SAL National Commander Attends National President's Homecoming

Sons From Across the Country Meet in
Indianapolis for the Fall NEC

Representatives from detachments throughout the Sons of The American Legion met the weekend of October 4-6, 2024, in Indianapolis for the Fall NEC, or National Executive Committee meeting. The NEC meets three times throughout the year—fall, spring, and at the National Convention—to manage the complex business of an organization of almost 400,000 members.

The weekend begins with smaller meetings of commissions and committees, which then report to the NEC session on the following day at the Sheraton Indianapolis City Centre Hotel. These reports are from all commissions and committees, from Americanism to Internal Affairs to Children and Youth, and give the representatives from the detachments information about priorities and initiatives at the national level.

As an example, the Children and Youth Committee reported this year they are pushing American Legion Family Day, which falls on the last Saturday of April each year. This year, it is on April 26, 2025.... and as the resolution about Family Day states, "posts are

encouraged to open their doors to members of their community for the day."

Another such report was from the Membership and Squadron Activities Committee, which discussed that nationally, membership stands at around 394,500—about 5,500 members short of an all-time high in what's being branded as being on "Team 400K".

One of National Commander Joseph Navarrete's projects this year is raising money for the Veterans Children Foundation, or VCF. Following this committee's report, Commander Navarrete asked the NEC if the Sons could meet this "lofty goal of raising one million dollars in a year" - and the response ... a resounding "YES!". American Legion National Commander James LaCoursiere and American Legion Auxiliary National President Trish Ward addressed the NEC as well, and discussed what has happened in the past month of their administrative year. Both stressed that we all succeed together as an American Legion Family.

So let's hear from YOU. Tell us about something in your detachment, your district, your county, or your squadron. Write about an inspiring Young Son, or a rock-star SAL at home. In doing that, you could help out another squadron, or launch a program they never thought about running. NEF: Mutual Helpfulness

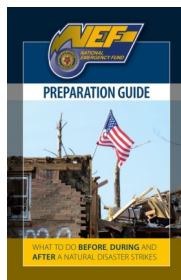
If you've been impacted by a natural disaster, you may be eligible for assistance.

The NEF provides up to \$3,000 for qualified Legionnaires or Sons of The American Legion, and up to \$10,000 for qualified American Legion posts which have been affected by declared natural disasters.

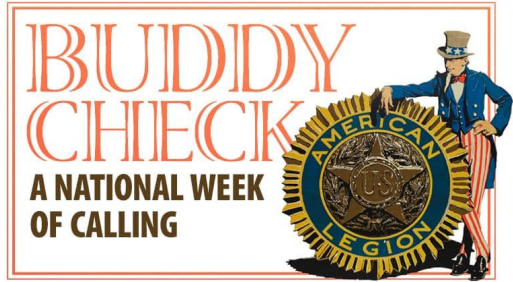
To be eligible for an individual grant, the Legionnaire or Son:

- Must have been displaced from their primary residence due to damage sustained during a declared natural disaster.
- Must provide copies of receipts of items required to meet immediate needs, such as housing, food, water, clothing, etc., during the period immediately following the disaster.
- Must be an active member at the time of the disaster and the time of application.

Preserving Our Past: Restoring Cemetery Monuments and Grave Markers

“To me, it’s our responsibility to ensure that our veterans’ history and legacy carries on for future generations. Preserving and maintaining their gravestones and markers is a small token of appreciation for their service and sacrifice for our freedom and liberties.”



Those are the sentiments of Gene Theroux, a dual member and Past Detachment Commander of Massachusetts.

For a number of years, Theroux has been using social media to put up pictures of his work preserving and repairing grave stones. He works extensively in the City of Westfield, Massachusetts, and at nine cemeteries - four are old burying grounds and five are active cemeteries with two large cemeteries and in the Town of Southwick. In addition, he has worked with and assisted other veteran service officers, cemetery sextons, and the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) with gravestone preservation. In addition, he serves as the Veterans Graves Officer for both the City of Westfield and for the Town of Southwick.

So to say he is an expert on the process of restoring grave stones is an understatement— he has written several Community Preservation Act submissions, and has received more than \$ 600,000 for cemetery and monument preservation.

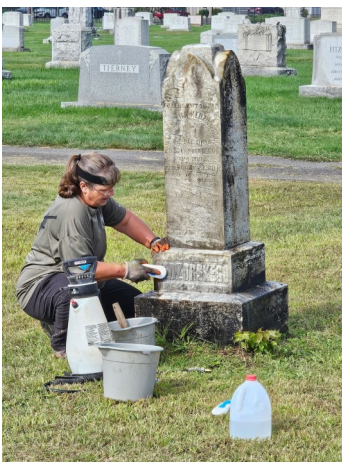
“The Millennium” asks Gene how one would go about the whole process of preservation ... from identifying the need, to contacting the cemetery, to the actual process of restoration.

“Community engagement and outreach is critical”, Theroux says. “Without active engagement in the commu-



nity, I would not be successful in acquiring grants for preservation work. It is important to let the community know the work that is being accomplished so that when you look for support, you will acquire it.”

For identifying a cemetery in need of gravestone repairs, a survey of the monuments and markers needs to be completed for a particular cemetery. Theroux writes that it is important to note that there are a lot of safety hazards within the cemeteries; for example, obelisk monuments and tablets on a base could be a hazard ... many times you will find leaning monuments which have the potential to fall and to injure the visitor. A resource is the Commonwealth of Massachusetts’ Department of Conservation and Recreation article “[Mourning Glory: Preserving Historic Cemeteries](#)”.



It is important to communicate and inform a cemetery of what you’d like to accomplish, and to inform them of your intended process. “People with good intentions have caused a lot of damage to gravestones by using the wrong material”, Theroux notes.

So how do Gene and his team prioritize the repairs of monuments or gravestones? His three priorities

are mitigating safety hazards, then identifying markers of historical significance, followed by fixing leaning marble tablets.

Much of the work, though, is done before he even steps into a cemetery to start the preservation process. “For every hour in a cemetery, there are five or six hours of accomplishing research and documentation, [aside from] editing the photos and sometimes video captured.”

It is critical to take before/during/after photos of each preservation to a gravestone.

Another important fact is that the family of the plot owns the private monuments and markers. “Perpetual Care” is something that is commonly misun-

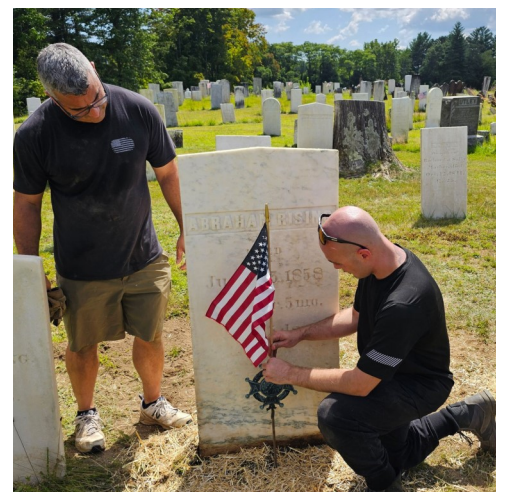


Theroux, far right, at Pine Hill Cemetery in August

derstood; in quoting an article on [grav- elisting.com](#), “Perpetual care is like a community fund specifically dedicated to keeping this park beautiful and functional. Families contribute to this fund when they purchase a plot, ensuring the cemetery has the resources to maintain the grounds.” Perpetual care funds typically do not extend to maintenance of the grave marker.

PDC Theroux also speaks about the importance of assembling a motivated group of volunteers to do the work. He has a team of veterans, who accomplish everything from simple resets to complex repairs of gravestones. “I have one member who loves to clean gravestones, and that attribute is appreciated by the whole team.” For gravestones that have fallen tablets with a base, or have fragmented into multiple pieces, that designated member who enjoys cleaning will thoroughly clean all the fragments prior to use accomplishing any epoxy or mortar repairs.

For our Young Sons featured in the "Newshound", we send a questionnaire for the family to fill out ... not just for the parent, but questions to ask the kids. The answers you get back from these kids sometimes make you tear up, and are truly inspiring.

That was absolutely the case reading the answers that the Casey boys of Nebraska gave.

Can you think of something you did with the Legion that made you really proud or happy? Sean Casey, 13, answered "Getting in front of my classmates to provide flag education because it showed other kids that they can accomplish anything they want."

His 9-year old brother Liam answered about what has made him in much the same way, ... "Doing our pizza parties at the veterans' home because we give them company so they are not alone."

Sean and Liam are both sons of Chris and Cassie Casey, of Blair, Nebraska. The boys are all members of Squadron 112 in Benson, where they are eligible for membership through two of their great grandfathers—USAF Tech Sgt. David Harvey, who served in



Vietnam, and David London, who served during Korea in the United States Army.

Dad Chris has served as chairman of the national Americanism Commission, as well as Detachment Commander and Detachment Adjutant. The boys themselves also hold office ... Sean has been the Benson Squadron 112 Sergeant-At-Arms, and currently serves in his

third term as the Detachment of Nebraska Chaplain; Liam currently serves as the Sergeant-At-Arms for the Benson 112, and was recently appointed as the Detachment of Nebraska Assistant Sergeant-At-Arms.

Dad can't be proud enough of his two sons. "As a man of faith, watching Sean complete his duties as Detachment Chaplain makes me overwhelmed with joy. The confidence he has gained over the years by offering prayer, conducting memorial services, and completing readings has made both his mother and I very proud of him. Liam has followed his brother's example and completes every duty he is assigned with the honor his forefather's service deserves. Both boys understand duty, honor, sacrifice, and they know we can never repay the debt owed to our nation's veterans."

These young men do what they do because they want to give back, and want to make a difference.

"Sean's first rock star moment was when he led the 13 Folds Ceremony by read-



ing the meaning of each fold in front of 160 of his 5th grade classmates", dad Chris continued. "That event was the first of many public speaking appearances in front of big crowds as a representative of the SAL. There was one specific moment that occurred for Liam in which I knew he was beginning to understand the importance of service to our community - [when] our squadron had a fundraising breakfast scheduled for the same day as his 7th birthday. No one would fault our family for missing the fundraiser since it was Liam's big day.

Not only did we not miss the fundraiser, but Liam washed the dishes the entire event with the biggest smile on his face. The squadron surprised him with a birthday cake at the conclusion of the event. A seven-year-old chose service over self, who does that? Liam Casey does!"

"I like being able to help with activities and it is really fun being able to connect with everyone", noted 8th grader Sean. Liam who is in 4th grade feels exactly the same - "I like doing the events ... I get to thank veterans for their service."



"They are the epitome of what every Sons of The American Legion member should strive to be and they are only just beginning", writes dad. "Both of their great grandpas have now passed, but Sean and Liam continue to honor their legacy of service with everything they do as active members of the Sons of The American Legion."

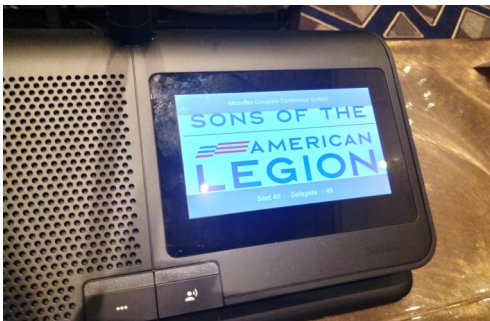
The Shure conference room mics are wireless, and provided clean and precise audio. One unit placed between two Detachment NECs worked out well.

NNOK: No Next Of Kin

The Wisconsin District 1 Legion Family came together this year and raised awareness and much needed funding for the Department's Unclaimed Veterans Burial Fund, also known as the Terrence Sund Fund. The name we chose was intentionally peculiar to draw attention to it. The NNOK Ride (pronounced "knock") stood for No Next Of Kin. Our tag line was "No Veteran Should Take Their Final Journey Alone". The name and tag garnered attention and provided us a unique opportunity to explain what this was all about.

At times this was a challenging endeavor but was always rewarding to see the support of so many. The challenge was speaking with people about the subject matter. Not everyone is comfortable with it. But it was rewarding to see the outpouring of support from all corners of the Legion Family.

Steve Conto has operated this fund on the generosity of donors from its inception. He and Susan have done a brilliant job of sorting through the legal issues, the historical documents and coordination to care for every unclaimed veteran that has been presented to them. At times, they have reached deep into their own pockets simply because funding wasn't sufficient.

Bill Fitters, my co-chair, and I were truly blessed at the NNOK Ride's success. We created a scavenger hunt for information that drew the participants to a wide variety of veteran locations throughout the District. We had basket raffles and silent auctions. Our thanks to District 1 Commander Nathan Bond and Auxiliary President Zondra Morris as well as her First Vice President Crystal Shaw for their support, encouragement and involvement for truly making this a District 1 Legion Family affair.

At the end of the day, we tallied up total donations and had \$21,931.00. Two weeks later, after several additional donations were made, we were blessed beyond measure to write a check in the amount of \$23,370.00 for the Unclaimed Veterans Burial Fund.

Discussions have already begun for next year, but I'd challenge every Legion Family Post, Squadron and Unit to consider having

your own "NNOK Ride". Funds will always be needed as we care for unclaimed veterans. If you wish some help getting organized, give me a call or email. We'll be thrilled to help you get started.

Thank you to each and every individual that helped us exceed our expectations. Whether you voted to donate funds, made and delivered baskets for raffles or provided items for auction or worked all day at the event; without your support this never would have happened.

Series: What's in a Name?

Fellow Sons, here is the second article in the series "What's in a Name?", a set of articles which highlight American Legion Posts throughout the country and the serviceman for which they are named. We must always remember that we stand upon the sacrifice of those veterans from which our eligibility has come.

Douglas M. Lyons American Legion Post # 72 (Tennessee)

Douglas M. Lyons. WWI Veteran who was killed in combat action in Verdun, France, 12 October 12, 1918. Posthumously Awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for his actions. The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress, July 9, 1918, takes pride in presenting the Distinguished Service Cross (Posthumously) to Second Lieutenant (Infantry) Douglas M. Lyons, United States Army, for extraordinary heroism in action while serving with 114th Infantry Regiment, 29th Division, A.E.F., near Verdun, France, 12 October 1918. Inspiring his men by his fearlessness, Lieutenant Lyons led an attack against a strongly fortified enemy position, and, in so doing, was killed.

On September 23, 1930, forty-two men from the Stewart County, Tennessee area met and completed the Application for Post of The American Legion. The Post would be named after Douglas Milford Lyons, a WWI Veteran who was killed in combat action in Verdun, France, 12 October 12, 1918. Post 72 was granted its Permanent Charter on February 26, 1931 and has been a part of the Stewart County Community for nearly 93 years.

Don (Dominic) Gentile American Legion Post # 532 (Ohio)

Dominic Salvatore "Don" Gentile (December 6, 1920 – January 28, 1951), was a World War II RAF and USAAF pilot who achieved fame as he came close to surpassing Eddie Rickenbacker's World War I record of 26 downed aircraft. He later served in the post-war U.S. Air Force.

The U.S. military required two years of college for its pilots, which Gentile did not have, so he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force and was posted to the UK in Dec 1941 as a Pilot Officer. Gentile flew the Super-

marine Spitfire Mk V with No. 133 Squadron, one of the three famed RAF "Eagle Squadron"s beginning in June, 1942.

In September 1942, the Eagle squadron pilots transferred to the USAAF, becoming the nucleus of the 4th Fighter Group. Gentile became a flight leader in September 1943, now flying the P-47 Thunderbolt. After conversion to the P-51B at the end of February 1944, Gentile built a tally of 15.5 additional aircraft destroyed between March 3 and April 8, 1944. After downing three more planes on April 8,[13] he was the top scoring 8th Air Force pilot.
