APRIL IS AMERICAN LEGION CHILDREN & YOUTH MONTH

The month of April is Children & Youth Month and the Sons of the American Legion as part of the 4.2 million Legion Family members take a very active part in support of the Children & Youth Programs. Did you know that the SAL since 1988 has donated over \$6 million to the American Legion Child Welfare Foundation, that's more than any other part of the Legion Family and Florida was the \$6 Million Detachment. Last year 2014 alone, the SAL contributed \$346,099.00 and 54,809 hours of service to the CWF on behalf of the American Legion. Special Olympics another C&Y Program the SAL donated \$197,715.00 and 19,346 hours of service. Your SAL Nationally also contributed \$491,012.00 and 83,599 hours of service to other various National C&Y Programs. Our 2014 National Sons of the American Legion Grand Total for Children & Youth Programs to the American Legion was \$1,174,933.00 and 166,825 hours of service.

Operation Military Kids

OMK is a collective effort between American communities and the U.S. Army. However, due to budget cuts, the program will be cancelled as of March 31st, 2015.

Through a network of National, State and Local Partners, Operation: Military Kids provides access to youth programs and support services where military children live. OMK Partners organize special events, provide transportation to military kids to sporting events or other extracurricular activities, and participate in the Hero Pack initiative. These programs are offered through Army Garrisons, National Guard Family State Offices and Reserve Regional Commands.

Last year alone, over 100,000 youths were involved in multiple events sponsored by OMK in 49 states and the District of Columbia. The goal of OMK is to assist children and families deal with the stress incurred before, during and after the deployment of a loved one.

The corporation, whose members are selected by the National Executive Committee of The American Legion, takes great care to ensure that these gifts are wisely invested. Income from fund investments is then passed on to the Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation and Children & Youth programs of The American Legion National Organization to support National, State and local programs for veterans and children.
