able to compete in the competitions and all that. So thank you.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: We have just

made all of them Distinguished Guests here today.

If you would, please rise as they leave and give

them another big hand because our future is bright,

folks.

For some of you folks that may not have understood what some of them said, there will be a debriefing so you can know what those big words were later on today. I seen some looks, even up here on stage, like what did he say?

At this time, we'll call Harold Thompson

Jr. For a credential committee report.

National Convention Credentials Committee Harold Thompson, Jr., Chairman

Good morning. Credentials report is going to be short and sweet. There is no changes. As credentials chairman Harold Thompson Jr., I duly elect a delegate to the 52nd National Convention of the Sons of the American Legion, I move for acceptance of my report.

LUCAS HERRING (VT): Lucas Herring, Vermont. I second.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Vermont seconds.

All those in favor, say aye.

Any opposed?

Report accepted. Thank you, Harold.

At this time, we will move on to our Memorial Service. I call upon National Chaplain Jeffrey Hicks.

Sergeant-at-Arms, please lock the door.

RONNIE GRIST (GA): Commander Hall?

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Yes, sir.

RONNIE GRIST (GA): Past National

Commander Ronnie Grist from Georgia, can I take a

personal privilege moment right here in the

memorial service?

Most of you have not noticed I'm wearing two POW/MIA bracelets, which we honor through this organization. The reason I am standing before you, this one on my right is the last time I can wear it. The remains of my grandmother's cousin

Phillip's body was returned to us in May of this year. So this bracelet is being retired as part of the memorial service for this convention.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Thank you.

If I could have National Chaplain Hicks come back up. There's no better service than somebody that puts their soul into it and does what they feel is right. So at this time, I'd like to make our chaplain a Distinguished Guest of our convention.

At this time, I'd like to call upon

Americanism Chairman Chris Casey to give a report

for our National Youth Academy.

While he is coming forward, we know there is some donations that are going to be wanted to be given this morning before we get into our elections.

So anybody who wants to make donations,

I'd like to lead off with Louisiana over here, then
anybody else can get in line over here while

Chairman Casey gives his report.

Oral Report and Awards

National Convention Americanism Committee Chris M. Casey (NE), Cmte. Chair

Good to see you all again. I don't know why I touch this thing because it never goes up, like I said yesterday.

So the Children --

FROM THE FLOOR: We can hear you.

CHRIS M. CASEY (NE): You can hear me.

Good. All right. The National Children and Youth

Academy was the responsibility of the Americanism

Commission this year with the help of the Children

and Youth Committee.

I want to single out one specific person from the Children and Youth Committee that was put on as a representative, and that is Jeff Trout of Illinois. Jeff, stand up.

... Applause.

Jeff was a huge help to the Americanism

Commission, as well as all the Americanism

Commission members. It's a lot. We had nine

participants. But you're going to see in a second

a few of these guys, these little guys, have some

energy. So we were wiped out yesterday.

Like I said, nine participants, came from Alabama, California, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. I'd like to challenge Florida. What I've seen is we struggle to have local participation. If we're getting about 10 kids from around the country, it would be great to have 20 kids from Tampa Bay, or that area, because about 30 kids in this class would be good. As a former teacher, 30 kids is about all you want to handle.

So I do think that we can do better. And I'd ask the Detachment of Florida to help the actual Legion family of Florida to think about that next year.

So we did have flag education that we provided all the kids. Obviously, I said we were going to do that. That was a goal of the Americanism Commission nationally.

We did have Purple- and Red-level

Americanism patches from the Junior Auxiliary Patch

Program awarded to four participants. They

actually earned their patches. The other kids got

a start. We signed off on things.

But the older kids have considerably more to accomplish to earn those patches. So they'll go home, and we hope that they finish those patches.

We did have a visit from National

President Lisa Williamson, presentation from

Louisiana State Patrol. The Louisiana State Patrol

was amazing. I don't know if you guys saw them out

on Andrew Higgins and Convention Boulevard, but

they had a SWAT team truck out there, BearCat. The

motor division had a cruiser, a motorbike.

One of the troopers, Xavier Martin, was outstanding. He was the contact for us. They really saved us. That was the kids' favorite part. I asked them. And I was okay that they didn't say it was flag education.

... Laughter.

But they were all folding their flags.

They all get 3-by-5 flags to take home. A lot of fun stuff. But the SWAT team BearCat I think was their favorite. It was my favorite.

And so we're going to go ahead and bring

the kids up, all nine of them, and they get a certificate for completing the academy. And so we'll have the kids come on up.

They did a great job, too. I had a Jeopardy! game to test their knowledge and kind of reinforce what we taught them, and they were answering the questions. I was amazed.

We piloted this in Nebraska, and I don't think that says anything about the Nebraska kids. The game was harder. They struggled a bit.

But these kids just knocked it out of the park. So if we could give them a round of applause, they did a really great job.

And I'll get out of the way so you can see them.

If we could give all these young ones another round of applause. This is the future for sure, and there's a lot of smart kids in this group.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Where's Doc

Gibbs at? I know you have to be happy to see that, don't you, sir.

At this time, we're going to take any donations that we have from the floor.

I know Past Commander Byron Robichaux wanted to say a few words.

PNC ROBICHAUX: Good morning.

Hopefully, you have had a wonderful time here in Louisiana, and the people behind me that are coming on stage are the people from Louisiana who have worked and put this together. They're the ones you've been seeing handing out beads, coordinating and stuff and so forth.

So we hope that we've made this enjoyable for you. We have a special presentation to give to the Commander, a few things, and I'm going to bring forward after I give the Commander one of the pins from this convention.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Thank you, sir.

PNC ROBICHAUX: I'll bring forward our assistant adjutant, Mr. Rob Higgins, who lives closer to New Orleans, and he has the connections.

And a lot of what happened this weekend, he had connections with it, and he's got some stuff to do.

ROB HIGGINS (LA): First and foremost, we're glad you're feeling better. Sorry that -Friday night most of you all attended a social that we put on for y'all. We hope you all had a great time. We hope you had fun. While we were there, we sort of passed around a little bucket, and for your project we have collected \$1,200.

... Applause.

We auctioned off some king cakes to raise some money. We auctioned off some king cakes.

Since you weren't there to enjoy them, here's your own personal king cake.

You weren't able to enjoy the second line the other day, so here's your handkerchief for the second line.

You have been distinguishing people all weekend, so you are now distinguished as an official Cajun of Louisiana. And we like to do it a little blingy. And we have something else in here. If you want to share it, that's up to you.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: I don't think we will.

... Laughter.

ROB HIGGINS (LA): Thank you, Commander Hall. Appreciate it. Enjoy.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Thank you.

How about a big applause for the fellows from Louisiana who did all the work for us this weekend. Thank you all.

JOHN HOOK (NH): John Hook, Detachment of New Hampshire, I'd like to present on behalf of my Squadron 13 back in Greenville, New Hampshire, a check for CWF for \$620.

... Applause.

JOSHUA ISON (OR): Good morning,
everybody. Joshua Ison, Detachment of Oregon.
This was just thrown on me. So a thousand dollars,
Veterans and Children's; \$1,115 for CWF. Thank
you.

... Applause.

DETACHMENT OF MISSISSIPPI:

Mr. Commander, I have several checks to present to you, American Legion charities. This one is for Veterans and Children's donation, \$716.73, by the Detachment of Mississippi.

This one is Child Welfare Foundation for \$304.92, Detachment 165. This is for Child Welfare Foundation, \$75, from Squadron 79.

This is Child Welfare Foundation, \$306,
Squadron 1995. This is for Child Welfare
Foundation, another check from Squadron 1995, \$300.

And finally from our biggest squadron, Squadron 24, this is from the Sons' piggy banks that they passed around every meeting they had, \$500 for Child Welfare Foundation.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: No other donations?

Rules of the Election

We've come to a very special item of business, the Election of National Officers.

At this time, I call upon National

Parliamentarian Gary Leach, who will read the Rules of the Convention governing the Nomination and Election of Officers.

NATIONAL PARLIAMENTARIAN LEACH: Good morning. The rules for the nomination and election of national officers are as follows.

Rule 17: Prior to the election of national officers, the National Commander shall appoint, subject to the approval of the National Convention, a judge of elections and such number of tellers as deemed necessary, provided that the total number of tellers so appointed shall be an odd number. In a contested election, candidates going on the ballot shall be entitled to one teller of their choice.

Rule 18: Nominations for national officers shall be from the floor on roll call of the detachments alphabetically arranged. Each detachment may present as many candidates as it chooses.

Rule 19: Nominating speeches for national officers shall be limited to five minutes

each. Not more than two seconding speeches shall be made for any candidate, and said speeches shall be limited to three minutes.

Rule 20: When more than two candidates are nominated for any office, balloting shall continue until one candidate receives a majority of the votes of the National Convention, except in the election of national vice commanders.

Rule 21: In a contested election for national vice commanders, balloting shall continue until, A, majorities and, B, pluralities are established for one or more candidates under the following provisions:

If on any ballot less than five candidates receive the necessary majority to elect, the candidate or candidates receiving a majority vote shall be declared elected, and a new ballot shall be taken for the remaining number of places to be filled.

The candidate receiving the lowest number of votes on the preceding ballot shall be disqualified, except should two candidates remain

to fill one place, a new ballot shall be taken.

Rule 22: The National Convention will nominate and elect a National Commander and five National Vice Commanders, in this sequence.

Mr. Chairman, this completes the reading of the Rules of the Convention pertaining to nomination and election of national officers.

Appt. of the Judge and Tellers of Election

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: At this time, I will -- at the convention, will appoint the following election officials:

Judge of elections: Harold Thompson from Nebraska; Ed Sheubrooks from Florida; Robert Avery From New York; Scott Thornton from Ohio.

I will entertain a motion to accept the appointments of the judge of tellers of election.

At this time.

... Laughter.

STEPHEN ENGLAND (VT): Steve England, NEC from Vermont, makes that motion.

JON COAKLEY (OH): Jon Coakley, Detachment of Ohio, seconds.

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Who was the first? John Dumont?

FROM THE FLOOR: Steve --

NATIONAL COMMANDER HALL: Steve England from Vermont. We have a motion and a second. Is there any discussion?

Hearing none, all those in favor of the appointments of the judge of tellers for the election signify by saying "Aye." Any opposed say "Nay." Motion carries.

If these gentlemen would take their places on the stage, we'll begin the nomination and election process.

National Adjutant Anthony Wright will now call the roll of detachments for the purpose of roll call to receive nominations for National Commander in the Sons of the American Legion.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: During the nomination process, each detachment will be called alphabetically. Each detachment has the option to

nominate a person for office, second a nomination, or pass.

I believe we have four microphones that are set up. Prior to starting the roll call, I'm going to request that everyone uses a microphone to voice their nominations.

We're going to begin the process.

Alabama.

THOMAS GLANDER (AL): Alabama yields to New Mexico for purposes of a nomination.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Is that you, Mr. Glander, that made that?

THOMAS GLANDER (AL): Yes. Tom Glander, Alabama.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Alabama yields the floor to New Mexico.

New Mexico.

Election of the National Commander-Elect

ROBERT FRESQUEZ (NM): Mr. Commander, Robert Fresquez, delegate of New Mexico.

Mr. Commander, I request that the Chair recognize
Tony Navarreté for the purpose of nomination for

high office of National Commander.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Granted.

Mr. Navarreté.

TONY NAVARRETÉ (NM): National Commander
Hall, National officers, Past National Commanders,
delegates, alternates, guests, and fellow Sons to
this 52nd National Convention of the Sons of the
American Legion, my name is Tony Navarreté. It is
a proud moment and humble heart to stand before you
this morning.

With your permission, I ask for a moment of personal privilege so I may share some words on Joseph. Joseph is one of two sons, he being the eldest. Joseph's accomplishments began many years ago at Otero-Garcia Post 72 in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

At eight he witnessed the dedication of the new post home. After several years of working out of a community center, my dad, Tony Frank

Navarreté, worked those years mentoring the new

Vietnam veterans about The American Legion

programs, protocols, and leadership character.

I still remember his words: Son, there's a time to work and a time to play. He led by example and was respected by all. He influenced his fellow World War II and Korean post members that these young men deserve respect for their service and should have the opportunity to join. Yes, me included.

I joined right after I was discharged in 1969. My dad did not get to see the fruits of his work when the new post home opened in April of 1987. We believe his spirit was with us that monumental moment when the U.S. flag was raised, Joseph being at our side.

Years later, the membership unanimously voted to change the name of the post charter. It now reads Otero-Garcia-Navarreté.

Gracias for allowing me to share this
message. Joseph is a charter member with 35 years
of continuous membership in the
Otero-Garcia-Navarreté Squadron 72. His
eligibility in the Sons of the American Legion is
through me, his father. I served in the U.S. Army

during the Vietnam era.

He is also a charter member of The

American Legion Riders Chapter 23. At the squadron

and detachment level, Joseph has held several

offices including Commander, Vice Commander,

finance officer, historian, and Sergeant-at-Arms.

At the national level, Joseph served as National Vice Commander, 2017-2018. He's also served as Alternate NEC and NEC and is a National Management Institute graduate.

Joseph was a member of the Subcommittee on Resolutions, Committee on Committees, special ad hoc committee on leadership development, and chairman of the Membership Committee, Veterans Employment and Education and the Americanism Commissions.

Joseph's working career continues in IT

operations in management positions and presently is

employed by Mortgage Finance Authority, a

quasi-governmental entity that provides financing

for housing and related services for low to

moderate income and underserved families throughout

New Mexico. He oversees the entire IT department.

He has obtained a bachelor's and master's degree in computer science information systems and a second master's in business administration.

Joseph and his wife, Loretta, share a family of seven children and eight grandchildren. He is proud of his heritage and culture, and his motto of "Todo es possible con Dios y la familia," Everything is possible with God and family, will enhance the growth in membership and represent over 391,000 members and, most importantly, work hand in hand with The American Legion Family in being Be the One with its programs.

I, Tony Navarreté, a duly elected delegate from the Detachment of New Mexico to this 52nd National Convention of the Sons of the American Legion in New Orleans, Louisiana, now have the honor and privilege to place the name of my son, Joseph Navarreté, for the position of National Commander of the Sons of the American Legion for the administrative year 2024-2025.

Another note, it will be history in the

making if he's elected; he will be the first

National Commander of the Sons out of New Mexico.

And another little added note, his mother was

National President of The American Legion Auxiliary

14 years ago, in 2009 and 2010. So it will be the first mother and son combination in those positions.

CHRIS BEDEL (AK): Chris Bedel, Alaska, yields to Maryland for the purpose of nominations.

JASON MILLER (MD): Mr. Commander, Jason
Miller, delegate from Maryland. Mr. Commander, I
request the chair recognize Past National Commander
Joseph Gladden for the purpose of seconding the
nomination for the high office of National
Commander.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: So noted.

PNC JOSEPH W. GLADDEN (MD): Good morning. We come here today to elect a new National Commander, but being from Maryland, I first want to say how proud I am of the incredible year that my dear friend JR Hall had during his year as National Commander. But his year has come to a close.

As it says in Ecclesiastes 3:1, For everything there is a season, and for every matter under heaven.

And now is the time for our next candidate, Joseph Navarreté, to be elected National Commander.

JASON MILLER (MD): Mr. Commander, Jason Miller, delegate from Maryland.

Mr. Commander, I request the chair recognize Past National Commander Joseph Gladden for the purpose of nomination for the high office of National Vice Commander.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Yes, sir.

PNC JOSEPH W. GLADDEN (MD): Good morning again. This weekend we have gathered to commemorate the end of another year, but we've also gathered to start another year.

Our next National Vice Commander candidate from the East is Bob Manzo from Maryland. Bob will be carrying on a long tradition of National Vice Commanders from my state.

Bob gets his eligibility through his father, Daniel Manzo, Sr. Daniel served in the Army during World War II in the Pacific Theater.

Bob comes from a family of service. His father was an honorary life member of Parkville Post 183, and his mother was an honorary life member of Parkville Unit 183.

For Bob's part, he's a 23-year member of the Sons of the American Legion, but he also is a

27-year member of The American Legion. Bob served in the Army from 1982 to 1988 and was honorably discharged. Pursuing his SAL career, Bob served as Parkville Post 183 Commander, Baltimore County Commander, and Northern Central District Commander for The American Legion.

Bob also served as a -- Bob could have been the Department Commander, but being younger, he was not in a position to take the time off from work because of his job. This is where the Detachment of Maryland got lucky.

After completing his term as Legion

District Commander, Bob started pursuing

opportunities in the Sons. Bob became a two-time

Squadron Commander of Parkville Squadron 183 and

was elected as Northern Central District SAL

Commander in 2011.

After working his way up through the ranks in the Detachment of Maryland, Bob was elected Commander in 2019 and 2020. Bob served as the only two-time SAL Detachment Commander in Maryland's history.

During Bob's first term, his theme was

Generations of Service. At the end of the year, he
gave his officers a picture of the person that gave
them their eligibility in the Sons.

In my case it was a picture of my father who served in the Army during World War II. My mother, my sister, my brother, and me were also in the picture. This picture was taken at Parris Island when my brother was graduating from the Marines boot camp. Just three months after that picture was taken, my father passed away. To this day, it is one of the most thoughtful and special gifts I've ever received.

Bob also followed up his second year in office with a theme of SAL Stronger Together, a statement that is so simple but so true.

Bob has many SAL and Legion accomplishments, but having been given the honorary life membership in both Parkville Squadron 183 and Post 183 are probably his greatest.

Bob is a Legion family, with his wife,
Carol, of 35 years being a Past Unit President of

Parkville Unit 183 and Past District President of the Northern Central District. Bob is the father of four children and grandfather of two, all of whom are members in The American Legion Family.

Bob has been employed by the BW Papersystems for over 40 years and serves as a technical support specialist.

I truly believe that we, the SAL, are lucky to have Bob in our world. Bob has been a hardworking member of the squadron all the way through the detachment and is truly a dear friend to all that he comes to know. No matter how you spell Bob, backwards or forwards, Bob will always be Bob, the guy that will give his all to whatever task or job he is given.

With that, I, Joe Gladden, delegate to this convention and Past National Commander, take great honor in placing the nomination to Bob Manzo from the Detachment of Maryland for National Vice Commander for the year 2024-2025.

America. Thank you.

Lawrence hails from the great state of Louisiana
where John has been a lifelong resident in the
New Orleans area. John and his wife, Sylvia,
reside in Belle Chasse, Louisiana. They have one
daughter and one son and three grandchildren. His
son and two grandsons are members of the Sons.

John has been a member of the Sons of the American Legion for the past 23 years. John's

eligibility is through his grandfather, who served in the U.S. Army during World War II from June 1945 to December of 1945, and from his father, Conrad Lawrence, who served in the Louisiana National Guard.

John has served the Sons of the American Legion in many positions at local, state, and national levels. John has served as Alternate NEC for the Detachment of Louisiana since 2018. John is serving on the National Children and Youth Committee as Vice Chairman and served on this committee since 2016. He is the Commander of Bayhi Ravey Squadron 329 since its inception in '21 and was instrumental in getting this charter established.

John has served the national organization of the Sons of the American Legion as a member of the Americanism Commission for two years, Children and Youth Commission for six years. John has served the Sons of the American Legion Detachment of Louisiana as Commander from 2015 to 2018, Vice Commander from 2013 to '15, the Detachment

Assistant Adjutant in 2013, as well as Americanism chairman, Internal Affairs chairman and Constitution and Bylaws.

John has served as Squadron Commander, Squadron 218, and Squadron 64, for most of his time in the Sons and is currently Squadron Commander at Squadron 329.

John has completed the National

Management Institution training in 2018. John has
also attended commander's training, NEC training
and adjutant trainings here in Atlantis.

I'd like to nominate John C. Lawrence for National Vice Commander for the Southeast region.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Louisiana nominates John Lawrence for National Vice Commander.

We'll go into the nomination for the Central Region.

MICHAEL VOZAR (IL): Mr. Adjutant,
Michael Vozar, Detachment of Illinois, and
delegate. I request the chair recognize PNC Tommie
Cisna for

the purpose of nomination of the high office of National Vice Commander.

NATIONAL ADJUTANT WRIGHT: Granted.

PNC CISNA: Good morning. I'm Tommie
Cisna from Illinois. In Illinois we have a
favorite son, Abraham Lincoln, the 16th President
of the United States.

In my mind, Illinois has another favorite son, Butch Ray. Butch has learned the rich history and traditions of the Sons of the American Legion, and what better way than through his squadron mate, our very own Past National Vice Commander, J.R. Stillwell.

Butch's eligibility is through his father, Harl H. Ray, who served honorably in the Army in the Persian Gulf during World War II.

I see that many of Butch's Illinois

American Legion family members are here to support

him -- his brother-in-law and sister-in-law, Marty

and Sharon Conatser, Past American Legion National

Commander and Past American Legion President, and

many current and past department and detachment

leaders as well.

Is Illinois in the house?

I also see his three wives who are here, whom he dotes on constantly, to support him: My long-suffering wife of 39 years, Past Department President Kathy Cisna; Past Department President Williamson, the long-suffering wife of 44 years to Bruno Williamson; and Past Department President Pam Ray, the very supportive wife of 45 years to Butch.

Now, come Wednesday, Pam hopes to be elected and installed as National Vice President for The American Legion Auxiliary.

Butch has served the Sons for over 40 years. Throughout those years of service, Butch has learned that the work we do for our veterans and children is not a handout but a hand-up.

Butch understands that when he has a good idea and shares it and somebody says, "Yeah, that's

Butch also sees the value of a member inviting him to a meeting or activity or to assume a chairman's position because that builds comradeship.

Butch has served at the squadron, district, division in Illinois, detachment and national level with distinction, a Past National Chaplain, and this past year a Central division Membership chairman.

Now, on that note, I don't recall the last time I anxiously awaited for a National Membership report to come out. The report that Butch sends out is a work of art. I mean, yes, it's numbers and where we are and how much work needs to be done, but the presentation is stunning.

PNC MICHAEL J. DEACON (IA): Good morning. Delegates and guests to this 52nd National Convention of the Sons of the American Legion, I come before you to place in nomination a young man who I think will do a very, very great job at this office.

Mike is a quadruple member of The

American Legion family. He served in the Navy as

Gunner's Mate 2nd Class. His American Legion, Sons

of the American Legion and American Legion

Auxiliary memberships are in the Walter Sayer Post

Squadron Unit 182 located in Eldora, Iowa.

Mike is also an American Legion Rider for the Polk City, Iowa, Chapter 232. Mike was a three-time Detachment Commander because of COVID. During those three years, we received two more triple nickels.

His Sons eligibility comes from his grandfather, Howard, who served in the Army in World War II and was part of the Normandy invasion on June 6, 1944. His other grandfather, Oden,

served in the Air Force during Korea.

While Mike has opportunities to serve in any part of The American Legion family, he chooses the Sons because he says it needs to be the voice of his grandfathers who no longer are there to advocate the rights of veterans.

Mike is also a life member of the VFW, the DAV, and is a member of Combat Veterans

Motorcycle Association. As a disabled vet himself,

Mike wants to sit down with anyone over a cup of

coffee and talk about what he can do to help

veterans with their rights, what they need.

When not advocating for veterans rights,
Mike can be found watching the Oklahoma Sooners.
